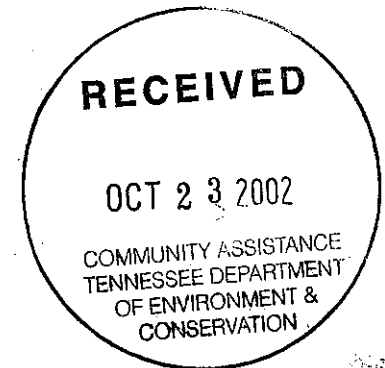

Most of the comments were addressed by way of information submitted by the East Tennessee Development District on July 10, 2002; however, an amendment to the region's formation resolution concerning board membership has not been received. The Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 [T.C.A. 68-211-871] requires that the plan be revised every five years after the plan's initial approval. The Scott County plan update was due to be received by the Division of Community Assistance on May 8, 2000. When the solid waste region planning board for the county fails to comply with provisions of the Act, the county represented by the solid waste planning region board is in non-compliance and is subject to loss of funds and civil penalties [T.C.A. 68-211-816(a)].

Scott County is no longer eligible for funding from the Solid Waste Management Fund as stated in [T.C.A. 68-211-816 (a) (2)]. To end this non-compliance with provisions of the Act, the Scott County Solid Waste Planning Region Board or Scott County must submit the requested document within 90 days of receipt of this letter. If the region or county fails to comply with this request within one hundred eighty (180) days from the date of receipt of the Commissioner's warning letter (May 31, 2002), additional sanctions may be imposed in accordance with [T.C.A. 68-211-816 (a) (3)]. Staff from the development district and the University of Tennessee County Technical Assistance Service (UT-CTAS) is available to provide any assistance you may need to complete the plan update.





Division staff has completed its review of the *Five-Year Update* to the Scott County MSW Planning Region's Solid Waste Plan. Most of the information provided in the Update is complete and adequate; however, some of the areas require additional information or clarification. The following comments are based upon our review and other relevant documents and requirements:

Scott County Regional Collection

Current:

Scott County provides collection by way of a convenience center that allows residents to drop off all bagged class I waste. The waste is put into the compactor and when full the landfill brings a roll-off truck and picks up the full roll-off and replaces with an empty one. The convenience center also takes tires that are placed in a trailer for hauling to an end user. White goods are collected, along with newspaper, cardboard, mixed paper, plastic and some glass. Household Hazardous Waste is collected once a year with the help of the State.

Huntsville provides door to door collection for class I waste. The town utilizes a rear loader compaction truck.

Onieda provides door to door collection for class I waste. The town utilizes two (2) 20 cu.yd. rear loading compaction trucks.

Winfield provides door to door collection by way of a private contract. Houses are picked up door to door with a make shift truck. The contractors also pick up newspaper and cardboard for recycling.

Needs:**Scott County:**

The way the region handles their collection is quite sufficient. The only need is that the region probably needs is to add a couple more convenience centers to make it easier for those residents on the fringes of the county.

Huntsville:

Scott County Regional Recycling

Current Operations: Successes and Failures

Scott County provides the collection of recyclables materials at their recycling center strategically located within the center of the county. Currently, the County provides the drop off of newspaper that is baled with an horizontal bailer and stored until there is enough for a tractor trailer. Cardboard is also collected and bailed and stored until there is enough for a tractor trailer. Mixed paper is also collected and bailed and stored until there is enough for a tractor trailer load. All three of the materials has been successful in terms of bailing and storing and moving the material. However, the bottom of the market has dropped and the County is not seeing any generated revenue over expenses on recycling of these items that once were the money makers. The county also takes in white goods that are picked up by a private hauler and taken to an end user. The program is successful in that it keeps white goods out of the landfill. The County also collects glass and crushes the glass with a glass crusher. This program has been a failure in that once the county gets the material, it cannot move the material to an end user. The region does not generate enough to warrant an end user collecting the material. The County also collects tires that are placed on a trailer and hauled to an end user. The program is deemed successful in that it is keeping tires out of the landfill without financially draining the recycling program. The county also provides for the collection of used oil at the center and reused as heat for the material processing building. The final recycling opportunity is the household hazardous waste. The program has been a success in the past.

Huntsville currently provides a brush chipping program for its residents that can be reused as mulch. The Town provides the collection on a call in basis. The chips are reused within the Town by its residents. The program is successful and diverts waste from the landfill or from being open burned.

