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COMPARISON OF 2000 AND 2001 COUNTY POPULATION

The United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census has recently released 2001 population estimates for Tennessee and the 95 counties that compose the state.

According to the Bureau of the Census the population for the state is 5,740,021. This is an increase of 37,994 from the previous year's July 1 estimate

(See table on page 2).

The Population Division of the Bureau of the Census gives estimates of statewide and county population each July 1. The estimating methodology has remained unchanged for more than 20 years.

The most recent decennial census data of April 1, 2000 were used. These census data are

updated with information for births, deaths, internal migration, and international migration that have occurred from the census date to the date of the population estimate.

For the net migration component, the bureau relies on an annual extract of tax returns to develop net migration rates for the population under age 65 for the counties.

ABOUT THE NUMBERS . . .

The largest county is Shelby with 896,013. It is followed (in order) by Davidson, Knox, Hamilton, Rutherford, Sullivan, Montgomery, Sumner, Williamson, and Washington counties. The rankings of these counties remains unchanged from 2000.

Of the top five counties, only Knox and Rutherford increased in population. The largest total increase

in population from 2000 to 2001 was in Rutherford County with 6,680 more people (up 3.6 percent). Williamson County increased by 5,731 persons (4.5 percent) during the same time period.

The smallest county is Pickett County with 5,048 persons. The smallest ten counties (in order from the bottom) are Pickett, Van Buren, Moore, Hancock, Trousdale, Perry, Lake,

Houston, Clay, and Jackson counties.

All of these counties except for Jackson County have a population less than 10,000. The population difference between Jackson and Clay counties is 3,244 (41 percent). In the last year Houston and Clay counties changed ranking. All the other county rankings remained unchanged.




Unemployment Rates 1972 - 2001



Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for June was 4.8 percent, down two-tenths of a percentage point from the May rate. This is the 18th consecutive month that the Tennessee unemployment rate was equal to or lower than the national rate.

The United States estimated unemployment rate was 5.9 percent in June 2002. In June 2001, the national unemployment rate was 4.6 percent, and the state unemployment rate was 4.4 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in 86 counties, decreased in five counties, and remained the same in four counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at


3.0 percent, up 0.3 percentage points from the previous month. The highest rate was Morgan County's 12.6 percent, up from 10.9 percent in May.

Total nonagricultural employment decreased by 5,800 jobs from June 2001 to June 2002. During this period there was growth in services (up 16,500 jobs), which included 3,400 jobs in health services, 2,900 jobs in business services, and 2,100 jobs in amusement/recreation services; local government and eating/drinking places were both up 2,900 jobs.

Over the year, the largest job losses occurred in transportation (down 5,700 jobs); construction (down 3,200 jobs); wholesale trade (down 2,400 jobs); industrial machinery/equipment (down

2,300 jobs); primary metal industries and general merchandise stores (both down 1,900 jobs); apparel/other fabricated products (down 1,700 jobs); federal government (down 1,500 jobs); and food stores (down 1,400 jobs).


During the past month, total employment decreased by 9,100 jobs. There were seasonal declines in local government education (down 11,400 jobs) and state government education (down 3,900 jobs). There were seasonal increases in services (up 3,800 jobs), which included employment growth in hotels/other lodging places (up 2,300 jobs) and amusement/recreation services (up 2,000 jobs).



The data from all the nonagricultural employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonagricultural wage and salary employees who worked during, or received pay for, any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2001 benchmark.

Total nonagricultural employment decreased by 2,100 jobs from May to June. There were seasonal decreases in local government (down 2,100 jobs) and services and primary metal industries (both down 200 jobs).


During the past 12 months total employment increased by 300 jobs. During that time goods-producing jobs decreased by 1,400 while service-producing jobs increased by 1,700.
