




East Fork Stones River - Hollis Creek Watershed Priority Area


The East Fork Stones River - Hollis Creek Watershed is a high priority area for forest management outreach. It is greater than 50 percent forested, faces significant threat to development and provides most of the public water supply for at least one water intake.

As such, it depends upon a healthy forest condition to supply abundant clean water. For this reason, this watershed will be the focus of active outreach for forest stewardship planning and application of forestry practices to sustain its quantity and quality of water.

Forested parcels will be priority areas for Forest Stewardship Plans.



Non-forested parcels bordering streams will be priority areas for cost share implementation.



Procedures:

- Identify priority parcels within public water supply watersheds.
- Cross-reference for past and current stewardship or forest management activity.
- Contact identified priority parcel landowners to provide outreach materials.
- Develop Forest Stewardship Plans (FSP) for forested priority parcels in identified watersheds.
- Implement forestry practices on non-forested riparian priority parcels in identified watersheds.





Figure 2- Non-forested riparian zone acres and ownership units by ownership size class for a portion of East Fork Stones River-Hollis Creek Watershed (12HUC), Tennessee (2011)
