Dear Ms. Agee-Duff,

The Department of Human Services (DHS) - Division of Audit Services staff conducted a limited desk review of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) at Kiddie Korner, Too (Sponsor), Application Agreement number 00-345 during the period of March 31, 2020, through June 17, 2020. Our scope of the review was for reimbursement made to the Sponsor for February 2020.

Due to the outbreak and the risk that COVID19 poses to the Sponsor and our staff, the review was limited to verification, based on review of the documents obtained from Sponsor, via e-mail, mail, or other electronic transmissions of documents. We also obtained confirmation from the feeding sites and Sponsor staff via telephone or e-mail relative to the operation and administration of the CACFP.

The purpose of this review was to determine if the Sponsor complied with USDA regulations set through the COVID-19 period, taking into consideration the waivers granted to the Sponsor's operation. Also, to determine if the Sponsor complied with the applicable *Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) applicable parts, provider agreements, and applicable Federal and State regulations.

Based on our review of the Sponsor's records and information provided, the Sponsor had six (6) feeding sites operating during the review period. Kiddie Korner of Athens (Athens), Kiddie Korner of Madisonville (Madisonville), and Kiddie Korner of Wartburg (Wartburg) were selected as the sample feeding sites.

Background

CACFP Sponsors utilize meal count sheets to record the number of breakfast, lunch, supper, and supplement meals served. Meals served by participating Sponsors must meet the minimum guidelines set by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and DHS to be eligible for reimbursement. The CACFP Sponsor reports the number of meals served through

the DHS Tennessee Information Payment System (TIPS) for reimbursement.

We inspected meal counts sheets for our test period and reconciled the meals claimed to the meals reported as served for each meal service. We also assessed compliance with civil rights requirements.

Our review of the Sponsor's records for February 2020 disclosed the following:

1. The Sponsor did not provide documentation to support sufficient quantities of milk were purchased for all meals reported

Condition

Based on the number of meals served with milk as a component, the Sponsor did not provide documentation to support the purchase of sufficient quantity of milk to be available with the meals that were claimed at the sampled feeding sites. The deficiencies are as follows:

As a result, 1,271 breakfast meals and 12 lunch meals claimed for reimbursement were disallowed.

Criteria

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.17(b)(4) states, "Each child care center participating in the Program shall claim only the meal types specified in its approved application in accordance with the meal pattern requirements specified in §226.20...."

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.20 I(1) states, in part, "Fluid milk, vegetables or fruit, or portions of both, and grains are required components of the breakfast meal."

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.20 I(2) states, "Fluid milk, meat and meat alternatives, vegetable, fruits and grains are required components in the lunch and supper meals."

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.20(a)(1) states, "Fluid milk must be served as a beverage or on cereal, or a combination of both, as follows: (i) Children one year of age must be served unflavored whole milk. (ii) years old. Children two through five years old must be served either unflavored low-fat (1 percent) or unflavored fat-free (skim) milk. (iii). Children six years old and older must be served milk that is low-fat (1 percent fat or less) or fat-

free (skim). Milk may be unflavored or flavored from July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019 (school year 2018-2019)." (iv). Adults must be served milk that is low-fat (1 percent fat or less) or fat-free (skim). Milk may be unflavored or flavored from July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019 (school year 2018-2019). Six ounces (weight) or 3/4 cup (volume) of yogurt may be used to fulfill the equivalent of 8 ounces of fluid milk once per day. Yogurt may be counted as either a fluid milk substitute or as a meat alternate, but not as both in the same meal."

Recommendation

The Sponsor should ensure that sufficient quantity of milk is available and served with the meals claimed for reimbursement and maintain the documents to support the milk purchases.

2. The Sponsor reported meal counts incorrectly

Condition

Athens - sample site

Based on our review of the Claim for Reimbursement for February 2020, the Sponsor reported 1,144 breakfast meals, 1,379 lunch meals, and 1,296 supplements served. However, based on our review of available documents, we noted there were 1,153 breakfast meals, 1,481 lunch meals, and 1,300 supplements served, prior to any meal disallowances.

As a result, nine (9) breakfast meals, two (2) lunch meals and four (4) supplements were underreported. (See Exhibit B)

Madisonville – sample site

Based on our review of the Claim for Reimbursement for February 2020, the Sponsor reported 776 breakfast meals, 1,027 lunch meals, and 1,052 supplements served. However, based on our review of available documents, we noted there were 778 breakfast meals, 1,029 lunch meals, and 1,052 supplements served, prior to any meal disallowances.

As a result, two (2) breakfast meals and two (2) lunch meals were underreported. (See Exhibit C)

Wartburg - sample site

Based on our review of the Claim for Reimbursement for February 2020, the Sponsor reported 354 breakfast meals, 423 lunch meals, and 507 supplements served. However, based on our review of available documents, we noted there were 354 breakfast meals, 423 lunch meals, and 506 supplements served, prior to any meal disallowances.

As a result, one (1) supplement meal was overreported. (See Exhibit D)

This is a repeat finding from a previous report dated December 20, 2017

Criteria

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.10(c) states, "... In submitting a Claim for Reimbursement, each institution shall certify that the claim is correct and that records are available to support that claim..."

Recommendation

The Sponsor should ensure that claims for reimbursement are completed correctly and based on accurate supporting documents.

3. The Sponsor provided menus that did not meet the USDA meal pattern requirements

Condition

Based on our review of the menus provided by the Sponsor for February 2020, the menus provided did not meet the USDA meal pattern requirements. The menus provided had deficiencies as follows:

Due to the new CACP meal patterns requirements and emphasis on providing technical assistance during the implementation process, there were no lunch meals disallowed.

<u>Criteria</u>

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.17(b)(4) states, "Each childcare center participating in the Program shall claim only the meal types specified in its approved application in accordance with the meal pattern requirements specified in §226.20 ..."

Title 7 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Section 226.14 (b) states, "In the event that the State agency finds that an institution which prepares its own meals is failing to meet the meal pattern requirements of 226.20, the State agency need not disallow payment or collect an overpayment arising out of such failure if the institution takes such other action as, in the opinion of the State agency, will have a corrective effect."

Recommendation

The Sponsor should ensure that all meals prepared meet the meal patterns established by the USDA, and menus should be reviewed to ensure they contain all required meal components to be eligible as a reimbursable meal.

Technical Assistance Provided

The Sponsor was provided with technical assistance regarding monitoring requirements and documentation as well as general record keeping.

Disallowed Meals Cost

Based on the review, we determined that the Sponsor's noncompliance with the applicable Federal and State regulations that govern the CACFP resulted in a total disallowed cost of \$1,439.04.

Corrective Action

The Sponsor must complete the following actions within 30 days from the date of this report:

- Log into the Tennessee Information Payment System (TIPS) and revise the claim submitted for February 2020, which contains the verified claim data from the enclosed exhibits. <u>Please note that, if the claim is revised</u>, TIPS will automatically deduct the overpayment from your next CACFP claim for reimbursement. <u>OR</u>
- If you are no longer participating in the CACFP program, remit a check payable to the
 Tennessee Department of Human Services in the amount noted in the report for
 recovery of the amounts disallowed in this report. *Please return the attached billing notice with your check*; and
- Prepare and submit a corrective action plan to address the deficiencies identified in this
