The Schools Against Violence in Education (SAVE) Act of 2007 provides that the Commissioner of Education report annually to the Governor and General Assembly concerning "the prevalence of violent and disruptive incidents in the public schools, and the effectiveness of school programs undertaken to reduce violence and assure the safety and security of students and school personnel."

The attached report presents an update on the Department of Education's progress in implementing the provisions of the Act, a summary of available serious incidents occurring at school and an overview of statewide projects aimed at addressing a wide range of school safety issues.

Tenn. Code Ann. §49-2-118 and 49-6-1007 also provide that the Commissioner of Education report annually to the General Assembly regarding the implementation of conflict resolution and character education programs in Tennessee schools. This information has also been presented herewith.

INTRODUCTION

Public Chapter 548 of 2007, the Schools Against Violence in Education (SAVE) Act, requires that the Commissioner of Education “report to the governor and general assembly on implementation and compliance” of the Act, as well as, the general progress of the state in providing a safe learning environment for students.

SAVE ACT IMPLEMENTATION

Establishment of a State-Level School Safety Team and Template

The SAVE Act directs the Commissioner to establish a state-level school safety team that is specifically charged with publishing “a template for use by districts in preparing their district-level safety-plans and building-level emergency response plans.” The Department of Education convened a state-level safety team consistent with the parameters outlined in the public chapter. Specific agencies and other strategic partners have been identified in Appendix 1. The team reviewed the available literature and identified best practices in each of the areas specified in the Act. A self-assessment/quality indicators document was produced and is attached as Appendix 2. An extensive website with links to each of the quality indicators was built and is currently posted at www.tennessee.gov/education/learningsupport/SAVE.html. Additionally, a variety of sample plans have been made available to districts upon request.

Collecting Strategies State-wide

As a part of the SAVE Act implementation, the Department of Education developed a new reporting template to collect specific prevention and intervention strategies being used in districts across the state. This reporting template serves two purposes. First, it provides consistent information of what types of programs are used, how many districts used each type, and what funds are being used for prevention strategies. Second, this information assists with district collaboration around what strategies have been successful.

District and Building-Level School Safety Plans

The Act requires every district to submit its school safety plan to the Departments of Education and Safety. This entails submitting a SAVE Act Compliance Package. Additionally, every district is required to submit its plan to local law enforcement and first responder agencies.

The SAVE Act Compliance Package consists of the following items:

- 1) Completed and signed Self-Assessment Document.
- 2) Two copies of the district Emergency Response Plan (ERP).
- 3) A roster of key response personnel at the district and building level.

- 4) Assurance statement from director of schools.

Department staff are consistently reviewing each submitted compliance package to insure completion and to identify ongoing areas of concern for districts and schools. To date, all Tennessee school districts have submitted a Compliance Package and are working toward compliance with the new requirements set forth.

Enhanced Data Collection System

The SAVE Act also requires that “The commissioner (of education), in conjunction with the commissioner of safety, shall establish a statewide uniform violent incident reporting system which all LEAs shall follow.”

In response to this mandate, as well as amendments to *Tenn. Code Ann. § 49-6-3401*, the Department has expanded the student management information system to include additional data regarding serious incidents that occur in Tennessee schools. The expanded reporting system integrates zero tolerance offenses, thereby unifying both collections into a single reporting method. Below is a list of the new incident categories that school districts now use in reporting to the Department:

Incident Types

1. Possession, Use or Distribution of Illegal Drugs
2. Possession of Handgun
3. Possession of Rifle or Shotgun
4. Possession of Explosive or Incendiary Device
5. Non-Lethal Firearm
6. Possession of a Weapon Other than Firearm
7. Possession, Use or Distribution of Alcohol
8. Violation of School Rules
9. Theft of Property
10. Vandalism/ Damage of Property
11. Bomb Threat
12. Other Type of Threat
13. Bullying
14. Fighting
15. Sexual Harassment
16. Assault of Teacher or Staff
17. Assault of Student
18. Sexual Assault
19. Aggravated Assault of Teacher or Staff
20. Aggravated Assault of Student
21. Attempted Homicide
22. Homicide

Additional data collected relevant to each incident includes the following: grade of offender, the school and district where the offense occurred and the action taken by the district.

