


Quick Facts: NAS in Tennessee

- 118 cases of Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) have been reported since January 1, 2015
- In the majority of NAS cases (67.8%), at least one of the substances causing NAS was prescribed to the mother by a health care provider.
- The highest rates of NAS in 2015 have occurred in Sullivan County and the Upper Cumberland and Northeast regions.

NAS Prevention Highlight

• "Born Drug-Free Tennessee" is an initiative implemented by the East Tennessee NAS Task Force. Public and private partners work together to raise awareness about babies being born exposed to prescription and other drugs. Available resources at the site include:

Screening tools, studies, articles, and media to help individuals and communities reduce NAS in their area. The goal is to connect pregnant women who are struggling with a substance use disorder to locate an evidence-based substance use treatment provider and enter prenatal care as early in pregnancy as possible.
