State Forest Timber Sale Summary

Philip Morrissey

- Timber sales for FY 2020 were \$2.48 million, short of meeting revenue target \$3.2 million. Overall, market decreases and instability due to COVID 19 threat may have been contributing factors in the reduced realized prices.
- Total managed acres sold were 1,131 acres. State Forest Timber Sale Summary was provided and will be included as an attachment to these minutes.

FY2021 and FY2022 budget review

Recap of current FY2020 budget



- ➤ The Division of Forestry saved \$500,000 due to early hiring freeze and suspension of spending.
- ➤ Out of state deployment commenced in June 2020 and generated \$120, 000 of revenue that will be applied to FY2020
- Information was provided to show how Tennessee Division of Forestry spent funds, how time was utilized by personnel and how funds were generated.

Budget FY2021

Fiscal year 2021 started July 1, 2020. Tennessee Department of Finance and Administration (F&A) asked each department within state government for a twelve (12%) percent budget reduction.

- ➤ The twelve (12%) percent budget reduction was approximately \$2.6 million for Division of Forestry initially. It was later reduced to 7.7% (\$1.67 million).
- The department made reductions in other divisions to reduce the impact on Forestry.
- ➤ Information was provided showing budget operational expenditure details. Savings was shown as a result of reductions in FY2021 budget.

Budget FY2022

- Fiscal year 2022 will start July 1, 2021. The Department was requested to identify a two (2%) percent reduction in addition to the FY2021 reduction plan. The Division of Forestry's contribution to this reduction target is roughly \$100,000 in real estate savings.
- ➤ The July 2021 work program will contain both the FY21 and FY 22 reduction amounts.
- Capital Maintenance and Capital Improvement projects were discussed for FY2022 and have not been approved. These projects are moving forward through the budgeting process to be considered for approval.

Approval to accept the budget as presented

John Charles Wilson motioned to approve the FY2022 budget. Sharon Jean-Philippe seconded the motion. All Commission members voted yes to approve: Johnny Heard, Tom Midyett, John Charles Wilson, Mike Witt, Bob Qualman, Sharon Jean-Philippe. Alex Richman (remotely). The motion passed.

Potential emergency relief support opportunities for forest landowners from FSA and NRCS. Brandi Broughton (FSA Agricultural Program Specialist) and Jamie Carpenter (NRCS Assistant State Conservationist for Programs).

- Handouts were given explaining the Environmental Qualitative Incentive Program (EQIP). EQIP will provide financial assistance in the event of a natural disaster.
- A conservation plan can be considered for a waiver and if approved work can begin before a contract is initiated. Landowners can be reimbursed for work that has been completed.
- Emergency Watershed Program (EWP) can assist homeowners in flood plain areas.
- Handouts were provided explaining the Emergency Forest Restoration Program (EFRP) thru the Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Coronavirus Agriculture and Forestry Business Fund (CAFB)

Neil Owens

This program was allocated \$50 million dollars under the CARES Act for Agriculture and Forestry businesses.

- Agriculture had more applications than any other commodity. There was a total of 1004 applications and Agriculture accounted for 18% of the total.
- There was a total of 183 Forestry applications; 112 loggers, 69 sawmills and 1 forestry manufacturer.
- Forestry was allocated \$12 million dollars
- All funds must be disbursed to applicants by December 30, 2020.

Emergency Response Process, deployments and fiResonse update

Wade Waters

- Tennessee Division of Forestry emergency response has deployed approximately 150 personnel this year. Emergency Response teams have supported 10 states and assisted the Federal government by providing resources.
- There has not been any COVID related issues.
- Received reimbursements in FY2020 for providing out of state resources.
- Live production version of fiResponse was received July 1, 2020.
- Tennessee Division of Forestry is 1 of 9 states that have the fiResponse program.
- Potential outlook for Fall fire season is projected to be a low fire season due to the amount of moisture.

Forest Landscape Level Plan

Brian Hughett

Similar to individual plan; more detailed



- Reference for foresters on forest management
- Supported by FSP and ATFS guidelines
- There are eight states including Tennessee in Southeastern area of the U.S. at varying stages of implementing landscape management plans.

Forest Data and Analysis Unit update

Rachel Greene

- The division has received 5 unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV).
- Units will be used for general forestry work, cruising stands, monitoring forest health issues, deployment and communication.
- Two units are equipped with infrared detection of hotspots for firefighting.
- Drone Small UAV pilot license and training will be obtained for ten to twelve personnel initially.

Public Comments

• Tom Midyett requested to form a committee to meet with USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Director. Bob Qualman, David Arnold and John Charles Wilson volunteered to be on the committee. This committee will meet with director of FSA on how the Division and FSA can work more collaboratively in providing resources to Tennessee landowners.

State Forest Timber Sales Summary FY 2020

8/28/2020

Summary

Timber sales for FY 2020 performed well overall as scheduled sales sold and brought \$2.48 million. However the revenue target of \$3.2 million was not reached. A major challenge was adapting bid opening procedures for Covid-19 safety protocols, but Division staff identified several technological solutions and overcame this obstacle. Overall market decreases and instability due to the Covid-19 threat may have been significant factors in reduced realized prices. Somewhat lower volumes and quality of timber (not as much veneer as past years) were also a factor. 69% of the annual allowable cut acres were sold, up from 66% last year. Our overall goals of regenerating and properly managing state forest lands were successfully achieved.




Figure 1. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest timber sales and percentages of sales by state forest.




Figure 2. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest managed acres and percentages of acres by state forest.




Figure 3. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest total volume (Int.) and percentages of volume by state forest




Figure 4. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest Average Value per managed acre* by state forest.




Figure 5. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest Average Value per Thousand Board Foot (MBF) of timber by state forest.




Figure 6. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest Pine Sales totals by state forest.




Figure 7. State fiscal year 2020 total state forest Hardwood Sales totals by state forest.




Figure 8. State fiscal year 2020 Average Value per Acre of Pine sales by state forest.




Figure 9. State fiscal year 2020 Average Value per Acre of Hardwood sales by state forest.






Figure 10. State fiscal year 2020 Average Value per Thousand Board Foot (MBF) of Pine sales by state forest




Figure 11. State fiscal year 2020 Average Value per Thousand Board Foot (MBF) of Hardwood sales by state forest