Districts also continue to collect and report information on student victims of violent crime as provided under the State Board of Education’s Unsafe School Choice Policy. A copy of the *Student Violent Crime Victimization Report Form* is attached as Appendix 3.

School Safety Index

The SAVE Act states that “the commissioner shall report to the governor and the general assembly concerning the prevalence of violent and disruptive incidents in the public schools.” To fulfill this legislative mandate, the Office of School Safety and Learning Support developed the *School Safety Index*. Below you will find an abbreviated *Index* for the State of Tennessee that includes the offenses and sum totals for the 2008-2009 school year.

The full *School Safety Index* has been attached as Appendix 4. The sum of all incidents is weighted against the school’s average daily membership to factor in variations in enrollment and arrive at an *Index*. Schools that do not have any incidents to report for the 2008-2009 school year do not appear in the report.

Implementation Challenges and Future Developments

As a result of the fatal shooting at a Tennessee high school in 2008, the Comptroller’s Office of Research and Education Accountability was tasked with examining what Tennessee was doing to ensure that schools are safe. <http://www.comptroller1.state.tn.us/Repository/RE/SchoolViolence2009.pdf>. The report was released in September 2009 and identified three specific challenges for the Tennessee Department of Education that includes the following:

1. Ensure that districts and schools have sufficiently funded and implemented the policies and requirements (of the SAVE Act).
2. Monitor trends in violent incidents and school climate, and
3. Evaluate the effectiveness of programs and policies.

Staff and funding to implement the requirements of the SAVE Act have decreased significantly since enactment. A staff position that was funded to assist with implementation was eliminated as part of the state government budget reductions. State and federal funding designated for school safety and violence prevention declined from \$12.1 million in 2004 to \$9.7 million in 2008. Elimination of the federal Safe and Drug-Free Schools Program for the 2010-11 school year will further reduce funding available to local school districts to approximately \$4.8 million and all but eliminate funding available to the Department of Education for training and technical assistance.

As a result of staff reductions, the monitoring of district compliance with SAVE Act expectations is limited. A description of the compliance monitoring process used by the Department is provided as Appendix 5.

CURRENT FUNDING FOR SCHOOL SAFETY

Safe Schools Act of 1998

The Safe Schools Act of 1998 (*Tenn. Code Ann. §49-6-4302*) provides state funding for school safety and violence prevention activities. Each school district is eligible to receive these funds that are allocated based on the district's relative share of BEP funding. A 25% local match is required.

Since 1998 the General Assembly has appropriated the following amounts for this program:

Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Program

Title IVA of the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001* provides federal funding to school districts for drug and violence prevention activities. Funds are allocated on a formula basis and may be used for a variety of activities related to school safety and violence prevention. Unfortunately, the Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Program has been eliminated under the Federal budget for the 2010-2011 school year. Therefore, there will no longer be Federal monies to states for school districts and the Department of Education to utilize around drug and violence prevention activities.

STATEWIDE SPECIAL PROJECTS

Advancing Alternative Education in Tennessee

Alternative education has been a continued area of significant activity for the Department of Education. Students placed in alternative education programs often exhibit behavior that disrupts their learning and the learning of others. During the 2008-2009 school year, 5,271 students were expelled from school. Many of these students were placed in an alternative education program. Acknowledging the unique opportunities these programs have to positively intervene in the lives of students, the Department is actively working with alternative education programs to enhance the quality of programming.

In collaboration with the Governor's Advisory Council for Alternative Education, the Department has been instrumental in the accomplishment of the following key items relative to alternative education:

1. In accordance with Public Charter Number 211, the Council, in coordination with the Department studied issues relating to the establishment of pilot alternative schools/programs entitled the *ATLAS Pilot Project: A Feasibility Study Relating to the Establishment of Alternative Education Programs in Tennessee*. The study outlines specific recommendations to drive quality with enriched funding.
2. In February 2009, the Department held the first annual *Student Discipline and Alternative Education (SDAE) Institute* bringing together experts in the

- field of educational law, student discipline, social and emotional learning, and alternative and nontraditional education providing a wide variety of breakout sessions for participants.
3. Partnering with the National Alternative Education Association (NAEA), the Advisory Council and Department helped sponsor and support the first ever regional summit on alternative education. The conference explored best practices, national trends, and allowed alternative educators an opportunity to collaborate with other practitioners outside of the state. The conference was held in Rogers, Arkansas in October 2009.
 4. Department staff have also taken a leading role in providing onsite technical assistance at the request of local school districts. Numerous school/program visits and evaluations were conducted by Department staff.

