Chairman’s Report

Mr. White commented on the productive work session earlier in the day and noted the excellent presentations and good discussion on the items presented. He then called on Dr. Rhoda for his report.

Executive Director’s Report/Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation

Dr. Rhoda began his report by clarifying the list of attachments to the official copy of the minutes. Dr. Rhoda then congratulated Mr. Johnson who will be receiving the Arthur S. Holman Lifetime Achievement Award in Memphis on February 1. Mr. Johnson thanked Dr. Rhoda for his support and the support of those who will be attending the award ceremony.

Dr. Rhoda commented on the new working partnership with Randy Boyd in his capacity as special advisor to the Governor for higher education. Dr. Rhoda noted the previous working relationship with Mr. Boyd through his leadership at Knox Achieves, now Tn Achieves.

Dr. Rhoda commented on the orientation session for new members last week, which included a tour of Nashville State Community College and the Tennessee Technology Center, Nashville. Mr. Cope commended Dr. Rhoda and the staff for the quality of the information in the orientation that clarifies the work of the Commission. Dr. Rhoda then recognized Mike Krause to provide information on a new program.

Mr. Krause stated that new program, the Core to College Initiative, is a two-year, \$400,000 award by the Lumina Foundation, the Hewlett Foundation, and the Gates Foundation to build linkages between K-12 and higher education on the common core standards. He stated that this initiative will provide a position at THEC with the sole purpose of K-12 alignment and the common core standards; convene institutions with their Local Education Agencies to build partnerships with mutual benefits in regard to teacher preparation; and to close the education gap in math and English.

Dr. Rhoda then recognized Dr. Russ Deaton to provide information on an outcomes-based funding formula policy initiative. Dr. Deaton stated that since the formula was in its third year of implementation, feedback has been provided to THEC in regard to the impact on the campus level; including increased graduation rates and increased degree production. He advised that THEC received a significant grant from the Ford Foundation to study the impact of the outcomes-based funding formula.

Dr. Rhoda then commented on the Boosting Transfer Student Success program, a program to enhance student transferability among institutions and reduce time to degree with the education core and increase college completion. He stated that the program has had a positive impact on most disciplines.

In closing, Dr. Rhoda recognized the four new staff members: Scott Sloan, General Counsel, succeeding Will Burns; Kim Martin, in the policy, planning, and research division; Herbert Brown, academic affairs division; and Chris Tarnaki, in the fiscal division, replacing Scott Boelscher.

Systems' Reports

Tennessee Board of Regents

Mr. John Morgan, Chancellor of the Tennessee Board of Regents, was recognized to present his report. Chancellor Morgan began his report by congratulating Dr. Rhoda for recently being elected as chairman of the board of The Elephant Sanctuary.

Chancellor Morgan briefed the Commission on the recently released US News World report on institutional rankings, stating that the University of Memphis has been ranked among the top 10 national universities in terms of the percentage of graduates with internships. He also stated that the report reflected that Tennessee Technological University was recognized for having a low student debt burden and also one of the lowest default rates. Chancellor Morgan commented on Walters State Community College's recognition from APPLE for its mobile learning initiatives, noting that each academic division has developed a plan to use mobile devices in instruction; over 60 apps have been developed so far.

Chancellor Morgan commented on the Governor's recognition of Dr. Tristen Denley for his work on the Degree Compass program. He also commented on the Chattanooga State Community College's winning of the Bell Weather award for cutting-edge trend-setting programs. In closing, Chancellor Morgan discussed the new partnership with Nissan and TTC Murfreesboro, noting the joint use of the new facility.

University of Tennessee

Dr. Joe DiPietro, President, the University of Tennessee, was recognized to present his report. He began his report by congratulating Chancellor Morgan on the institutional rankings and the success of those institutions. He then commented on the Governor's 2013-14 funding recommendation for UT, stating it was a solid budget but expressed concern of the lack of funds for the non-formula units. President DiPietro then discussed accountability scorecards presented to the Commission that outline the university's five strategic plan goals, and will be periodically reviewed to provide updates on each goal. He also discussed the potential to develop partnerships with the TBR system for on line programs and noted that an implementation team is in place and will increase effectiveness and efficiency.

In closing, Dr. DiPietro commented on the University of Tennessee Chattanooga Chancellor search, noting the finalists that would be interviewed next week and the new chancellor would be selected at the February board meeting.