Oneida currently provides a brush chipping program and a leaf vacuum program that allows the material to be reused as mulch. The Town provides the collection on a call in basis. The Town also provides a leaf vacuum program whereby during 80 days in the fall a scheduled route is made throughout the Town. Residents are asked during this time to rake their leaves to the street for pickup. The material is transported to the public works compound for mixing with the chips and used as a mulching material. The Town also provides for the collection of used oil that is collected and reused to heat the fire hall and public works building. The programs that the Town have are deemed successful.

Winfield provides door to door collection of newspaper, cardboard and aluminum cans during the collection of household waste. The private haulers take the material to an end user or middle man for resale.

Marketing Efforts:

Scott County:

The County markets the newspaper, mixed paper, cardboard and plastic with Rock-Tenn. The county calls Rock-Tenn when there is enough items to warrant a tractor trailer. Tires are marketed through TRI by way of a contract. The county calls when the trailer is full. The way the region handles their collection is quite sufficient. The only need is that the region probably needs is to add a couple more convenience centers to make it easier for those residents on the fringes of the county. Glass has not been marketed for the past year. This has not been one of the most successful ventures.

Huntsville:

No marketing is done on the brush chips. The material is used in house or by residents for mulching.

Oneida:

No marketing is done on the brush chips or leaves. The material is used in house or by residents for mulching. The used oil is used in house for heat.

Winfield:

No marketing is done by the Town. All of the material that is collected is the property of the private hauler.

Future Desires:

Scott County

The County would like to give glass one more try and is working on an arrangement with the road department to use the crushed glass on the roads. A hammer mill will be needed and it might be that the State can help in this endeavor. Also, the County would like to increase their paper intake by providing a shredder that will shred sensitive documents. This will allow the county to get papers from the hospital, lawyers and government buildings.

Huntsville: The Town will begin the collection of recyclables door to door with the use of 18 gallon containers and their existing refuse truck within the 2002 fiscal year. The residents will be allowed to recycle newspaper, cardboard, mixed paper and plastic.

Oneida:

Dear Mr. Murphy:

The department has not received a response to its comment letter sent on February 7, 2002, pointing to deficiencies found during a review of the Scott County Solid Waste Planning Region's Five-Year Plan Update. The Solid Waste Management Act of 1991 [T.C.A. 68-211-814 (a)(1)] requires the region to review the deficiencies enumerated in the Department's letter and to submit corrections for such deficiencies within sixty (60) days of receiving the comment letter. The region's response was due to be received by the Division of Community Assistance on May 7, 2002. When the solid waste region planning board for the county fails to comply with provisions of the Act, the county represented by the solid waste planning region board is in non-compliance and is subject to loss of funds and civil penalties [T.C.A. 68-211-816(a)].

To end this non-compliance with provisions of the Act, the Scott County Solid Waste Planning Region Board or Scott County must submit a response within ninety (90) days of receipt of this letter. If such response is not received, the Scott County Solid Waste Region, and Scott County will lose eligibility for funds from the Solid Waste Management Fund [T.C.A. 68-211-816 (a)(2)]. If non-compliance continues, additional sanctions may follow [T.C.A. 68-211-816 (a)(3)].

I am certain that Scott County and the Scott County Solid Waste Planning Region will give these issues the serious consideration that is warranted. Staff from the East Tennessee Development District and the University of Tennessee County Technical Assistance Service is available to assist Scott County in this effort.

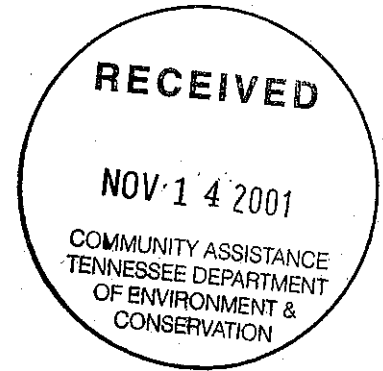

Executive Summary

The Scott County Region was established as a single county region in 1996 and has continued to operate as a single county region. The region is made up of one county, Scott and three cities, Oneida, Huntsville and Winfield. The region encompasses 532.1 square miles with a population of 21,127. The region has rural characteristics which features the Cumberland Mountain Range and the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area. The urban population makes up 26% of the total population of Scott County.

The Scott County Region is represented by a six member solid waste board. The board was established under the guidelines of the Solid Waste Management Act of 1991. The Board meets when needed to discuss solid waste issues and set solid waste policies. In addition, Scott County has a solid waste director that oversees the day to day operation within the County and carries out policies set by the County Executive and the County Commission.

