SUBJECT: Regional Jail Study – Remaining Funds

Public Chapter 554 of 2009 appropriated \$200,000 to TACIR for a "regional jails feasibility study." The study assessed the feasibility of a regional jail for Clay, Fentress, Overton, and Pickett Counties and was completed in July 2010. TACIR used approximately \$125,000 of the appropriated funds to compensate a jail consultant, meaning that there is \$75,000 remaining from the original appropriation. TACIR staff is requesting guidance from Commissioners regarding how to utilize the remaining funds.

TACIR staff has identified three potential options:

1. Retain the money for future regional jail analyses

Presumably, if TACIR were directed to do an additional regional jail feasibility study, the funds could be used for this purpose.

2. Return the money to the State

Staff did not identify any law which would prevent the money from being returned to the State.

3. Distribute the money to Tennessee counties to further study regional jail issues

Three counties have contacted TACIR with an interest in using the remaining funds for a jail study: Clay, Fentress, and Morgan. Requests from each county are detailed below.

Clay County

- Clay County was one of the four counties involved in the TACIR regional jail feasibility study.
- In a letter to TACIR, Clay County Mayor Dale Reagan stated that the county's plan for the future involves working with Pickett and Overton Counties.
- Clay County is interested in using the remaining funds to further analyze the county's regional jail options.

Fentress County

- Fentress County was one of the four counties involved in the TACIR regional jail feasibility study.
- Fentress County Executive Frank Smith sent a letter to TACIR stating that the county intends to pursue a new county jail facility instead of participating in a regional jail.
- County Executive Smith stated that Fentress County is interested in using TACIR's regional jail consultant to assist with planning, programming, design, and construction of a new facility.

Morgan County

- Morgan County was not one of the four counties involved in the TACIR regional jail feasibility study.
- Morgan County is interested in using the remaining funds to study potential uses for the vacant Brushy Mountain State Prison building.
- A regional jail might be one potential use for the building.

Staff Opinion

- Since TACIR was created by statute, it may exercise only those powers granted by the legislature. The language in PC 554 specified that the funds were appropriated to TACIR for a "regional jails feasibility study."
- Staff has spoken with TACIR's budget analyst who believed that it would be permissible for TACIR to distribute the remaining funds to counties to study the feasibility of regional jails.
- It is the staff's opinion that TACIR may not allocate the remaining funds to Fentress County to develop a new single county jail because this would be outside the scope of the language in PC 554.
- It is the staff's opinion that TACIR could only allocate funds to Fentress County if the analysis included a regional partnership as an option.
- It is the staff's opinion that TACIR could allocate funds to Clay County and/or Morgan County for regional jail analysis.
- Staff requests guidance from the Commission on this matter.

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