Action Items

Academic Program – UTHSC Master of Medical Science Physician Assistant

Ms. Betty Dandridge Johnson, Associate Executive Director for Academic Affairs, presented the recommendation for the new academic program. Ms. Dandridge Johnson stated that the proposed Master of Medical Science program in Physician Assistant (MMS-PA) is a clinical program focused on training physician assistants working under the supervision of licensed physicians. She also stated that the proposed program will equip students with a significant amount of clinical experience, integrate the academic outcomes espoused by the accrediting body, and also provide a foundation of research and scholarly practices for students to build on throughout their careers as Physician Assistants. Ms. Dandridge Johnson noted that the proposed program is aligned with the institution’s mission and will be funded through campus reallocations and additional tuition revenues generated by the program. Mr. White called for a motion to approve the proposed Master of Medical Science program in Physician Assistant. Mayor A C Wharton made a motion to approve. Information Items

Academic Program Review

Mr. Mike Krause, Assistant Executive Director for Academic Affairs, was recognized to provide an update on the academic program review. Mr. Krause summarized the review process and noted that academic programs must be characterized by careful planning and evaluation to ensure adequate levels of degree production, minimized levels of redundancy in degree offerings, and a continued focus on the unique mission of each institution.

He stated that approval of new academic programs occurs at each regular THEC meeting and all program proposals are required to address a range of issues related to the Complete College Tennessee Act. Beginning July 2011, approval of new programs at the community colleges was delegated to the Tennessee Board of Regents.

He noted that the review provides a holistic view of the status of degree programs throughout the state, including: program activity report, post approval monitoring, program productivity review, and performance funding qualitative reviews and noted that the most productive programs at the bachelor and graduate level are in the teacher preparation programs.

GEAR UP/College Access Challenge Grant, and Latino Student Success Grant Status Report

Mr. Troy Grant, THEC Director of College Access Initiatives, was recognized to provide a status report on programs managed by the Office of P-16 Initiatives. He updated the Commission on Tennessee’s College Access Challenge Grant program which provides mentoring services to 8,490 students across 71 high schools and 11 higher education institutions. Mr. Grant also provided a progress report on implementing the Memphis Latino Student Success Grant aimed at increasing the number and percentage of Latinos completing higher education in the Memphis area. Specific information was provided regarding the development of a mentoring program at Kingsbury High School and plans to expand mentoring activities to Southwest Tennessee Community College by Fall 2013. Mr. Grant stated that the Tennessee College Access and Success Network announced its third grant competition. The Network connects college access and success programs with like-minded organizations for the purpose of increasing the number of Tennesseans participating and succeeding in postsecondary opportunities. It was established through a Lumina Foundation grant and expanded through Race to the Top to create a college-going culture in communities across the state by expanding and creating new college access and success programs, educating professionals, facilitating statewide advocacy, and cultivating organizational and Network development. Finally, Mr. Grant provided an update on the GEAR UP TN program funded by a \$4.2 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education. He reports that all GEAR UP TN Collaboratives have hired Site Coordinators and have begun providing services to approximately 7,500 7TH grade and 5,000 12TH grade students in the 15 GEAR UP TN communities.

Audit Committee Report

Ms. Ann Collet, Internal Auditor, was recognized to provide an update on the Audit Committee actions. Ms. Collet commented on the Audit Committee

meeting December 3, 2012, and noted that all five members were present: Claude Pressnell, Chair, Sammy Stuard, Greg Turner, Robert White, via conference call, and Sharon Hayes, via conference call. She stated that the minutes from the December 2011 Audit Committee meeting were approved. Ms. Collett then noted that the state's Financial Integrity Act requires an annual risk assessment to be submitted by December 31st of each year to the Department of Finance and Administration and the Comptroller of the Treasury, was prepared by staff and submitted for review to the audit committee prior to the meeting. She commented that at the meeting, the specifics of the assessment were discussed and the committee voted to approve the assessment. Ms. Collett stated that staff reviewed the draft of the TSAC FY12 financial statements and the work programs for both agencies. She then provided updates on external audits including the USDOE review of FFELP, the state financial and compliance audit of TSAC for FY12, and the upcoming performance audits of THEC and TSAC.