It should be noted that the many of the activities established in the original ten year plan have been implemented within the first five years. The next five years will see a lot of the same activities going on with some fine tuning taking place.

In the Year 2000, the region of Scott County generated 13,220 tons of refuse of which 87% or 11,573 tons were disposed of in a Class I landfill, 11% or 1,447 tons of waste was recycled through a variety of industrial, commercial, county and city activities. Some of the recycling activities includes the county providing drop off sites at the convenience center that

allowed for the collection of newspaper, cardboard, aluminum cans, aluminum scraps, glass, plastic, metals and used oil. The recyclable materials are transported to an end user by way of a private hauler. Future plans call for the County to add additional drop off sites throughout the county. The Town of Oneida and Town of Huntsville picks-up brush and leaves and recycles the mulch material. The Town of Huntsville also collects mixed office paper for recycling. The Town of Winfield provides collection of cardboard, mixed paper and aluminum cans by a private hauler. No changes within the next five years is planned for the Cities. Tire collection is done at the landfill with the placement of the tires into trailers that are hauled when full to an end user by way of a private hauler. Unless the State discontinues the State Tire grant, the region will continue the same method of tire handling for the next ten years.

The Scott County region collects refuse from their citizens in two distinct ways. The Cities provide door to door collection through either a private hauler or city employees and the waste is taken to the regional landfill in Scott County called Volunteer Regional Landfill located in Oneida. The County provides one convenience center that provides for refuse drop off and the waste is hauled by the county to the regional landfill in Scott County for proper disposal. The Cities will continue with their door to door collection and the County will continue using the convenience centers for collection of solid waste for the next ten years. The County has plans to construct two more convenience centers within the next 5 years.

The Scott County region just signed a 5 year contract with an automatic renewal with Volunteer Regional landfill that will expire in December 31, 2005. The regional landfill has just opened up and should provide the county with enough landfill space to meet their needs for the next 20+ years.

The Scott County Region will continue to operate at least one Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) event per year over the next 10 years. The collection of HHW at the convenience centers has been discussed, but would need changes in the current law before such action can take place. Paint and land chemicals will still be the most prominent waste taken in at the HHW events. Waste tires that were discussed under the recycling section will continue to be handle the same way over the next 10 years.

The Scott County Region relies upon the County Solid Waste Director's office for educating the public on solid waste. The region with the help of Ameri-corp will hire additional part time staff in 2002 to help in the education of the public on solid waste matters.

Currently, the Region of Scott County makes no attempts to provide flow control and has no intentions to attempt flow control within the next 10 years.

The regional implementation schedule and flow chart on are shown in the appendix. The regional 10 year solid waste budget total is shown in the following chart on the next page.

