

Quick Facts: NAS in Tennessee

- 219 cases of Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) have been reported since January 1, 2018.
- In the majority of NAS cases (77.2%), at least one of the substances causing NAS was prescribed to the mother by a health care provider.
- The highest rates of NAS in 2018 have occurred in the Northeast Region, Upper Cumberland Region, and Sullivan County.

NAS Prevention Highlight - Susannah's House is an intensive outpatient recovery program for mothers in recovery. The mission is to provide a source of help and hope in a therapeutic community for women and their children to break adverse cycles and rebuild their families. The facility invites foster parents and others caring for children with NAS to attend special programs designed to help them understand the special needs of the children under their care. Women of Childbearing Age

Health Care Providers

<u>Notes</u>

- 1. "Illicit" means drugs which are illegal or prohibited. "Diverted" means using legal/prescribed drugs for illegal purposes. For example, using a prescription drug purchased from someone else or using a prescription drug that was prescribed for someone else.