Legislative Report

Mr. Scott Sloan, Associate Executive Director for Legal and Regulatory Affairs, was recognized to provide the legislative report. Mr. Sloan provided an overview of all bills filed to date that will have an impact on the Commission, including those related to the lottery scholarship.

Spring Commission Meeting

Dr. Rhoda advised the Commission that next meeting will be held on Thursday, April 25, 2013 in the THEC board room. He reminded the Commission that the joint meeting with the State Board of Education will follow today's meeting and encouraged Commission members to participate.

SUBJECT: New Academic Program, Austin Peay State University
Professional Science Masters (concentrations Data Management
& Analysis and Predictive Analytics)

ACTION RECOMMENDED: Approval

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: Many managers find themselves making decisions based on the analysis of data knowledge of statistical and mathematical tools for developing detailed measures or trends based on historical data. The proposed Professional Science Masters (PSM) program with concentrations in *Data Management and Analysis* and *Predictive Analytics* will provide that training and provide these managers with additional credentials that will support advancement in their field of expertise.

The proposed degree follows the PSM model of integrating professional business skills with the STEM disciplines. The Professional Science Master's is a unique professional degree grounded in natural science, technology, engineering, mathematics and computational sciences and is designed to prepare students for entry into a variety of career options in industry, business or government. It is a distinctive advanced degree for those intending to pursue a career in the practice of science.

Since 2006, the Council of Graduate Schools endorsed the PSM program model and currently over 100 institutions have developed these interdisciplinary graduate programs that are characterized by science and mathematics with skills-based courses in management and leadership with an internship component. The proposed PSM program with concentrations in *Data Management and Analysis* and *Predictive Analytics* meets all those criteria and will seek PSM recognition from the Council.

PROPOSED IMPLEMENTATION DATE: Fall 2013

1.1.20A MISSION: The proposed program supports Austin Peay State University's mission of "raising the education attainment of the citizenry, developing programs and services that address regional needs, and providing collaborative opportunities that connect university expertise with private and public resources." The PSM program is in alignment with the goals outlined in the THEC 2010-15 Public Agenda for Higher Education, specifically the focus on strengthening Tennessee's Knowledge Economy and closing the gaps in the supply of graduates in high demand fields that require post-secondary credentials, particularly in the STEM fields. The concentrations being proposed in *Data Management and Analysis* and *Predictive Analytics* are designed to prepare graduates to meet the workforce needs of this region.

1.1.20B CURRICULUM: The degree program will require completion of 30-36 semester credit hours depending on PSM concentration. The curriculum is designed based on the model prescribed by the Council of Graduate Schools in order to be recognized as a “Professional Science Master’s” program. Curriculum requirements mandate that the majority of course content be derived from STEM disciplines and the inclusion of a capstone project supervised collaboratively by faculty and employers. The PSM program will be a fully online degree program. Offering the degree program entirely online will have the added benefit of preparing the PSM students for the challenges of working as part of a team using project management software tools.

1.1.20C ACADEMIC STANDARDS: Program admission requires a bachelor’s degree; satisfactory scores on the Graduate Record Examination (GRE); two letters of recommendations; and a personal essay. The academic transcript or work experience of successful applicants must include evidence of aptitude, knowledge, and skill in algebra, quantitative literacy and foundation of computer programming.

Students must meet progression and graduation standards as published annually in the APSU catalog.

Students will have the option to attend the program on either a part-time or full-time basis.

1.1.20D FACULTY: The PSM program will use an interdisciplinary approach by incorporating existing faculty from the different colleges at APSU. Faculty in the College of Arts and Letters and the College of Behavioral and Health Sciences will teach the core courses. Courses in the two program concentrations will be taught by faculty in the College of Science and Mathematics. All faculty involved have their terminal degree in their respective fields.

1.1.20E LIBRARY RESOURCES: Library resources are adequate for program implementation.

1.1.20F ADMINISTRATION/ORGANIZATION: The PSM concentration in *Data Management and Analysis* will be offered within the Department of Computer Science and Information Technology. The PSM concentration in *Predictive Analytics* will be offered within the Department of Mathematics and Statistics. Both departments are in the College of Science and Mathematics.

Program oversight will be coordinated by the two PSM Coordinators for each concentration and the Program Director. It is feasible that one of the PSM Coordinators may serve as the director.

1.1.20G SUPPORT RESOURCES: Students will have access to a wide range of support resources, including advising support from the PSM Coordinators and other faculty members.