Over the coming school year the Department will continue the much needed work of advancing Alternative Education in our state. School/Law Enforcement Partnerships

Approximately 605 law enforcement officers are specifically assigned to Tennessee schools. The General Assembly has established employment and training standards for School Resource Officers. Annually, the Department requests compliance verification from local school districts. Currently, all districts in Tennessee report adhering to the requirements established by the General Assembly.

The Tennessee Department of Safety and the Governor's Office of Homeland Security continue to work closely with the Department of Education to provide training and emergency support to Tennessee schools. Safety Commissioner Dave Mitchell meets annually with directors of schools and has directed his staff to assist the Department of Education and Tennessee School Resource Officers Association in the development of specialized training.

All Tennessee school resource officers are currently being introduced to the Tennessee Fusion Center at the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation. This new resource will allow officers in schools across the state to connect with a powerful information network. Steps are currently underway to connect Tennessee schools to the Office of Homeland Security's Automated Critical Asset Management System (ACAMS).

Mental Health Collaborations

The Department of Education has pursued collaborations with the mental health service delivery system via several different projects.

The Office of Coordinated School Health received an 18 month grant from the U.S. Department of Education – Office of Safe and Drug Free Schools. The *Tennessee Integration of Schools and Mental Health Systems* grant has assisted each LEA in the development of school policy, protocols, training and linkages with community mental health providers regarding the prevention, identification, referral and follow-up of students needing mental health services. Teams from each LEA received training and technical assistance to further the development of a more seamless system of care between schools, mental health providers and juvenile justice staff.

The Department continues to partner with Vanderbilt Community Mental Health Center to implement the PREPARE project. PREPARE was developed to support the creation of crisis response teams in each school district and to foster partnerships between schools and community-based mental health resources. More than 1500 school counselors, social workers, psychologists and other appropriate school personnel have participated in training to date.

Working with Dr. Ken Strong, supervising psychologist for the Memphis City Schools Threat Assessment Team, the Department has expanded the *Guidelines for Student Threat Assessment* training to include an advanced seminar for licensed school psychologists and school social workers. The seminar addresses advanced threat/mental health assessment and behavior support issues.

Finally, the Department is an active participant in the Council on Children's Mental Health established by Public Chapter 1062. The Council is charged with developing a plan for the establishment of a System of Care for Tennessee children and families.

Youth Suicide Prevention

The first documented self-inflicted gunshot wound in a Tennessee school occurred during the 2006-07 school year. Eighteen percent of Tennessee students reported on the Youth Risk Behavior Survey that they had considered suicide at some time during the past 12 months.

The Jason Flatt Act of 2007 requires every Tennessee teacher and principal to receive in-service training on suicide awareness. The Department works closely with the Jason Foundation and the Tennessee Lives Count Project of the Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network to help schools meet the in-service mandate and to address this important issue which has been linked to targeted

school shooting incidents. More information regarding the Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network may be found at: <http://www.tspn.org/>.

Early Childhood Training

Tennessee Voices for Children, in collaboration with the Departments of Education, Health, Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities, Human Services, and Children's Services as well as representatives of Head Start, Tennessee Early Childhood Training Alliance, Child Care Resource and Referral and Tennessee Institutes of Higher Education, are working with early childhood caregivers and educators to prevent problem behaviors and provide individualized interventions. The project, provided by the Center on the Social and Emotional Foundations for Early Learning (CSEFEL), seeks to embed the evidence-based practices found to develop social and emotional competence in young children ages birth to age five. Six early childhood programs representing the three grand divisions of the state were chosen as demonstration sites.

Bullying and Harassment Prevention

For the last three years, Tennessee has implemented a pilot of the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP) in 17 sites across the state. The Olweus program is a comprehensive, school-wide model designed for use in elementary, middle, or junior high schools. Program goals are to reduce and prevent bullying problems among school children and to improve peer relations.

