The Schools Against Violence in Education (SAVE) Act of 2007 provides that the Commissioner of Education report annually to the Governor and General Assembly concerning “the prevalence of violent and disruptive incidents in the public schools, and the effectiveness of school programs undertaken to reduce violence and assure the safety and security of students and school personnel.”

The attached report presents an update on the implementation of the SAVE Act, a summary of serious incidents occurring at school and an overview of statewide projects addressing school safety-related issues.

Tenn. Code Ann.49-2-118 and 49-6-1007 also provide that the Commissioner report annually regarding the implementation of conflict resolution and character education programs in Tennessee schools. This information is also contained in the attached report.

Introduction

The Schools Against Violence in Education (SAVE) Act established specific school safety planning and reporting requirements for Tennessee schools, as well as the Department of Education. The Act specifically directs the Commissioner of Education to provide an annual report to the Governor and the General Assembly regarding the ability of schools to provide a safe and supportive learning environment.

2009-2010: A Challenging Year for Tennessee Schools

The 2009-2010 school year proved to be a challenging one for Tennessee schools. As the year began, public health officials were unsure what the ramifications of the rapidly-emerging H1N1 virus would be and asked schools to support their social distancing strategies by implementing a variety of school closure and attendance policies. While the severity of the virus ultimately proved to be limited, the initial uncertainty, rapid transmission, and heightened concern exposed school and community leaders to the need for emergency response and continuity of operations (COOP) planning. The Department of Education, in collaboration with the Tennessee Department of Health, produced a guidance document for school districts entitled *Pandemic Influenza Preparedness: A Planning Guide for Tennessee School Districts* which can be accessed online at: <http://www.state.tn.us/education/learningsupport/schsafetyctr/doc/PandemicInfluenzaPreparedness-FINAL.pdf>.

In February of 2010, the peaceful halls of a Knoxville elementary school were disrupted when a teacher who had been told that his contract would not be renewed, shot a principal and assistant principal. Fortunately, both administrators survived; however, the incident served as a reminder that threats to the safety of students and staff can come from many different directions. This fact was reinforced during the current school year when an armed intruder confronted a building principal and school resource officer at a Sullivan County high school. Information regarding the Department's current plans for addressing workplace violence is provided later in this report.

Finally, the epic flash flooding that occurred across Middle and West Tennessee on May 1st and 2nd wreaked havoc in Tennessee schools and communities. One hundred ninety-four school buildings were damaged by flooding or heavy rain, including 6 that were declared uninhabitable. A total of 159 instructional days were lost. While the flooding and resultant impact on community infrastructure was severe, most school officials will acknowledge that Tennessee was extremely fortunate that the heavy rainfall occurred on a Saturday and Sunday (when schools were not in session).

SAVE ACT Implementation

District and Building-Level School Safety Plans

The planning phase for the SAVE Act has been completed in that a state-level school safety team has been assembled and has developed a framework for districts and schools to follow in developing a comprehensive safety plan. Every Tennessee school district has submitted an initial school safety plan and is now required to conduct an annual self-assessment. Updates to these plans, as well as a roster of key emergency contacts at the district and building level are submitted annually to the Department of Education. The Department forwards one copy of each plan to the Tennessee Department of Safety/Governor's Office of Homeland Security.

The SAVE Act Compliance Package consists of the following items:

- 1) Completed and signed Self-Assessment Document.
- 2) Two copies of any updates to the district Emergency Response Plan (ERP).
- 3) A roster of key response personnel at the district and building level.
- 4) Assurance statement from the director of schools.

Department staff review each compliance package to ensure completion and to identify ongoing areas of concern for districts and schools. To date, all Tennessee school districts have submitted a Compliance Package and are working toward compliance with the requirements set forth. The Department uses district and school rosters to build a statewide database of school emergency contacts.

In addition to submitting annual updates to their emergency response plans, districts provide a summary of prevention and intervention strategies being utilized, as well as assurances from the director of schools that key school safety policy requirements are being addressed.

Enhanced Data Collection System

The SAVE Act also requires the Commissioner of Education to establish a statewide uniform violent incident reporting system and to annually report a summary of these incidents.