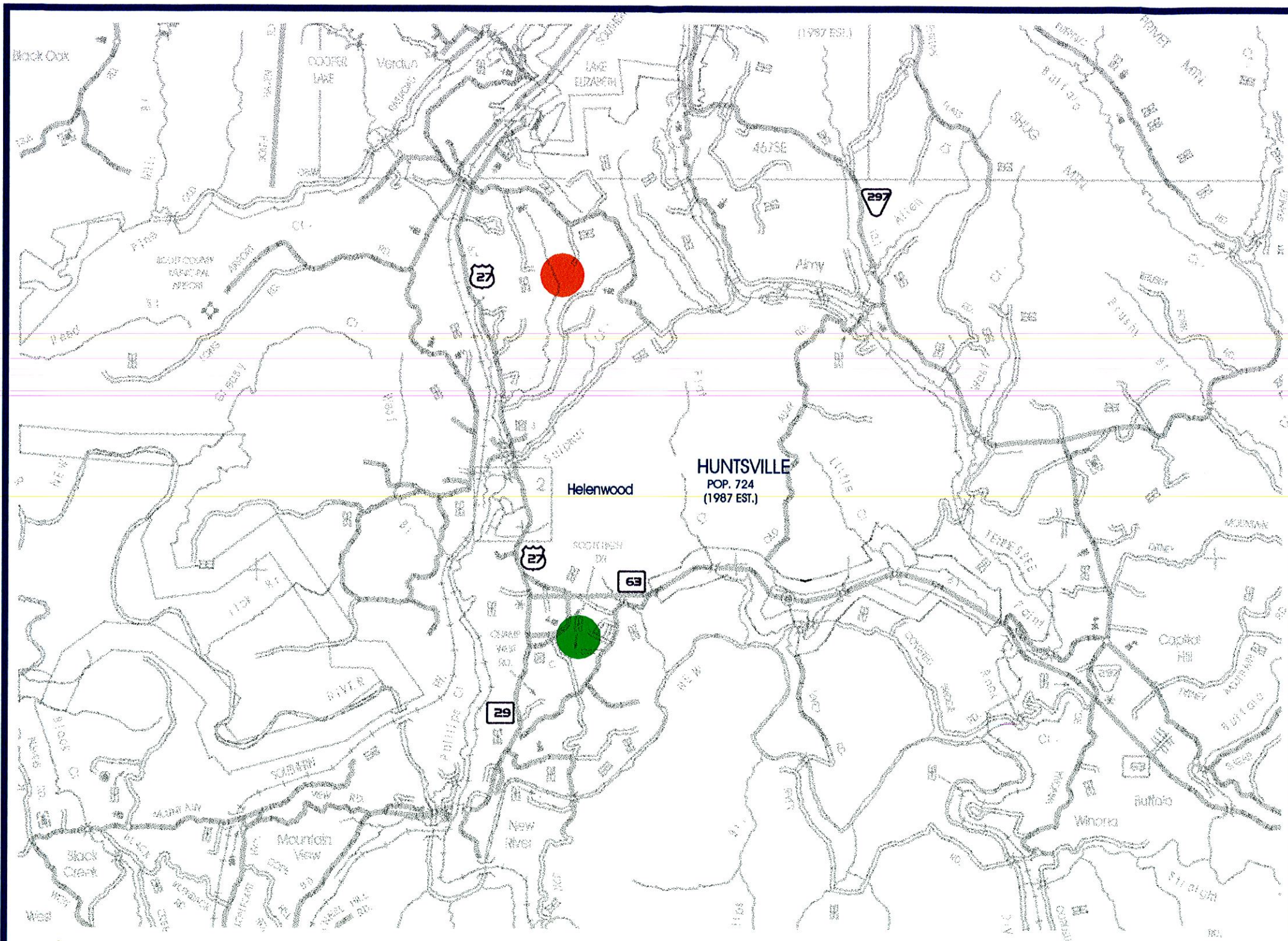

HOST BENEFIT AGREEMENT

This Host Benefit Agreement (the "Agreement") is entered into on this ____ day of January, 2001 by and between Scott County, Tennessee (hereinafter referred to as the "County") or ("Scott County"), and Scott Solid Waste Disposal Company, a Tennessee corporation, whose principal office is located at 300 Roberta Lane, Oneida, Tennessee (hereinafter referred to as "the Company").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Company owns and operates a Class I municipal solid waste disposal facility known as the Volunteer Regional Landfill (the "Landfill") at 300 Roberta Lane, Oneida, Scott County, Tennessee;

and,

WHEREAS, the parties have entered into certain negotiations with respect to fees, taxes, or other charges that may be levied by the County as a result of the Landfill, and the parties wish to enter into this Agreement to provide for certain contractual agreements in lieu of any such fees or charges.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual benefits accruing to the parties as set forth therein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. **Definitions:**

When used in this Agreement, unless specifically provided for otherwise, the terms set forth below shall have the following meanings:

Beneficial Reuse Material shall mean material which is diverted from the Solid Waste stream for use at the Landfill as daily cover or for use as road base or other uses approved by TDEC, ~~including recovered and/or recyclable material that is removed from the landfill.~~ Such materials are not Solid Waste.

Convenience Centers shall mean any area, not to exceed four (4) in number (including the one located at the Landfill), within the boundaries of Scott County, which is staffed and fenced that has waste receptacles on site that are open to residents of Scott County but not to haulers for hire, when an attendant is present, to receive Household Waste.

Exempt Waste shall mean Household Waste generated by households located within the boundaries of Scott County and either (a) collected by a vehicle or municipal and private hauler and taken directly to the Landfill or (b) deposited at a Convenience Center by a resident of a household located in Scott County.

Force Majeure shall mean as herein defined an act, event or condition reasonably relied upon by the Company or the County as justification for delay in or excuse from performing or complying with any obligation, duty or agreement required of the Company or the County under this Agreement, which act, event or condition is beyond the control of the Company or the County or its agents relying thereon, such acts to be limited to the following: (i) an act of God, epidemic, landslide, lightning, earthquake, fire explosion, storm, flood or similar occurrence, an act of public enemy, war, blockade, insurrection, riot, general arrest or restraining of government and people, civil

disturbance or disobedience, sabotage or similar occurrence, strike, work slowdown, or other labor unrest; or, (ii) a court order or a court judgment (including, without limitation, a temporary restraining order, temporary injunction, permanent injunction, or cease and desist order) which stays or invalidates this Agreement.

