

# **Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome Surveillance** October Update (Data through 10/29/2016)





## **Maternal Source of Exposure**



#### Quick Facts: NAS in Tennessee

- 831 cases of Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) have been reported since January 1, 2016
- In the majority of NAS cases (79.3%), at least one of the substances causing NAS was prescribed to the mother by a health care provider.
- The highest rates of NAS in 2016 have occurred in the East, Northeast and Upper Cumberland Health Regions, and Sullivan County.

NAS Prevention Highlight -Tennessee Medical Association Takes Role In Fight Against Opioid Abuse In 2016, TMA has trained healthcare providers with its accredited Continuing Medical Education course, "Prescribing Practices in Tennessee: What Happened and Where We Are Headed." It is designed to help prescribers adhere to prescribing guidelines to keep patients safe and avoid contributing to the exploding prescription drug abuse epidemic. During the program, participants learn about preventing neonatal abstinence syndrome, responsible management of pain clinics, the importance of educating patients on the pain medicine prescribed, and much more. ## Women of Childbearing Age

## **Health Care Providers**

- Implement Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (<u>SBIRT</u>) in your practice setting.
- Query the Controlled Substance Monitoring Database before prescribing an opioid or benzodiazepine and ensure women of childbearing age are prescribed contraception with these substances.