1.1.20H FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT: Facilities and instructional equipment are adequate to support the program. Additionally, software products needed for the PSM program are industry standards, most of which are currently funded by the technology access fee.

1.1.20I NEED AND DEMAND: According to the THEC supply and demand projections for Tennessee, the business analysis pathway is expected to have a shortfall of available trained employees by 2018, with a projected supply to demand ration of .88. Similarly, a shortfall is projected for the Information Support and Services Pathway. The PSM program will have a large statistical component, including coursework in regression, data mining and time series. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the employment of statisticians is expected to grow 13 percent from 2008 to 2018. Additionally, the field of data mining and predictive analytics has grown exponentially in recent years. The Dice.com (leading website for technology industry) presently lists 1,000 job openings nationally in data mining and predictive modeling.

The proposed PSM program will produce individuals with the necessary skills to manage data (*Data Management and Analysis*) and to make predictions using large data sets (*Predictive Analytics*). The demand for individuals with the ability to manage data and use data to make prediction is only going to grow. Austin Peay State University is posed to be a leader in the fields of data management and predictive analytics.

1.1.20J NO UNNECESSARY DUPLICATION: Currently, there are no Professional Science Master's programs in Tennessee with concentrations in *Data Management and Analysis* and *Predictive Analytics*. The only program similar to the two PSM concentrations being proposed is the Business Analytics, Master of Science program at University of Tennessee, Knoxville. The program at UTK is focused on business while the individuals that would be most interested in the Predictive Analytics concentration at APSU would be graduates from computer science and mathematics.

1.1.20K COOPERATING INSTITUTIONS: N/A

1.120L DIVERSITY AND ACCESS: Austin Peay State University is an equal opportunity employer committed to the education of a non-racially identifiable student body. Accordingly, the student recruitment plan for the PSM program will be developed to target a diverse potential student cohort.

1.1.20M ASSESSMENT/EVALUATION AND ACCREDITATION: There are no accrediting agencies for this specific program; however, the program is structured based on the PSM guidelines established by the Council of Graduates Schools. Austin Peay State University plans to seek recognition of the PSM program through the Council. A Professional Science Master's recognition provides assurance that the program conforms to nationally accepted criteria.

Program effectiveness will be gauged by annual data collection of enrollment, degree completion, and demographics; and the employment history of graduates. Additionally, the program faculty committee will review the assessment results and determine if any revisions to the program is warranted. Program revisions will be shared with the Advisory Board for feedback.

1.1.20O EXTERNAL JUDGMENT: External review of the proposed program was conducted during an institution site visit on November 19-20, 2012. Dr. S. Lynne Stokes, Professor of Statistical Science at Southern Methodist University served as the external reviewer. She recommended the proposed PSM program with concentrations in *Data Management and Analysis* and *Predictive Analytics* for approval and noted the following strengths:

- The time is right for a program of this sort. Recent publicity of about the analysis of “big data” ... has created an awareness of and appreciation for data analysis that is unprecedented in my professional lifetime.
- The on-line format provides a competitive advantage among the new degree programs in data management and analysis that are springing up. Furthermore, its infrastructure and experience in on-line curriculum delivery makes APSU well positioned for this format.
- The internship component is an important part of this program. The relationships developed through the internship experience in the undergraduate computer science program provide evidence that this component will be feasible to implement.
- There is a strong administrative support for the program all the way from department chairs to the provost.
- The current provost's high visibility and success using the techniques to be taught should help in recruiting and placing students, as well as finding internship placements.

1.1.20P COST/BENEFIT: The proposed PSM program will be funded through campus reallocations and additional tuition revenues generated by the program.

Professional Science Masters (concentration in Environmental Informatics)

ACTION RECOMMENDED: Approval

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: The proposed Professional Science Masters (PSM) program with a concentration in Environmental Informatics focuses on analytical and computer-based methods in the study and management of natural resources and the environment. The Professional Science Master's is a unique professional degree grounded in natural science, technology, engineering, mathematics and computational sciences and is designed to prepare students for direct entry into a variety of career options in industry, business or government. It is a distinctive advanced degree for those intending to pursue a career in the practice of science.

