Census 2000 was the largest peacetime effort of the United States. Information about the 115.9 million housing units and 281.4 million people across the United States have been made available at various times in various formats. The most recent data to become available on the Internet is Summary File 4 for Tennessee (States became available in small groups. Not all states became available at the same time.)

Summary File 4 (SF4) has household data by race, sex, and occupation. It is primarily used by persons/businesses that want to develop an affirmative ac-

tion plan. This allows the person doing the plan to know how many people are employed in a specific geographic area. Then you are able to find the sex /racial breakouts in those occupations. This Census data is normally published by the Department of Labor and Workforce Development after it is released. Due to the late release date by the Bureau of the Census this department is currently working on publishing and putting the data on the Internet.

We have developed, in the interim, a specific set of instructions so that you can look at the data on the Census website. The instruc-

tions are located on page 2 of this publication. If the Bureau of the Census changes the Web address on their site it will change the directions on page 2. They have already changed that address twice. If you still cannot find the data, after following these directions, please contact us at 615-741-1729. Within about a month after you receive this publication the data will be available on the state Website. The data are available by statewide, counties, and metropolitan statistical areas.

Below is an example of the statewide occupational data compiled for Census 2000. These data are also available by county.




Unemployment Rates 1973 - 2002



NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR-FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for August 2003 was 5.0 percent, unchanged from the July 2003 rate. This is the 32nd consecutive month that the Tennessee unemployment rate was lower than the national rate.

The United States estimated unemployment rate was 6.1 percent in August 2003. In August 2002, the national unemployment rate was 5.8 percent, and the state unemployment rate was 4.8 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 67 counties, increased in 20 counties, and remained the same in eight counties. The lowest rate occurred in Moore County at 2.3 percent, down 0.9 percentage points from the previous month. The highest rate was Lauderdale County's 15.3 percent, up from 13.5 percent in July 2003.


Total nonfarm employment decreased by 600 jobs from August 2002 to August 2003. During this period there were seasonal decreases in construction (down 4,700 jobs), which includes a decline of 2,600 jobs in specialty trade contractors; transportation/warehousing (down 4,000 jobs), which includes a decline of 2,400 jobs in truck transportation; machinery manufacturing (down 3,200 jobs); information (down 1,700 jobs); and electrical equipment/appliance manufacturing (down 1,500 jobs).

Over the year, the largest job increases occurred in health care/social assistance (up 7,600 jobs), which includes 3,000 jobs in hospitals, 2,400 jobs in ambulatory health care services, and 1,800 jobs in nursing/residential care facilities; food services/drinking places (up 3,200 jobs); local government (up 2,900 jobs), which includes 1,600 jobs in local government educational services; administrative/support/waste management (up 2,600 jobs); retail trade (up 2,100 jobs); and wholesale trade (up 1,200 jobs).

During the past month, nonfarm employment increased by 14,700 jobs. There were seasonal increases in local government education services (up 10,000 jobs), administrative/support/waste management (up 2,000 jobs), transportation equipment manufacturing (up 1,500 jobs), and food services/drinking places (up 1,000 jobs). This was partially offset by a decrease of 1,100 jobs in other services.

TENNESSEE UNEMPLOYMENT RATES


(Seasonally Adjusted)



The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during, or received pay for, any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2002 benchmark.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,400 jobs from July to August. There was a seasonal increase in local government (up 1,800 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in leisure/hospitality (down 200 jobs). There were slight increases and decreases in various industries.

During the past 12 months total employment decreased by 500 jobs. During that time goods-producing jobs decreased by 1,600 while service-providing jobs increased by 1,100.



HOURS AND EARNINGS OF PRODUCTION WORKERS CHATTANOOGA MSA



Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,200 jobs from July to August. There were seasonal increases in local government (up 1,000 jobs), professional/business services (up 300 jobs), and educational/health services (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by a decrease of 200 jobs in other services.

During the past 12 months, total employment decreased by 500, with goods-producing jobs decreasing by 1,100 and service-providing jobs increasing by 600.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,300 jobs from July to August. There were seasonal increases in leisure/hospitality (up 600 jobs), which includes an increase of 400 jobs in food/drinking places; local government (up 400 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 400 jobs); and transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases of 200 jobs in wholesale trade, food/beverage stores, and general merchandise stores.