Host Benefit Fee (also sometimes referred to as the Contract Payment in Lieu of Surcharge) shall mean the fee payable by the Company to the County for Qualifying Waste, and shall be calculated in accordance with the following:

- (a) In the First Year of the Agreement, beginning on the Starting Date for Solid Waste, \$0.60 per ton on the first 100,000 tons of Qualifying Waste, \$0.55 per ton on all such above 100,000 tons, and no charge for Special Waste;
- (b) In the Second Year of the Agreement, beginning January 1, 2002, for Solid Waste, \$0.65 per ton on the first 100,000 tons of Qualifying Waste, \$0.60 per ton on all such Qualifying Waste above 100,000 tons, and no charge for Special Waste;
- (c) In the Third Year of the Agreement, beginning January 1, 2003, for Solid Waste, \$0.70 per ton on the first 100,000 tons of Qualifying Waste, \$0.65 per ton on all such Qualifying Waste above 100,000 tons, and for Special Waste \$0.35 per ton.
- (d) In the Fourth Year of the Agreement, beginning January 1, 2004, for Solid Waste, \$0.75 per ton on the first 100,000 tons of

Qualifying Waste, \$0.70 per ton on all Qualifying Waste above 100,000 tons, and for Special Waste \$0.375 per ton.

(e) In the Fifth Year of the Agreement, beginning January 1, 2005, and each year thereafter, \$0.75 per ton on all Qualifying Waste and Special Waste, plus the amount of any percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), South

which occurred from the first day of the immediately preceding year to the first day of the then current year. Under no circumstances will the Host Benefit Fee ever decrease during the Term of the Agreement unless otherwise agreed to in writing and signed by both parties hereto.

(f) It is recognized, that as of the date of this Agreement, that the State of Tennessee has imposed a surcharge of \$0.75 per ton on all Solid Waste in accordance with Tenn. Code Ann. § 68-211-835 (d). Should the State of Tennessee reduce or eliminate the surcharge, one-third of the amount reduced or eliminated shall be added to the applicable Host Benefit Fee; however, at no time will the Host Benefit Fee be decreased as a result of any such surcharge or the lack thereof.

(g) In the event the Company offers a Host Benefit Fee to the City of Oneida or any other governmental entity in Scott County which is greater than the Host Benefit Fee described herein, the Host Benefit Fee

shall be adjusted so that such fee will not be any less than that of the City of Oneida or any other governmental entity in Scott County.

Household Hazardous Waste shall mean solid waste discarded from homes or similar sources as listed in 40 C.F.R., Part 261.4(b)(1), that are either hazardous wastes as listed by the Environmental Protection Agency in 40 C.F.R. Part 261.33(e) or (f), or wastes that exhibit any of the following characteristics as defined in 40 C.F.R. Parts 261.21 - 261.24: ignitability, corrosivity, reactivity or TCLP toxicity.

Household Waste shall mean any waste material, including garbage, trash and refuse derived from households. Households include single and multiple residences provided, however, that Household Waste shall specifically exclude Household Hazardous Waste, Tires and Waste Tires, Yard Waste and building materials.

Landfill shall mean the Class I Solid Waste Disposal Facility known as the Volunteer Regional Landfill which received Registration No. SNL-76-103-0271 by the Division of Solid Waste Management, Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation ("TDEC"). This includes any modifications or vertical or lateral extensions of the Landfill.

Registration shall mean the authorization from TDEC identified as SNL 76-103-0271, as amended, issued by TDEC, Division of Solid Waste Management, issued to the Company, or any successor or amended Registration for Solid Waste construction or disposal operations on the Property.

Property shall mean the real property located at 300 Roberta Lane, Oneida, Scott County, Tennessee, as more particularly described on Exhibit D attached hereto.

Qualifying Waste shall mean all Solid Waste generated outside the boundaries of Scott County, other than Beneficial Reuse Material, Special Waste (except as provided in the Host Benefit Fee) and Exempt Waste, which is disposed of at the Landfill.

Starting Date shall mean January 1, 2001.