Since 2006, the Council of Graduate Schools endorsed the PSM program model and currently over 100 institutions have developed these interdisciplinary graduate programs that are characterized by science and mathematics with skills-based courses in management and leadership with an internship component. The proposed PSM program with a concentration in Environmental Informatics meets all those criteria and will seek PSM recognition from the Council.

PROPOSED IMPLEMENTATION DATE: Fall 2013

1.1.20A MISSION: The proposed program aligns very well with the vision and mission of Tennessee Technological University as the State's comprehensive university known for offering high-quality programs in the STEM disciplines that produce graduates in an area of state and national need. Furthermore, the degree program will fulfill the educational goal of TTU's Center of Excellence for the Management, Utilization and Protection of Water Resources.

The PSM program with a concentration in Environmental Informatics is in alignment with the goals outlined in the THEC 2010-15 Public Agenda for Higher Education, specifically the focus on strengthening Tennessee's Knowledge Economy and increasing the number of graduate degrees awarded to the state's citizen.

1.1.20B CURRICULUM: The degree program will require completion of 33 semester credit hours, including a 12-hour major field core, 18 hours in the concentration and a 3-hour elective. The curriculum is designed based on the model prescribed by the Council of Graduate Schools in order to be recognized as a "Professional Science Master's" program. Curriculum requirements mandate that the majority of course content be derived from STEM disciplines

and the inclusion of a capstone project supervised collaboratively by faculty and employers.

Courses will be delivered online and on-campus and this hybrid mode of delivery is more cost-effective since most of the courses currently exist.

1.1.20C ACADEMIC STANDARDS: Program admission requires a bachelor’s degree; a minimum 3.0 overall undergraduate GPA; satisfactory scores on the Graduate Record Examination (GRE); and three letters of recommendations.

Students must meet progression and graduation standards as published annually in the TTU catalog.

Students will have the option to attend the program on either a part-time or full-time basis.

1.1.20D FACULTY: The PSM program will use an interdisciplinary approach by incorporating existing faculty from the Colleges of Business, Arts and Sciences and Engineering. All faculty involved have their terminal degree in their respective fields.

1.1.20E LIBRARY RESOURCES: Library resources are adequate for program implementation.

1.1.20F ADMINISTRATION/ORGANIZATION: This program will be offered through the School of Environmental Studies (SOES) located within the College of Interdisciplinary Studies. The SOES Director will also serve as the program director for the proposed Professional Science Master’s program.

1.1.20G SUPPORT RESOURCES: Students will have access to a wide range of support resources, including advising support from the program director and other faculty members.

1.1.20H FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT: Facilities and instructional equipment are adequate to support the program. Additionally, TTU will purchase a license agreement to make GIS software available across campus.

1.1.20I NEED AND DEMAND: The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that by 2018, close to 110,000 environmental scientists and specialists jobs will be available. This represents a 28 percent increase since 2008 with 86,000 jobs available.

As environmental issues become more complex due to population growth, pollution and limited natural resources, the PSM program with a concentration in Environmental Informatics will effectively prepare students for careers to sustain the earth's resources for future generations. Through this effort, Tennessee Tech University will become recognized as a leader in Environmental Informatics in Tennessee and the southeastern United States.

1.1.20J NO UNNECESSARY DUPLICATION: Currently, there are no Professional Science Master's programs in Tennessee with a concentration in Environmental Informatics. This proposed program aligns with the institution's mission and other program offerings such as the undergraduate program in Environmental and Sustainability Studies and the doctoral program in Environmental Science.

1.1.20K COOPERATING INSTITUTIONS: N/A

1.120L DIVERSITY AND ACCESS: Tennessee Tech University is committed to an inclusive and diverse campus that enriches the educational experience, promotes personal growth and a healthy society, prepares students for success in a global economy and enhances America's economic competitiveness.

1.1.20M ASSESSMENT/EVALUATION AND ACCREDITATION: There are no accrediting agencies for this specific program; however, the program is structured based on the PSM guidelines established by the Council of Graduates Schools. The College of Interdisciplinary Studies plans to seek recognition of the PSM program through the Council. A Professional Science Master's recognition provides assurance that the program conforms to nationally accepted criteria.

Program effectiveness will be gauged by annual data collection of enrollment, degree completion, and demographics; and the employment history of graduates. Additionally, the program faculty committee will review the assessment results and determine if any revisions to the program is warranted. Program revisions will be shared with the Industrial Advisory Board for feedback.

