

REVIEW COMPONENTS

The Tennessee Educator Preparation Policy focuses on improving the process of program approval and the review cycle by including annual reports with specific metrics that will be reported across EPPs. This will lead to a more robust comprehensive review and, ultimately, to a statewide landscape of highly effective EPPs.

Annual Reports provide detailed, candidate-level data for each EPP every year. They offer evidence of the effectiveness of EPPs for the purpose of ongoing approval and to drive continuous improvement. The Annual Reports mimic the metrics of the Report Card, but they are disaggregated by program area.

Interim Reviews occur when an Annual Report or series of Annual Reports indicate a provider or program is below standards.

Focus Reviews occur when a provider does not meet one or more standards during the Comprehensive Review.

The Report Card is a high-level report produced for each EPP every year that presents aggregated data for use by external stakeholders. The primary purpose is to offer transparent information about EPP effectiveness.

Together, data from these reports will be analyzed during the periodic Comprehensive Reviews.



Also, the data could trigger the need for an interim review within the seven vear cycle.



For existing EPPs, a Comprehensive Review occurs every seven years.

A trained review team will consider a set of standardized evidence related to each of the CAEP Standards, Professional Education Standards, and Specialty Area Standards

For a new EPP operating with conditional approval, a Comprehensive Review is conducted to grant full approval. The Comprehensive Review must take place within five years but can take place as soon as the EPP has three years of Annual Reports.

METRICS FOR ANNUAL REPORTS AND REPORT CARD

The current process used to approve EPPs and their specialty area programs (SAPs) places too much focus on inputs and not enough on outcomes and impact. The revised approval process will enable the Tennessee Department of Education to make recommendations based on outcomes and impact associated with effective teaching.



^{*}The department is currently developing completer and employer satisfaction surveys. These surveys will be piloted in fall 2016 and subsequently added to the Report Card and Annual Reports. 2

OVERVIEW OF APPROVAL PROCESS

With the introduction of Annual Reports, the process for approving Tennessee EPPs will transition from an infrequent, input-oriented review to an ongoing analysis more focused on program outcomes and impact.

Conditional Approval



Annual Reports are generated for every EPP each year.

EPPs can operate under conditional approval for up to five years before undergoing a Comprehensive Review to grant full approval. However, they can apply for full approval when they have three Annual Reports.

Full Approval



Annual Reports are generated for every EPP each year.

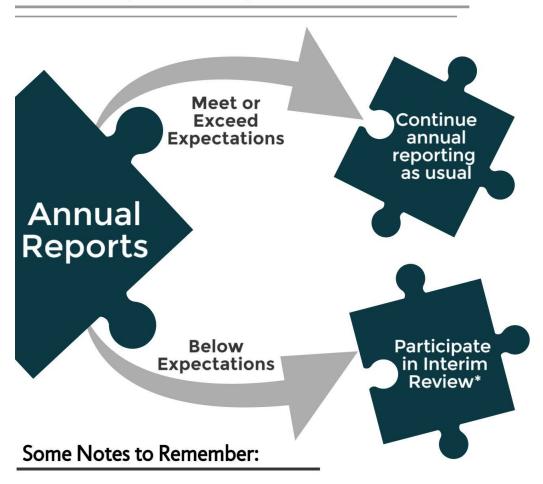
All EPPs receive Annual Reports each year and are required to undergo a Comprehensive Review at least every seven years.

Interim or Focus Review

Falling below expectations on Annual Reports will trigger an Interim Review prior to the scheduled comprehensive review. Similarly, falling below expectations during the comprehensive review, will trigger a Focus Review.

IMPACT OF ANNUAL REPORTS

The Tennessee Educator Preparation Policy focuses on improving the process of program approval and the review cycle by including Annual Reports with specific metrics used to assess program effectiveness. The policy provides opportunity for the TDOE to conduct an Interim Review based on Annual Reports that suggest a provider or program is not meeting expectations.



- Annual Reports will be generated for each EPP every year.
- ➤ EPPs can operate under conditional approval for up to five years before undergoing a Comprehensive Review to grant full approval. However, they can apply for full approval when they have three Annual Reports.
 - To receive full approval, the EPP will undergo a Comprehensive Review, which examines Annual Reports, CAEP Standards, Professional Education Standards, and Specialty Area Standards.
- ➤ An EPP that is operating with full approval will receive Annual Reports and will have a comprehensive review every seven years.
- Falling below expectations on Annual Reports may initiate an Interim Review prior to the scheduled comprehensive review.