Solid Waste shall mean any garbage, refuse, industrial lunchroom or office waste, Household Waste, Yard Waste, and any other material resulting from the operation of residential, municipal, commercial or institutional establishments or from community activities; provided, that "Solid Waste" does not include the following (each as may be defined from time to time in the Tennessee Code Annotated):

- (a) Radioactive Waste;
- (b) Hazardous Waste;
- (c) Infectious Waste;
- (d) Household Hazardous Waste; and
- (e) Tires

Special Waste shall mean Solid Waste that is difficult or dangerous to manage as set forth in Tenn. Admin. Comp. 1200-1-11-.01 or any subsequent revision thereto and approved by TDEC as a Special Waste.

Term shall mean the period of time for which the Agreement is effective. The initial term shall expire on December 31, 2005, and the Agreement shall be renewed automatically every five (5) years thereafter, unless either party notifies the other party by certified mail within 180 days of the expiration of any five (5) year period that it does not wish to renew the Agreement. By way of explanation, should the Agreement be automatically renewed, the first automatic renewal term ends on December 31, 2010, the second December 31, 2015, the third December 31, 2020 and would proceed throughout the life of the Landfill. The Term, including the initial term and all automatic renewals shall extend throughout the life of the Landfill, including any modifications and extensions thereto, regardless of ownership. All provisions of this Agreement shall be effective for each successive five (5) year term unless modified in writing by agreement of the parties. For all years following the initial term of the Agreement, the formula contained in Paragraph 1 for year five of the Host Benefit Fee shall be calculated by taking the preceding year's actual Host Benefit Fee and adding the applicable Consumer Price Index. For example if the Host Benefit Fee is \$0.76 (76 ¢) for 2005, and the Consumer Price Index increases by five percent (5 %) the Host Benefit fee for 2006 is \$0.798 (79.8 ¢).

Tire or Tires shall mean the continuous solid or pneumatic rubber covering encircling the wheel of a motor vehicle.

Ton shall mean 2,000 pounds.

Waste Tire or Waste Tires shall mean a Tire that is no longer suitable for its original intended purpose because of wear, damage or defect.

Yard Waste shall mean vegetative matter resulting from landscaping, lawn maintenance and land clearing operations conducted at or around a household.

2. Disposal Services.

a. The Company agrees to provide, without limitation as to amount, free disposal at the Landfill of all Exempt Solid Waste, beginning on the Starting Date and continuing throughout the Term of the Agreement. Subject to the Host Benefit Fee described in Paragraph 1, the Company will pay any surcharge imposed by the State of Tennessee (the "State") on said waste pursuant to Tenn. Code Annotated § 68-211-835(d).

b. The Company agrees that it will not increase the tipping fee on commercial waste generated in Scott County by more than five percent (5%) per year during the Term of the Agreement and any subsequent Terms provided in this Agreement.

3. Contract Payment in Lieu of Surcharge.

a. Payment of Contract Amount in Lieu of Surcharge. Commencing on the Starting Date and continuing during the Term of this Agreement, the Company shall be obligated to pay to the County for the Host Benefit Fee as defined in Paragraph 1 of this Agreement.

b. Class III-IV. In the event that a Class III-IV operation is conducted upon the Landfill, in addition to the contemplated Class I Landfill, the Host Benefit Fee will be also payable on that Solid Waste in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement. If such Solid Waste is not received by a tonnage calculation, for

the purpose of calculating the amount of the Host Benefit Fee due, the parties consider four (4) cubic yards of such Solid Waste to be the equivalent of one (1) Ton of Solid Waste. This is the conversion factor set forth in Rule 1200-1-7-.08(4) of the Tennessee Compiled Rules and Regulations.

c. Payment and Reports. The Company shall pay the County the ~~Host Benefit Fee set forth in this paragraph 3~~ on a quarterly basis, payable by the 20th day of the month following the quarter in which the Solid Waste giving rise to such Host Benefit Fee was disposed of at the Landfill. (For example, the payment for the first quarter 2001, January, February, and March will be due April 20, 2001). There will be a late charge of \$750.00 for any quarterly payment not received by the last day of the month that the payment is due. With each quarterly payment, the Company shall furnish the County with a quarterly report showing the total Tons or volume disposed of at the Landfill during the quarter giving rise to such payment, which report shall also show the amount of Solid Waste accepted at the Landfill from within the County and the amount of Solid Waste accepted at the Landfill from outside the County. The Company shall furnish the County with a copy of all reports to the State of Tennessee (which currently are quarterly reports) showing the Tons or volume, as appropriate, of Solid Waste disposed of at the Landfill, and copies of any regulatory inspection reports received or made available to the Company regarding the Landfill. Upon request, the Landfill shall make its waste receipt records available as necessary to the County for an audit of the company's compliance with this Agreement. In addition, the Company

shall provide to the County, records of the quarterly amounts of recoverable and recyclable material that is removed from the Landfill.