1.1.200 EXTERNAL JUDGMENT: External review of the proposed program was conducted during an institution site visit on November 13-14, 2012. Dr. Randy Dymond, Associate Professor of Civil and Environmental Engineering at Virginia Tech University served as the external reviewer. He recommended the proposed PSM program with a concentration in Environmental Informatics for approval and noted the following strengths:

- A supportive university administration that recognizes the difficulties and advantages of interdisciplinary programs.
- A supportive, collaborative, and qualified faculty that represents a myriad of departments that would contribute to the program.

- A proposed director with significant environmental engineering experience and directorship experience.
- A university track record of strong programs in the collective areas of specialty
- A relatively low cost of implementation.
- Good university level information technology and library resources.
- An employment market that will support the graduates of the program.

1.1.20P COST/BENEFIT: The proposed PSM program will be funded through campus reallocations and additional tuition revenues generated by the program.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: The proposed Master of Science program in Management will enhance students' planning skills, communication skills, ethical decision making skills, and expose them to real world experiences in their courses that will help them to mature as managers. Students in the proposed program will choose from one of three concentrations: not-for-profit management, organizational leadership, and supply chain management. The program will fill the nationally recognized niche of focusing more on management and less on functional areas offered through a traditional Master of Business Administration program.

PROPOSED IMPLEMENTATION DATE: Fall 2013

1.1.20A MISSION: The proposed program supports Middle Tennessee State University's mission of "preparing students to thrive in their chosen professions and a changing global society." The Management MS program will allow students to develop the skills to be promoted into higher levels of management at different types of organizations. Additionally, the program is in full compliance with MTSU 2007-2017 Academic Master Plan, particularly the priority area of expanding programs with a focus on regional demand and financial viability.

The Management MS program is in alignment with the goals outlined in the THEC 2010-15 Public Agenda for Higher Education, specifically the focus on strengthening Tennessee's Knowledge Economy and increasing the number of graduate degrees awarded to the state's citizen.

1.1.20B CURRICULUM: The degree program will require completion of 33 semester credit hours, including a 15-hour major field core, 12 hours in the elected concentrations and 6 hours in career-focus electives. The program also incorporates a capstone project in which students will partner with an organization in industry or the non-profit sector.

The program will be delivered primarily through on-ground methods and some instruction will be delivered via online, hybrid and video-conferencing technologies. By providing instruction through a variety of delivery methods, this program will meet the unique scheduling needs of working adults.

1.1.20C ACADEMIC STANDARDS: Program admission requires a bachelor’s degree; a minimum 2.75 overall undergraduate GPA; satisfactory scores on the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT) or the Graduate Record Examination (GRE); and two years of professional experience. Additionally, students must have completed selected foundational courses in Management and Accounting.

Students must meet progression and graduation standards as published annually in the MTSU catalog.

Projected Program Enrollment and Productivity

Students will have the option to attend the program on either a part-time or full-time basis.

1.1.20D FACULTY: The existing Management faculty in the Department of Management and Marketing are adequate to support the program. Additionally, faculty from the respective departments that will be teaching the career-focus courses will also have met the requirements of the Graduate Council to teach graduate-level courses.

1.1.20E LIBRARY RESOURCES: Library resources are adequate for program implementation.

1.1.20F ADMINISTRATION/ORGANIZATION: This program will be offered through the Management and Marketing Department in the Jennings Jones College of Business. A departmental faculty member will receive course reassignment to serve as the graduate program director for the proposed Management MS program.

1.1.20G SUPPORT RESOURCES: Students will have access to a wide range of support resources, including advising support from the Graduate Program Director.

1.1.20H FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT: Facilities and instructional equipment are adequate to support the program. The College of Business has allocated nine classrooms (including a video conferencing classroom) specifically assigned to the Department of Management and Marketing for scheduling courses. Because the courses will be taught at night, on weekends, and in a hybrid format, significant additional classroom space will be available on campus.

1.1.20I NEED AND DEMAND: In February 2012, the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicated a strong need for managerial and business employees in the future. Nationally, the need for managers is expected to increase by seven percent while the need for business and financial operations occupations is expected to increase by 17 percent between 2010 and 2020.

Additionally, some employment sectors likely to employ graduates from the three concentrations (not-for-profit management, organizational leadership, and supply chain management) also project very strong employment needs. For example, the BLS estimates that job openings for healthcare support occupations are expected to increase by 35 percent from 2010 to 2020. Graduates from both the not-for-profit management and organizational leadership concentrations could be employed in these occupations.