The Department has expanded the student management information system to include additional data regarding serious incidents that occur in Tennessee schools. The expanded reporting system integrates zero tolerance offenses,

thereby, unifying both collections into a single reporting process. Below is a list of the incident categories that school districts now use in reporting to the Department:

1. Possession, Use or Distribution of Illegal Drugs
2. Possession of Handgun
3. Possession of Rifle or Shotgun
4. Possession of Explosive or Incendiary Device
5. Non-Lethal Firearm
6. Possession of a Weapon Other than Firearm
7. Possession, Use or Distribution of Alcohol
8. Violation of School Rules
9. Theft of Property
10. Vandalism/ Damage of Property
11. Bomb Threat
12. Other Type of Threat
13. Bullying
14. Fighting
15. Sexual Harassment
16. Assault of Teacher or Staff
17. Assault of Student
18. Sexual Assault
19. Aggravated Assault of Teacher or Staff
20. Aggravated Assault of Student
21. Attempted Homicide
22. Homicide

Additional data collected relevant to each incident includes the following: grade of offender, the school and district where the offense occurred, and the action taken by the district.

Districts also continue to collect and report information on student victims of violent crime as provided under the State Board of Education's Unsafe School Choice Policy. A copy of the *Student Violent Crime Victimization Report Form* is attached as Appendix B.

School Safety Index

The SAVE Act states that "the commissioner shall report to the governor and the general assembly concerning the prevalence of violent and disruptive incidents in the public schools." To fulfill this legislative mandate, the Department has developed a *School Safety Index*. Below you will find an abbreviated *Index* for the State of Tennessee that includes the offenses and sum totals for the 2009-2010 school year.

The full *School Safety Index*, disaggregated by school, has been attached as Appendix C. For each school, the reported sum of those incidents identified above is divided by the school's average daily membership to arrive at a *School Safety Index Score*. A higher index score indicates a relatively higher level of reported incidents. Schools that did not report any of the incidents identified above for the 2009-2010 school year will not appear in the report.

Implementation Challenges

As a result of a fatal shooting at a Tennessee high school in 2008, the Comptroller's Office of Research and Education Accountability was tasked with examining Tennessee's school safety efforts. The report was released in September 2009 and identified three specific challenges for the Tennessee Department of Education:

1. Ensure that districts and schools have sufficiently funded and implemented the policies and requirements (of the SAVE Act).
2. Monitor trends in violent incidents and school climate.
3. Evaluate the effectiveness of programs and policies.

Staff and funding to implement the requirements of the SAVE Act have decreased significantly since enactment. A staff position that was funded to assist with implementation was eliminated as part of the state government budget reductions. \$12.1 million in state and Federal funds was directed to schools in 2004 for school safety and violence prevention purposes. Elimination of the Federal Safe and Drug-Free Schools Program and ongoing reductions in

state funding has reduced that amount to approximately \$4.8 million in Federal stimulus funds that will end with the current fiscal year.

Safe Schools Act of 1998

The Safe Schools Act of 1998 (*Tenn. Code Ann. §49-6-4302*) provide funding for school safety and violence prevention activities. Each school district is eligible to receive these funds that are allocated based on the district's relative share of BEP funding. A 25 percent local match is required.

Forty-seven school districts use their Safe Schools grant funds to provide a school resource officer. Other uses of these funds typically include security enhancements such as improved building access control or monitoring and violence prevention strategies such as counselors and alternative education improvements. A listing of the (SY 2010-2011) grant awards and how these funds will be utilized may be found in Appendix D.

As noted previously, 2010-2011 Safe Schools grants were funded with federal stimulus dollars. Governor Haslam's recommended budget for 2011-2012 includes a one-time appropriation of \$ 4.8 million in state funds to sustain school safety and violence prevention activities in Tennessee schools.

Statewide School Safety Projects

Safe and Supportive Schools Grant

One of the recommendations made by the Office of Education Accountability's report on school safety was that the Department place a stronger emphasis on school climate as part of its overall strategy for supporting safe schools. The Department is one of eleven states selected to receive a new four-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education that will enable the creation of a lasting infrastructure for addressing school climate.

Goals for the new grant program include the following:

1. The development and piloting of a valid and reliable psychometric survey instrument to measure school climate (conditions for learning) which will include input from students, school personnel, and parents.
2. Provide research and information to inform state level policies and procedures, including the development and adoption of a statewide definition of school climate, school climate standards, and the formula used to assign schools a "school safety score."
3. The development of a School Climate Academy to provide ongoing, meaningful, evidence-based interventions around school safety, engagement, and school environment.

4. Establishment of working partnerships with key school and community-based stakeholders to ensure the efficient use of available resources and coordination with ongoing school improvement efforts.
5. For schools with the most fragile and challenging conditions for learning, funding will be allocated to assist with identifying and addressing specific areas of need.

The Department will be recruiting school districts to participate as pilots in the initial phase of the project beginning later this spring.

Preventing Workplace Violence

Public Chapter 1106 was enacted by the General Assembly following the February 2010 shooting of two principals at Inskip Elementary in Knoxville. The Department is charged with developing a workplace violence training program for Tennessee schools.