^{*}The department and SBE are currently engaged in the process of establishing expectations related to each metric. Once these expectations have been established, the department will public specific guidelines related to interim reviews (e.g., what triggers an interim review, what is the interim review process, etc.)

CAEP STANDARDS

CAEP is the national accrediting agency that reviews the quality of EPPs across the country. CAEP has published a set of five standards that focus on inputs, outputs, and outcomes. All Tennessee EPPs must present evidence for each CAEP Standard during the Comprehensive Review.

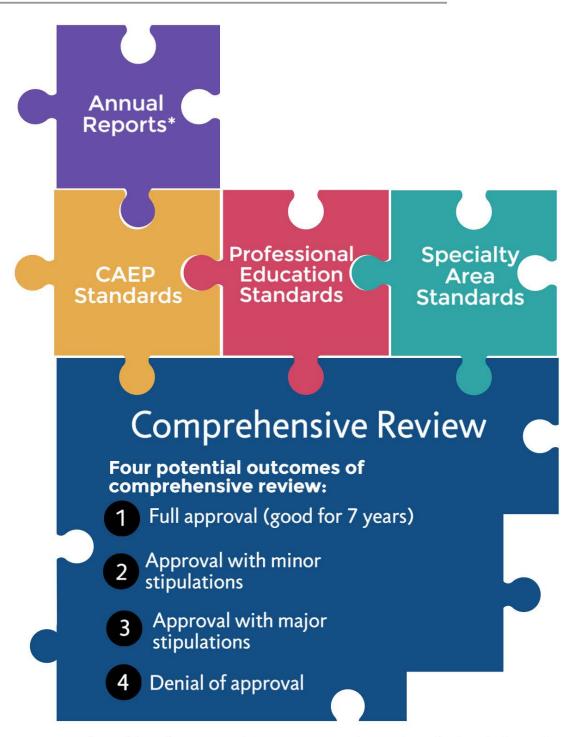

COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW

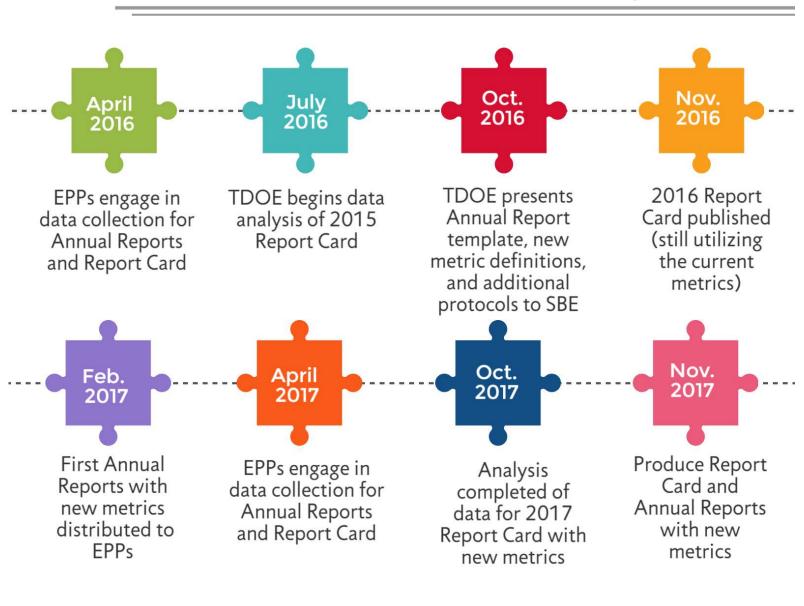
The comprehensive review process is used to move a program from conditional approval to full approval. Once an EPP has achieved full approval the Comprehensive Review is conducted once every seven years. The Comprehensive Review considers evidence related to each of the CAEP standards and incorporates Annual Report data.



^{*}The metrics analyzed by the Annual Reports are aligned with CAEP Standard 4. This standard focuses attention on the effectiveness of educators prepared by EPPs.

KEY DATES

Over the next two years, the TDOE will be engaged in significant work to implement the new Educator Preparation Policy. Additionally, the TDOE will generate the first Annual Reports and support the revision of the Report Card with improved data visualization and new metrics. These are a few of the notable highlights as the EPP policies are implemented, which will ultimately result in more transparency and better data for schools and the public and a stronger review process.



TIMELINE

The development and implementation of new standards, tools, protocols, and metrics is complex work that will be refined over the next several years. While the moments below are subject to change, the TDOE is planning for the pace of the work in these areas to follow general progression outlined below.