Middle Tennessee State University also worked with the business community in the development of the degree program and its concentrations. The proposed program is aligned with the Public Agenda's call for higher education "to collaborate with industry, government, and communities to build a future for Tennessee."

1.1.20J NO UNNECESSARY DUPLICATION: Currently, there are Master's programs at Austin Peay State University and University of Memphis that offer Management programs. The Management MS program at Austin Peay State University is offered entirely on-line and has no specific areas of concentrations. The University of Memphis offers a Master of Science in Business Administration with concentrations in Finance, Management Information Systems, and Real Estate.

1.1.20K COOPERATING INSTITUTIONS: N/A

1.120L DIVERSITY AND ACCESS: The proposed degree offers an alternative opportunity to earn an advance degree in Management, resulting in an additional option for graduate study by members of diverse and under-represented groups.

1.1.20M ASSESSMENT/EVALUATION AND ACCREDITATION: The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) reaffirmation is on a five-year cycle and the Jennings Jones College of Business accreditation was reaffirmed in spring 2011. The Management MS program will be included in the next AACSB review, expected in 2016.

1.1.200 EXTERNAL JUDGMENT: External review of the proposed program was conducted during an institution site visit on November 7-8, 2012. Dr. Donald E. Conlon, the Eli Broad Distinguished Professor of Management at Michigan State University served as the external reviewer. He stated that the proposed program had several strengths that included program distinctiveness, campus commitment from both the College of Business and Provost, and involvement of the business community. "One strength is the uniqueness of the concentrations. In particular, the focus on nonprofit management and the focus on supply chain management represent areas that have been historically under-represented in master's degree programs. The third concentration (organizational leadership), while perhaps less innovative than the

other two, is nevertheless critically important to organizations and would have wide appeal to all of the business sectors.”

Dr. Conlon stated that “there appears to be some consensus around the country in the belief that there is a need for master’s degree programs that focus more on management and less on all function areas (as is the focus of an MBA degree).”

1.1.20P COST/BENEFIT: The proposed Master’s program will be funded through additional tuition revenues generated by the program and no institutional reallocation of funds is necessary for program implantation.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: Disclosed capital projects are funded through non-state sources and include dorms, athletics facilities and similar projects. Since the November 2012 THEC meeting when the original 2013-14 budget recommendations were made, the University of Tennessee (UT) and Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) have developed additional disclosed capital projects. Each year, these additional projects are submitted to THEC for approval as an amendment to the original list, before being submitted to the Department of Finance & Administration (F&A) for inclusion in the budget.

In accordance with Tennessee Higher Education Commission Policy Number F4.0, subsection 4.0.30A, TBR submitted 43 additional projects and UT submitted two additional projects to be included on the 2013-14 Disclosed Capital Projects List. Additionally, TBR has requested that three projects described in the original 2013-14 Disclosed Capital Projects listing be removed from the list. In total, TBR has submitted \$200,600,000 in additional disclosed projects and UT has submitted \$6,900,000 in additional disclosed projects for a total of \$207,500,000.

Per a request from F&A, it was necessary to transmit the additional 2013-14 Capital Projects Lists to the administration prior to the Commission's spring meeting. The amended list was approved by Dr. Rhoda by interim action and transmitted to F&A on March 14, 2013.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: GEAR UP TN provides Tennessee students with a clear path to college. Funded through a seven-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education and administered by the Tennessee Higher Education Commission, GEAR UP TN works with Collaboratives in 15 counties across the state to promote college readiness and success. GEAR UP TN Collaboratives serve a cohort of students in the current seventh grade class follow the cohort through high school, while also serving participating high school seniors each year of the grant. GEAR UP TN is designed to promote student achievement and expand the college-going culture statewide, especially in areas of the state that are traditionally underserved.

The College Access Challenge Grant (CACG) is a federal formula grant program focused on developing partnerships to promote college access and success. CACG creates professional development opportunities for college access professionals and enhances the services offered to high-need students. The program expands current college access programs via the Tennessee College Mentor Corps. The overall goal of Tennessee's CACG is two-fold: (1) make college accessible to more Tennessee graduates through college access and success focused mentoring, and (2) facilitate the transition between high school and community college, and community college and four-year institutions, thereby aiding in college retention and completion.