In addition to its impact on reducing bullying, the program is designed to improve the social climate of classrooms and reduce related antisocial behaviors such as vandalism and truancy. Tennessee is one of a limited number of states that have hosted a training of trainers. As a result there is a cadre of 40 Certified Olweus trainers in Tennessee who are prepared to train schools in the strategies necessary to implement the program. A complete list of trainers in Tennessee may be found at: <http://www.clemson.edu/olweus/trainers.html>. The program is currently being implemented in 80 sites. A second cadre of trainers is currently undergoing the training and certification process.

Recently, the Tennessee Department of Education developed a new workshop for school administrators entitled *When Bullying Comes to School: Addressing Bullying, Harassment, and Hazing Through Effective Policy and Practice*. The seminar provides an overview of requirements under *Tenn. Code Ann.* relative to bullying and harassment with a particular focus upon insuring that policy is reflected in effective practice. Additionally, the Department developed a model policy for districts, as well as a new web resource on bullying and harassment for the general public. The Methamphetamine Awareness Project

The Methamphetamine Awareness Project is supported by a Governor's Methamphetamine Initiative Grant received from the Tennessee Department of Finance and Administration's Office of Criminal Justice Programs. The project is a three-year effort to insure educators remain aware and proactive in responding to methamphetamine abuse and/or exposure.

During the 2008-09 school year, 40 educators participated in our regional training sessions. Participants receive an overview of the drug and are taught how to recognize the signs and symptoms of children living in a home where methamphetamine is being produced or used. Appropriate intervention strategies are also identified and discussed.

Pandemic Influenza Preparedness: A Planning Guide for Tennessee School Districts

Tenn. Code Ann. §49-6-801 or the SAVE Act establishes specific expectations for districts regarding school safety planning. Expectations include planning for the possibility of the Pandemic outbreak. To help school districts in their planning efforts, the Tennessee Departments of Education and Health published *Pandemic Influenza Preparedness: A Planning Guide for Tennessee School Districts*.

The document includes specific planning elements related to the following broad categories: planning and coordination, continuity of student learning and core operations, infection control policies and procedures, and communication planning. 2010 Student Discipline and Alternative Education Institute

In collaboration with the Department of Education's Office of General Counsel, the Office of School Safety and Learning Support and the UT Law Enforcement Innovation Center held the second annual Student Discipline and Alternative Education (SDAE) Institute in mid February of 2010. The SDAE Institute provided teachers and administrators with proactive approaches to dealing with defiant students, as well as legal and procedural issues and practices related to suspending and expelling students.

Furthermore, techniques were demonstrated to help educators and other professionals provide meaningful and appropriate interventions to students. Finally, exemplary practices in alternative education were shared. Other topics areas included the following: adventure based learning, bullying prevention, dropout prevention, life skills acquisition, positive behavior support, school

climate, service learning, student threat assessment, and transitional planning. The conference was designed to help districts most appropriately meet the needs of the challenging student, while continuing to maintain a positive and productive learning environment for all.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION AND CHARACTER EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN TENNESSEE

Tenn. Code Ann. § 49-2-118 states that each local education agency shall implement for grades one through six an intervention program that utilizes conflict resolution and decision-making strategies aimed at preventing occurrences of disruptive acts by students within the school and on school property. Conflict resolution programs are intended to reduce violence by providing children with the skills, information, and practice needed to appropriately resolve conflict. Some of the interpersonal skills taught in a typical program include empathy, impulse control, problem solving, and anger management.

In 1999, *Tenn. Code Ann. § 49-6-1007* was amended to include that school systems report to the Department of Education and General Assembly information about their character education efforts and progress. Tennessee is one of 28 states that have legislation mandating or encouraging character education. Based on the language of the mandate, social, ethical and emotional development should be an integral part of the school day. Character education can and should create school environments where students feel safe, valued and respected and that will lead to improvements in attendance, behavior and academics. The National Character Education Partnership (CEP) was established to provide educators with access to best practices, materials and resources. CEP, with the help of Tom Lickona, developed the “Character Education Quality Standards” (Appendix 8) as a guide for implementing character development activities.