4. **Convenience Centers and Special Events.**

Beginning on the Starting Date, the Company will service the Convenience Centers as defined in paragraph 1, at the present locations or located at other substitute or successor locations as designated by the County, by picking up the containers owned and maintained by the County when requested, transporting the containers and disposing the waste at the Landfill, and returning the containers within 24-hours. The Company will pay for all costs associated with such collection, transportation and disposal up to four such pick-ups per week. The County will use its best efforts within reason to ensure that only Household Waste is placed in the containers. Exempt Waste deposited at these Convenience Centers shall not be subject to the Host Fee Payment. In addition, the Company will maintain one (1) public drop-off site at the Landfill for use by Scott County residents as contemplated herein. At the request of the County, the Company agrees to provide containers for collection of up to but not exceeding thirty (30) Tons of Solid Waste per year at special events, such as festivals, spring clean-up, etc., at no charge to the County and the Company will pick up, transport and dispose of said Solid Waste at no charge to the County.

5. **Host County.**

In consideration of the host benefits provided for in this Agreement, the County agrees to serve as the host County for the Landfill throughout the Term of this Agreement. The County agrees that during the Term of this Agreement that it will not

limit or restrict in any manner any Solid Waste delivered to the Landfill regardless of whether it is generated from within or outside of the County. It is agreed that during the life of the Landfill, no radioactive, hazardous, infectious, or toxic waste will be knowingly disposed of at the Landfill by the Company except as provided in this Agreement or authorized by TDEC. This Agreement of the County to serve as the host County for waste generated both within the County and outside of the County is intended to fully meet and comply with any and all provisions under any present or future enacted federal, state and/or local laws or regulations. The County will refrain from exercising any authority granted by law restricting, limiting, impeding, or preventing interstate or intrastate transportation and/or disposal of waste which allow, authorize or grandfather transportation and/or disposal of such waste. The County agrees that the host benefits, including the contract payments as set forth herein are in lieu of any and all other host fees, charges, surcharges, or fees that may be imposed by the County, and the County agrees that as long as this Agreement is in effect the County will not impose any other host fees, charges, surcharges, or fees of any nature whatsoever with respect to any Solid Waste whatsoever delivered to or disposed of at the Landfill regardless of whether it is generated within or outside of the County, except for normal County Property taxes and State of Tennessee or County required business taxes, unless additional fees and taxes are imposed on the County by the State of Tennessee.

6. **Representations and Warranties.**

(a) Of the County. The County represents, warrants and agrees as follows:

(1) Existence and Good Standing. The County is (and will continue to be throughout the Term hereof) validly existing as a political subdivision and is in good standing under the laws of the State of Tennessee.

(2) Approval and Authorization. The County has full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to fully perform all of its duties and obligations hereunder pursuant to various enabling sections of the Tennessee General Statutes. The County Commission has duly authorized the following: the execution and delivery of this Agreement, the County's performance of all of its duties and obligations contained herein, and the County's taking of all other necessary actions to meet these obligations. This Agreement constitutes a valid and legally binding obligation of the County during the Term of this Agreement, is binding upon all future County Commissions, and is enforceable in accordance with its terms.

(3) No Litigation. There is no action, suit, or proceeding pending or, to the best of County's knowledge and belief, threatened against or affecting the County, at law or in equity or before or by any federal, state, municipal or other governmental court, department, commission, board, bureau, agency or instrumentality wherein any decision, ruling or finding would adversely affect the transactions contemplated herein.

(4) Zoning. No county zoning law or any other land use law or restriction exists under the laws and ordinances of the County which would restrict or prohibit establishment and operation of the Landfill.

(b) Of The Company. The Company represents, warrants and agrees as follows:

(1) Existence of Good Standing. The Company is duly incorporated and in good standing under the laws of the State of Tennessee.

(2) Approval and Authorization. The Company has all requisite corporate power and authority to enter into and fully perform this Agreement. The Company's execution and delivery of this Agreement and the Company's performance of all of its duties and obligations contained herein have been duly authorized by all necessary corporate action on the part of the Company and this Agreement is enforceable against the Company in accordance with its Terms.

