# Per Capita Income, Metro Areas

The United States' per capita personal income in 2009 was \$39,635, down from \$40,674 (2.6 percent less) in the previous year.

Per capita personal income is the annual total personal income of residents divided by the residential population as of July 1. Personal income is derived by summing the net earnings by place of residence, person's rental income, personal dividend/interest income, and transfer payments. Personal income excludes income tax deductions and other personal taxes and is reported in current dollars. In simpler terms, it is the total income on the front page of your 1040 tax form. This data can be influenced by large growth (or decline) in population, natural disasters (i.e., flooding or hurricanes), commuting populations (those that primarily work in other counties), and state and local taxes.

### U.S. MSAs

In 2009, the metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) with the highest per capita personal income were Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk, CT (\$74,767); Naples-Marco Island, FL (\$60,049); San Francisco-Oakland-Fremont, CA (\$59,993); Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-VA-MD-WV (\$56,984);

Sebastian-Vero Beach, FL (\$56,303); San Jose-Sunnyvale-Santa Clara, CA (\$55,169); Midland, TX (\$54,164); Boston-Cambridge-Quincy, MA-NH (\$53,553); and Casper, WY (\$53,361). The MSAs with the lowest per capita personal income were McAllen-Edinburg-Mission. TX (\$20,509); Brownsville-Harlingen, TX (\$22,388); Laredo, TX (\$23,294); Provo-Orem, UT (\$23,448); Logan, UT-ID (\$25,176); Yuma, AZ (\$25,356); St. George, UT (\$26,147); Lake Havasu City-Kingman, AZ (\$26,157): Hinesville-Fort Stewart, GA (\$26,372); and Hanford-Corcoran, CA (\$26,426). Of the 20 MSAs listed above, only McAllen, Brownsville, and Yuma increased in 2009.

Since 2006, the MSAs with the largest percentage increases were Brownsville-Harlingen, TX (up 15.6 percent); McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, TX (up 13.7 percent); Laredo, TX (up 10.9 percent); and Midland, TX (up 10.1 percent). During this period, the largest declines were Phoenix-Mesa-Glendale, AZ (down 4.2 percent); Charlotte-Gastonia-Rock Hill, NC-SC (down 3.7 percent); Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk, CT (down 2.6 percent); and New Orleans-Metairie-Kenner, LA (down 2.4 percent).

The largest percentage declines in the last year were in Midland, TX (down 9.2 percent); Casper, WY (down 6.9 percent); and Hinesville-Fort Stewart, GA (down 6.9 percent).

### Tennessee MSAs

The 2009 per capita income of Tennessee MSAs are Nashville-Davidson-Murfreesboro-Franklin, TN (\$38,656); Memphis, TN-MS-AR (\$37,623); Clarksville, TN-KY (\$35,318); Knoxville, TN (\$33,912); Chattanooga, TN-GA (\$33,760); Jackson, TN (\$32,078); Kingsport-Bristol, TN-VA (\$31,770); Johnson City, TN (\$30,778); Cleveland, TN (\$29,939); and Morristown, TN (\$27.559). In Tennessee MSAs, in 2009, all the areas declined from 2008. The largest percent decline was in Nashville-Davidson-Murfreesboro-Franklin (down 4 percent). From 2006 until 2009, the highest percent increase was in Johnson City (up 9.3 percent), while the smallest increase occurred in Nashville-Davidson-Murfreesboro-Franklin (up 1.3 percent).






### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACTIVITIES (MOST RECENT AVAILABLE)

# NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 19,900 jobs from April 2010 to April 2011. This includes increases in educational/health services (up 8.600 jobs), which includes increases of 6.900 jobs health care/social assistance and 1,700 jobs in educational services; professional/business services (up 5,900 jobs), which includes increases of 3,700 jobs in administrative/support/waste management and 1,600 jobs in management of companies/enterprises; transportation/ warehousing (up 5,900 jobs); mining/logging/ construction (up 4,000 jobs); food/beverage stores (up 2,100 jobs); food services/drinking places and transportation equipment manufacturing (both up 2,000 jobs); durable goods wholesalers (up 1,600 jobs); and machinery manufacturing and motor vehicle/ parts dealers (both up 1,500 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in local government (down 2,800 jobs), federal government (down 2,000 jobs), and printing/related activities (down 1,300 jobs).

During April, nonfarm employment increased by 17,300 jobs. This included seasonal gains in leisure/hospitality (up 7,800 jobs), which includes increases of 4,000 jobs in accommodation/food services and 3,800 jobs in arts/entertainment/ recreation; retail trade (up 4,000 jobs), which includes increases of 1,300 jobs in motor vehicle/ parts dealers and 1,000 jobs in building materials/ garden equipment/supplies; administrative/ support/waste management (up 2,400 jobs); mining/logging/construction (up 1,600 jobs); transportation/warehousing (up 1,200 jobs); educational services (up 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in local government (down 1,900 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for April 2011 was 9.6 percent, up 0.1 percent from the revised March 2011 rate.

The United States' unemployment rate was 9 percent in April 2011. In April 2010, the national unemployment rate was 9.8 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 10 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 46 counties, increased in 41 counties, and remained the same in eight counties. There were 30 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent, and one county had a rate at or above 15 percent. In April, the lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6.6 percent, up 0.5 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 22.1 percent, up from 21.8 percent in March 2011.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2010 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,500 jobs from March 2011 to April 2011. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 800 jobs), retail trade (up 400 jobs), and transportation/warehousing/utilities, other services, and state government (each up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by a decrease in professional/business services (down 400 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,000 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 300, while service-providing jobs increased by 2,700.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,600 jobs from March 2011 to April 2011. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 700 jobs), local government and professional/business services (both up 600 jobs), leisure/hospitality (up 500 jobs), and educational/health services (up 400 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in mining/logging/construction (down 300 jobs).

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,700 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs declined by 400, while service-providing jobs increased by 5,100.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 5,800 jobs from March 2011 to April 2011. There were seasonal increases in leisure/ hospitality (up 1,700 jobs), administrative/ support/waste management (up 1,300 jobs), retail trade (up 1,100 jobs), transportation/ warehousing/utilities (up 800 jobs), wholesale trade (up 600 jobs), mining/logging/ construction (up 400 jobs), educational/ health services (up 300 jobs), and other services (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in local government (down 400 jobs) and professional/scientific/ technical services (down 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 4,300 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 400, while service-providing jobs declined by 3,900.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,800 jobs from March 2011 to April 2011. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 1,400 jobs); educational/ health services (up 1,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 900 jobs in educational services; leisure/hospitality (up 1,200 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 800 jobs); mining/ logging/construction (up 700 jobs); durable goods manufacturing and federal government (both up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in local government (down 2,000 jobs), wholesale trade (down 600 jobs), financial activities (down 300 jobs), and other services (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 6,800 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 800, while service-providing jobs increased by 6,000.