An advisory group of school security and human resource officials developed recommendations and the Department is currently negotiating with a nationally-recognized expert in the field to develop and deliver a three-tier training program to all school districts over the summer break. The training will specifically address the early detection of threatening behavior and management of problem behaviors.

Dropout Prevention

The Department of Education recently launched the Center for Dropout Prevention. Since that time, Department staff has been working to develop a systematic, state-wide strategy to ensure that all students graduate college and career ready. This has included working to identify Tennessee specific early warning indicators so that schools and districts can prevent, intervene, and recover students at the highest risk of educational failure. This work has also led the Center to help with the development of a state-wide early warning data system (EWDS) to identify students at risk of dropping out.

The Center for Dropout Prevention is currently creating a Dropout Prevention Toolkit and corresponding website that will be complete in early May of 2011. The overarching goal of the Center for Dropout Prevention is to support Tennessee Schools and Districts in their efforts to meet or exceed the 90% high school graduation rate by 2014-2015 and guarantee that all students graduate college and career ready.

School/Law Enforcement Partnerships

Approximately 680 law enforcement officers are specifically assigned to Tennessee schools as school resource officers. The General Assembly has established employment and training standards for School Resource Officers.

Annually, the Department requests compliance verification from local school districts. Currently, all districts in Tennessee report adhering to the requirements established by the General Assembly.

The Tennessee Department of Safety and the Governor's Office of Homeland Security continue to work closely with the Department of Education to provide training and support to schools. Working with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, school resource officers are linked into the Tennessee Fusion Center (a powerful law enforcement information network).

Mental Health Collaborations

The Department of Education has pursued collaborations with the mental health service delivery system via several different projects.

The Department continues to partner with Vanderbilt Community Mental Health Center to implement the PREPARE project. PREPARE was developed to support the creation of crisis response teams in each school district and to foster partnerships between schools and community-based mental health resources. More than 2,000 school counselors, social workers, psychologists, and other appropriate school personnel have participated in the training. In addition, a website, <http://www.tnschoolsprepare.com/>, was created to make available resources to school systems that will assist all schools in advancing and maturing the response and recovery portion of their emergency management plan. This program is funded with Federal Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities funding and will cease on June 30, 2011.

Working with Dr. Ken Strong, supervising psychologist for the Memphis City Schools Threat Assessment Team, the Department has expanded the *Guidelines for Student Threat Assessment* training to include an advanced seminar for licensed school psychologists and school social workers. The seminar addresses advanced threat/mental health assessment and behavior support issues.

Youth Suicide Prevention

During the 2006-2007 school year, the first documented self-inflicted gunshot wound in a Tennessee school occurred. The Jason Flatt Act of 2007 requires every Tennessee teacher and principal to receive in-service training on suicide prevention and awareness. The Department works closely with the Jason Foundation and the Tennessee Lives Count Project of the Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network to help schools meet the in-service mandate and to address this important issue which has been linked to targeted school shooting incidents.

Thirteen and six tenths percent of Tennessee students reported on the 2009 Youth Risk Behavior Survey that they had considered suicide at some time

during the past 12 months compared to 14.1 percent in the 2007 Youth Risk Behavior Survey.

Early Childhood Training

Tennessee Voices for Children, in collaboration with the Departments of Education, Health, Mental Health, Human Services, and Children's Services, as well as representatives of Head Start, Tennessee Early Childhood Training Alliance, Child Care Resource and Referral, Tennessee Association for the Education of Young Children and Tennessee Institutes of Higher Education, are working with early childhood caregivers and educators to prevent problem behaviors and provide individualized interventions.

The project, provided by the Center on the Social and Emotional Foundations for Early Learning (CSEFEL), seeks to embed the evidence-based practices found to develop social and emotional competence in young children ages birth to age five. Nine early childhood programs representing the three grand divisions of the state have been established as demonstration sites.

Bullying and Harassment Prevention

For the last five years, the Department has been supporting implementation of the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP) in Tennessee schools. The Olweus program is a comprehensive, school-wide model designed for use in elementary, middle, and junior high schools. Program goals are to reduce and prevent bullying problems among school children and to improve peer relations.