(3) No Litigation. Other than the County's undated letter (received by the Company on July 18, 2000) threatening litigation against the Company pursuant to 42 U.S.C. §§6972(a)(1)(A) and 6972(a)(1)(B), there is no action, suit, or proceeding pending or, to the best of the Company's knowledge and belief, threatened against or affecting the Company, at law or in equity or by any federal, state, municipal or other governmental court, department, commission, board, bureau, agency or instrumentality wherein any decision, ruling or finding would adversely affect the transactions contemplated herein.

7. Compliance with Laws.

The Company agrees that, in the operation of the Landfill, it will comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws now in effect and which may hereinafter be adopted and become effective during the Term of this Agreement. The County agrees not to enact any laws or regulations mandating requirements for operation of the Landfill more stringent than required by federal or state law. The Company agrees, for itself, that the Contract Payments in Lieu of Surcharge and other payments or benefits hereunder as received by the County may be utilized and applied by the County in such manner without limitation or restriction, as the County best determines.

8. **Default.**

If either party defaults on its obligations under this Agreement and such default is not cured within forty-five (45) days after written notice of such default is received by the defaulting party from the non-defaulting party, then the non-defaulting party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement and/or pursue all of its rights and remedies under applicable law.

9. **Notices.**

All notices, requests, demands, or other communications required or permitted hereunder, shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if delivered or mailed, first class, postage prepaid, certified or registered mail, return receipt required, as follows:

10. **Headings.**

Paragraph headings inserted in this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not be deemed to have any legal effect whatsoever in the interpretation of this Agreement.

11. **Entire Agreement and Venue for Dispute.**

This Agreement, together with the Exhibits and Schedules referenced herein, constitute the entire Agreement of the parties relating to the subject matter

hereof and may not be amended except upon the agreement of the parties in writing. Any and all exhibits and schedules referenced in this Agreement are hereby incorporated herein by reference. The parties acknowledge that this Agreement is to be interpreted under the laws of the State of Tennessee, and that exclusive jurisdiction and venue for matters arising under this Agreement is in the Federal Court for the Eastern District of Tennessee.

12. Binding Effect.

This Agreement is binding upon, and shall inure to the benefit of, the parties and their successors and assigns. This Agreement shall "run with the land" to the extent that such Agreement grants certain rights or impose certain obligations on the parties, and the Company and the County will execute a short form document suitable for recording in the Register's Office for Scott County, Tennessee, in a form approved by counsel for those parties.

13. Force Majeure.

In the event the Company or the County is rendered unable, wholly or in part, by an event of Force Majeure to carry out any of its obligations under this Agreement, then, in addition to the other remedies provided in this Agreement, the obligation of the Company or the County may be suspended during the continuation of any inability so caused by the event of Force Majeure, but for no longer period. Any time that the Company or the County intends to rely upon an event of Force Majeure to suspend obligations as provided in this Section, the Company or the County shall notify the other party to this Agreement as soon as reasonably practicable, describing

in reasonable detail the circumstances of the event of Force Majeure. The party relying on an event of Force Majeure shall have the duty and obligation to use its best reasonable efforts to cure or eliminate such event of Force Majeure and shall, during the period of such Force Majeure, periodically advise the other party of the status of the event of Force Majeure and the projected duration of such event. Notice shall again be given when the effect of the event of Force Majeure has ceased.

14. Severability.

If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the other provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect. Any provision of this Agreement held invalid or unenforceable only in part or degree will remain in full force and effect to the extent not held invalid or unenforceable.

15. Waiver.

The rights and remedies of the parties to this Agreement are cumulative and not alternative. Neither the failure nor any delay by any party in exercising any right, power or privilege under this Agreement or the documents referred to in this Agreement will operate as a waiver of such right, power, or privilege, and no single or partial exercise of any such right, power, or privilege or the exercise of any other right, power, or privilege. To the maximum extent permitted by applicable law: (a) no claim or right arising out of this Agreement or the documents referred to in this Agreement can be discharged by one party, in whole or in part, by a waiver or renunciation of the claim or right unless in writing and signed by County and the Company; (b) no waiver



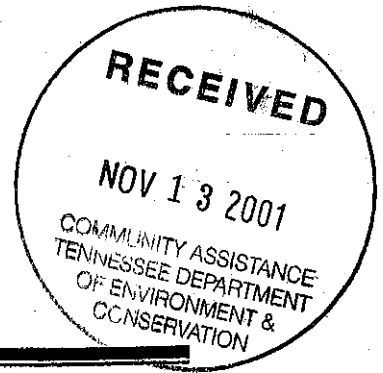

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
