• Landon Woods – <u>Hands On Nashville</u>

Landon Woods, Environmental AmeriCorps Member at Hands On Nashville (HON), always had a strong interest in socio-economic issues. To get involved, however, he needed a point of entry. "It's easy to live in a bubble," said Landon. "My AmeriCorps position has allowed me to engage communities and people that I hadn't interacted with previously."

As part of the HON team, Landon shapes environmental and sustainability programs and projects by building capacity for local organizations aligned with such impact areas. He also plans collaborative

projects to address critical environmental issues, such as water quality, invasive species, access to natural places, and preserving Nashville's urban forests. Landon sees AmeriCorps as a great learning opportunity. "Knowledge without practical experience can be a waste," he said. "The AmeriCorps position at HON allowed me to not only make the immediate impact I wanted, but also allowed me to participate in the bigger conversation concerned with affordable housing and poverty in Nashville".

HON recently partnered with Rebuilding Together Nashville to extend HON's Home Energy Savings (HES) Program. Program volunteers help weather-proof local homes, which lowers utility bills for residents while creating sustainable change. Working with one client in a fast-changing West Nashville neighborhood, the project gave Landon insight into the project's true impact: the small changes added up to big savings for the homeowner, who expressed her gratitude to Landon and his crew. AmeriCorps has fortified Landon's plans for grad school. In six months, he'll finish the program prepared to use his knowledge for social good.

There are currently 21 AmeriCorps members serving and learning in Chattanooga's schools through the Project Inspire teacher residency. AmeriCorps member Jonathan Ramirez was no stranger to the inequities faced by his students on his first day of class. He had worked with several local nonprofits, including the local YMCA, where he discovered his passion for working with students while supporting an afterschool program. Around that time, he began looking for teacher preparation programs, even considering ones as far away as Arizona and Illinois. But when he heard about Project Inspire, he decided "Why should I go to another part of the country to make a difference, when I can do that right here, in my own community?"

He's now a teacher resident at East Side Elementary, focusing on improving his 1st graders' literacy skills and becoming the best teacher he can be. It's a tough job, but his students inspire him. At the beginning of the year, one of Jonathan's

students was struggling to learn English and keep up with his schoolwork. But seeing the hard work his student put in every day reminds Jonathan, "He's trying his best everyday, so why shouldn't I try mine?"

After his year as an AmeriCorps member, Jonathan will continue teaching in high-need schools in Chattanooga. He's already accepted a position at one of the highest-need elementary schools in Chattanooga for the upcoming school year. In a community where only 45% of k-8th grade students are proficient in reading, Jonathan, with his intentional training and practice in improving literacy, will make a huge difference in lives of many students for years to come.