In addition to its impact on reducing bullying, the program is designed to improve the social climate of classrooms and reduce related antisocial behaviors such as vandalism and truancy. Tennessee is one of a limited number of states that have adopted a train-the-trainers model. The Olweus trainer certification process ensures that trainers possess the necessary skills and knowledge to implement the program with fidelity. The fourth cohort of trainers began the two-year process shortly before the release of this report. Fifty-seven (57) trainers, representing thirty-six (36) Tennessee school districts, are either certified trainers or are currently working through the certification process. The Tennessee Department of Education has also provided a more abbreviated training for school administrators entitled *When Bullying Comes to School: Addressing Bullying, Harassment, and Hazing Through Effective Policy and Practice*. The seminar provides an overview of requirements under *Tenn. Code*

Ann. 49-6-1016 relative to bullying and harassment with a particular focus upon ensuring that policy is reflected in effective practice. Additionally, the Department developed a model policy for districts, as well as a web-based resource on bullying and harassment for the general public. The Methamphetamine Awareness Project

The Methamphetamine Awareness Project is supported by a Governor's Methamphetamine Initiative Grant received from the Tennessee Department of Finance and Administration's Office of Criminal Justice Programs. The project is a three-year effort to ensure educators remain aware and proactive in responding to methamphetamine abuse and/or exposure.

Participants receive an overview of the drug and are taught how to recognize the signs and symptoms of children living in a home where methamphetamine is being produced or used. Appropriate intervention strategies are also identified and discussed.

Advancing Alternative Education in Tennessee

Alternative education has been a continued area of significant activity for the Department of Education. Students placed in alternative schools or programs often exhibit behavior that disrupts their learning and the learning of others. Moreover, students attending an alternative education setting are often at the highest risk for educational failure and dropping out of school. 2011 National Conference on Alternative Education

The National Alternative Education Association (NAEA), in collaboration with the Association for High School Innovation (AHSI), and the Tennessee Department of Education hosted the 2011 National Conference on Alternative Education. The 2011 conference was held February 9th-12th in Nashville, Tennessee at the downtown Hilton. The event promoted proactive solutions and alternatives to suspension and expulsion by examining exemplary practices in the field. Approximately 250 Tennessee educators attended the conference with along with representatives from over 40 states and 3 countries.

Conflict Resolution and Character Education In Tennessee Schools

Tenn. Code Ann. § 49-2-118 states that each local education agency shall implement for grades one through six an intervention program that utilizes conflict resolution and decision-making strategies aimed at preventing occurrences of disruptive acts by students within the school and on school property. Conflict resolution programs are intended to reduce violence by providing children with the skills, information, and practice needed to appropriately resolve conflict. Some of the interpersonal skills taught in a typical program include empathy, impulse control, problem solving, and anger management.

In 1999, *Tenn. Code Ann. § 49-6-1007* was amended to include that school systems report to the Department of Education and General Assembly information about their character education efforts and progress. Tennessee is one of 28 states that have legislation mandating or encouraging character education. Based on the language of the mandate, social, ethical, and emotional development should be an integral part of the school day. Character education can and should create school environments where students feel safe, valued, and respected and that will lead to improvements in attendance, behavior, and academics. The National Character Education Partnership (CEP) was established to provide educators with access to best practices, materials and resources. CEP, with the help of Tom Lickona, developed the “Character Education Quality Standards” (Appendix E) as a guide for implementing character development activities.

Findings

All Tennessee school districts were sent the 2009-2010 Conflict Resolution Survey. During the 2009-2010 school year, Conflict Resolution programs reached 503,031 students in 1,176 schools. Character Education programs reached 726,709 students in 1,371 schools.

Of the responding districts, 128 reported improvements in the school climate as a result of programming, 126 reported improved student behavior, and 123 reported increased student awareness action.

Conclusions

The data collected suggests that these programs have been effective in improving the overall climate of a school and improvements in student behavior. CHARACTER EDUCATION QUALITY STANDARDS

*Developed by the Character Education Partnership
Endorsed by the TN Character Education Partnership*

Principle #1: Character education promotes core ethical values as the basis of good character

Principle #2: Character is comprehensively defined to include thinking, feeling, and behavior.

Principle #3: Effective character education requires an intentional, proactive, and comprehensive approach that promotes the core values in all phases of school life.

Principle #4: The school is a caring community.

Principle #5: To develop character, the school provides students opportunities for moral action.

Principle #6: Effective character education includes a meaningful and challenging academic curriculum that respects all learners and helps them succeed.

Principle #7: Character Education should strive to develop students' intrinsic motivation for developing good character.

Principle #8: The school staff is a learning and moral community in which all share responsibility for character education and attempt to adhere to the same core values that guide the education of students.

Principle #9: Staff and students demonstrate moral leadership.

Principle #10: The school recruits parents and community members as full partners in the character-building effort.

Principle #11: Evaluation of character education assesses the character of the school, the school staff's functioning as character educators, and the extent to which students manifest good character.