Findings

All Tennessee school districts were included in the 2008-2009 Conflict Resolution Survey. During the 2008-2009 school year, Conflict Resolution programs reached 557,295 students in 1,286 schools. Character Education programs reached 697,995 students in 1,383 schools.

Of the responding districts, 128 reported improvements in the school climate as a result of programming, 126 reported improved student behavior, and 123 reported increased student awareness action.

Conclusions

The data collected suggests that these programs have been effective in improving the overall climate of a school and improvements in student behavior. TENNESSEE SAVE ACT
TCA 49-3-6-(3-15)
Compliance/Monitoring Process for School Year 2009-10

The SAVE Act establishes standardized practices for each school system to assess, report, and review on all safety issues via the SAVE Act Compliance/Self Assessment Instrument. School systems are required to use the Instrument in developing a district safety plan and individual school plans, as well as provide a copy of the district plan to the Department of Education. Moreover, a copy of the Compliance Instrument must be submitted which documents any deficiencies with the requirements set forth. Where this is the case, districts are required to develop a timeline for initiating and completing all deficient items. The process allows for safety planning specific to the distinct needs of the district. The Compliance/Monitoring Process involves the following three processes:

Assessment

The assessment process is designed to be comprehensive in that all stakeholders are involved in the school safety planning process. School systems are required to engage local agencies that would play a role in responding to an emergency or some other traumatic event. Teams of individuals at the district and the school level develop a comprehensive safety plan that addresses all hazards specific to the local community. The Compliance/Self Assessment Instrument was developed specifically for school systems and summarizes their efforts in the planning process, as well as indicates various stages of completion/compliance.

The four (4) areas of assessment include the following: 1) Emergency Management, 2) Prevention and Intervention, 3) Policies and Procedures, and 4) Evidence Inventory. An action plan must be completed for the first three (3) areas of assessment. The fourth item, the Evidence Inventory, indicates programs and methods utilized by the school system to prevent and intervene in any adverse situations, and to establish a safe school climate.

Reporting

School systems are required to determine a person in the district that will serve as a liaison to the Department of Education on all school safety issues. This information is placed in a database for easy access during an emergency or any other event that would require Department staff to contact the district.

Each school system is required annually to submit the following as documentation of compliance: two copies of the district safety plan, a completed Compliance/Self Assessment Instrument, signature of assurances from the director of schools affixed, and a District Information Page. The Compliance/Self Assessment Instrument and the District Information Page are required to be submitted online and as a paper document. Paper copies of each of these documents, as well as the other documents, are required to be submitted to the Department of Education. One copy of each district manual is also forwarded to the Office of Homeland Security by Department staff.

Review and Monitoring

All documents submitted by the school systems are reviewed for compliance/completion. The Compliance/Self Assessment Instrument is reviewed for accuracy, completions and/or deficiencies, as well as action plans when necessary. Each manual is reviewed and specific information is recorded and maintained online.

Deficiencies in compliance or reporting are noted and the school system is notified of those deficiencies. Any non-responses from the school system prompt a new notification. Documentation of the status of each system's compliance is maintained online and in a paper file. Technical assistance is provided to the school systems as requested.

CHARACTER EDUCATION QUALITY STANDARDS

*Developed by the Character Education Partnership
Endorsed by the TN Character Education Partnership*

Principle #1: Character education promotes core ethical values as the basis of good character

Principle #2: Character is comprehensively defined to include thinking, feeling, and behavior.

Principle #3: Effective character education requires an intentional, proactive, and comprehensive approach that promotes the core values in all phases of school life.

Principle #4: The school is a caring community.

Principle #5: To develop character, the school provides students opportunities for moral action.

Principle #6: Effective character education includes a meaningful and challenging academic curriculum that respects all learners and helps them succeed.

Principle #7: Character Education should strive to develop students' intrinsic motivation for developing good character.

Principle #8: The school staff is a learning and moral community in which all share responsibility for character education and attempt to adhere to the same core values that guide the education of students.

Principle #9: Staff and students demonstrate moral leadership.

Principle #10: The school recruits parents and community members as full partners in the character-building effort.

Principle #11: Evaluation of character education assesses the character of the school, the school staff's functioning as character educators, and the extent to which students manifest good character.