In October 2011, the Lumina Foundation for Education awarded the Tennessee Higher Education Commission a Latino Student Success Grant aimed at increasing the number and percentage of Latinos completing higher education in Memphis. Through the development of collaborative partnerships with Memphis-area organizations, the project aims to achieve Latino student success through: 1) an intensive mentoring program designed to facilitate the transition between high school and community college, and community college and four-year degree programs; 2) support to ensure maximization of student financial aid opportunities; and 3) a bilingual marketing and information campaign designed to expand college access in the Latino community.

The Tennessee College Access and Success Network connects college access and success programs with like-minded organizations with the purpose of increasing the number of Tennesseans participating and succeeding in postsecondary opportunities. The Network was established through a Lumina Foundation grant and expanded through Race to the Top. Its purpose is to create a college-going culture in communities across the state by expanding and creating new college access and success programs, educating professionals, facilitating statewide advocacy, and cultivating organizational and Network development.

SUBJECT: Conflict of Interest Disclosure Policy for Commission Members

ACTION RECOMMENDED: Information

BACKGROUND INFORMATION: At the April 15, 2004 meeting of the Commission, Policy O5.01, Conflict of Interest Disclosure Policy for Commission Members, was amended to require the annual conflict of interest disclosure statement be signed and filed within 30 days of the Commission's regular Spring meeting.

A copy of the policy and disclosure form is part of this agenda item for your review and signature.

Policy Title: Conflict of Interest Disclosure Policy for Commission Members

Policy Number: O5.1

Conflict of Interest Disclosure Policy for Commission Members

- 5.1.10
- (1) It shall be inappropriate for a Commission member to have a direct interest in any contract the Commission has entered into for goods or services as a result of a bid process or any other business transaction with the Commission.
 - (2) A Commission member shall disclose any of the following interests:
 - (a) Any indirect interest in any contract or other business transaction with the Commission;
 - (b) Any interest in any contract or other business transaction with any higher education institution which is coordinated by, contracted by, contracted with, or authorized by the Commission; and
 - (c) Any indirect interest created by a relative who has (to the extent the Commission member is aware) any contract or business transaction with the Commission or with any higher education institution which is coordinated by, contracted by, contracted with, or authorized by the Commission.
 - (3) “Direct interest” means any contract to provide goods or services to the Commission as a result of a bid process or any other business transaction with a:
 - (a) the Commission member;
 - (b) a relative of the Commission member; or
 - (c) a business in which the Commission member or the Commission member’s relative is:
 - (i) the sole proprietor;
 - (ii) a partner; or
 - (iii) the person having the controlling ownership or control of the largest numbers of outstanding shares owned by any single individual or corporation.
 - (4) “Indirect interest” means any contract in which the Commission member is interested but not directly so, but includes contracts where the Commission member is directly interested but is the sole supplier of goods or services.
 - (5) “Relative” includes spouse, parents, siblings, or children.
 - (6) In the event a member of the Commission has an indirect interest in a matter to be voted upon, a Commission member may abstain for cause by announcing such to the Chair of the Commission. Any Commission member who abstains from voting for cause on any issue coming to a

vote before the Commission shall not be counted for the purpose of determining a majority vote. This provision shall not be construed to prohibit any Commission member from voting on the higher education funding recommendation, or amendments thereto, unless the vote is on a specific amendment to the funding recommendation in which such person has a direct interest.

- (7) The basic underlying principle in conflict of interest is that Commission members should disclose any activity, investment, or interest that might reflect unfavorably upon the Commission, using the disclosure form. Because of the sensitive nature of the Commission's relationship with all of the postsecondary institutions, as well as the General Assembly, it is important that members resolve questions of conflict of interest by disclosure. Any activity which might constitute, or be perceived to constitute, a prohibited conflict should be fully reported. Full disclosure of any situation in doubt should be made.
- (8) The conflict of interest form must be filed within thirty (30) days after the Commission's regular Spring meeting, but in no case shall it be filed later than June 1. In the case of a member appointed to the Commission after the Spring meeting, the newly appointed member shall file a conflict of interest statement no later than thirty (30) days after the first Commission meeting following his/her appointment.
- (9) A Commission member shall amend his/her disclosure because of termination or acquisition of interests of which disclosure is required.
