## Components of Population Change for Counties: 2000 to 2005

The U.S. Census Bureau annually produces estimates of total resident population for each state and county. County population estimates are produced with a component of population change method, while the state population estimates are the sum of all county populations within the state. The data shown on Page 2 is the April 1, 2000, Census and the July 1, 2005, estimates.

Some of the data elements and definitions include the total number of live births and deaths of residents in an area during this time period, as estimated using reports from the Census Bureau's Federal-State Cooperative Program for Population Estimates and the National Center for Health Statistics.

The Census Bureau uses estimated components of population change to estimate changes in the population during a time period. These components consist of births, deaths, net international migration and net international migration.

Net internal migration is the difference between internal in-migration to an area and internal out-migration from the same area during a time period. Internal in- and out-migration consist of moves

where both the origin and the destination are in the United States (excluding Puerto Rico).

Net international migration, in its simplest form, is defined as any movement across U.S. (50 states and District of Columbia) borders. The U.S. Census Bureau makes estimates of net international migration for the nation, states, and counties. We estimate net international migration as: (1) net migration of the foreign-born, (2) net movement from Puerto Rico, (3) net movement of the U.S. Armed Forces, and (4) emigration of the native-born. The largest component, net migration of the foreign-born, includes lawful permanent residents (immigrants), temporary migrants (such as students), humanitarian migrants (such as refugees), and people illegally present in the United States. Currently, the Census Bureau does not estimate these components individually.

County and going to Rutherford, Williamson, or Sumner counties or leaving Shelby County and going to Fayette or Tipton counties. In those larger counties, there is also a large international immigration to replace people going to the suburbs.

There were 32 counties that had more deaths than births during the past five years. Any growth on their part was due to in- and out-migration.

The counties with the largest population growth in the last five years (in raw numbers) were Rutherford (36,269), Williamson (26,957), Knox (22,940), Sumner (14,560), Montgomery (12,434), Wilson (11,699), and Shelby (11,563). These counties accounted for 49.8 percent of the total population growth.

There were 18 counties that lost population during the last five years. Some of the largest losses occurred in Weakley (-1,163), Lake (-371), Carroll (-354), Sullivan (-332), Lauderdale (-306), and Obion (-237). Of these six counties, five of them are in rural West Tennessee.

## The County Data

The most interesting phenomenon is the large out-migration in the largest counties in the state (except Knox County). As expected, there is a large in-migration in the suburban counties. The data shows those persons leaving Davidson




Unemployment Rates 1976-2005

### MONTHLY INITIAL CLAIMS





## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for August was 5.7 percent, down 0.2 tenths from the July rate. This is the 25th consecutive month that the rate is above the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.7 percent in August 2006. In August 2005, the national unemployment rate was 4.9 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.6 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 74 counties, increased in eight counties, and remained the same in 13 counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.5 percent, down 0.1 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Lawrence County's 11.3 percent, down from 13.8 percent in July 2006.

During this period, there were increases in accommodation/food services (up 7,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 6,000 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,200 jobs in accommodation; retail trade (up 7,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,300 jobs in general merchandise stores, 1,300 jobs in building material/garden equipment/supplies, health/personal care stores and motor vehicle parts dealers; health care/social assistance (up 6,100 jobs), which includes an increase of

2,800 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 2,200 jobs in hospitals; construction (up 3,300 jobs); professional/scientific/technical services (up 3,000 jobs); local government (up 3,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in local government educational services; wholesale trade (up 1,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; arts/entertainment/recreation (up 1,700 jobs); and transportation/warehousing (up 1,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,100 jobs in truck transportation. This was partially offset by declines of 1,400 jobs in food/


beverage stores and transportation equipment manufacturing and 1,200 jobs in administrative/support/waste management, 1,100 jobs in computer/electronic product manufacturing.

During August, nonfarm employment increased by 20,200 jobs. There were seasonal increases in local government educational services (up 10,000 jobs), administrative/support/waste management (up 3,000 jobs), education/health services (up 1,500 jobs), retail trade (up 1,200 jobs), and motor vehicle parts manufacturing (up 1,000 jobs).

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2005 benchmark.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 700 jobs from July 2006 to August 2006. There was a seasonal increase in local government (up 1,400 jobs). This was partially offset by a decrease in trade/transportation/utilities (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 1,800 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 900, and service-providing jobs increased by 900.






