The Labor Market Report

Foreign-born Workers in 2016

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the unemployment rate for foreign-born persons in the United States was 4.3 percent in 2016, down from 4.9 percent in 2015. The rate for nativeborn persons fell to 5.0 percent in 2016 from 5.4 percent in the prior year.

In 2016, there were 27.0 million foreign -born persons in the U.S. labor force, comprising 16.9 percent of the total. Hispanics accounted for 48.3 percent of the foreign-born labor force in 2016 while Asians accounted for 25.0 percent.

The foreign-born are persons who reside in the United States but who were born outside the country or one of its outlying areas to parents who were not U.S. citizens. The foreign-born include legally and illegally-admitted immigrants, refugees, and temporary residents such as students and temporary workers.

Labor Force Information

In 2016, the labor force participation rate of foreign-born workers was 65.2 percent while it was 62.3 percent for native-born workers. The highest labor force participation rate for both native and foreign-born workers was in the West North Central region.

In 2016, foreign-born mothers with children under 18 years old were less likely to be labor force participants than were native-born mothers--58.9 percent versus 73.9 percent. The labor force participation rate of foreign-born mothers with children under age 6 was 49.5 percent in 2016, much lower than that for native-born mothers with children under age 6, at 69.0 percent.

The foreign-born unemployment rates, in 2016, were 6.1 percent for Blacks, 4.7 percent for Hispanics, 3.7 percent

for Whites, and 3.4 percent for Asians. The native-born unemployment rates, in 2016, were 8.8 percent for Blacks, 6.8 percent for Hispanics, 4.2 percent for Asians, and 4.0 percent for Whites.

Occupations

In 2016, foreign-born workers were more likely than native-born workers to be employed in service occupations (23.5 percent versus 16.5 percent); in production, transportation, and material moving occupations (14.8 percent versus 11.1 percent); and in natural resources, construction, and maintenance occupations (13.6 percent versus 8.3 percent). The disparity was especially great in service occupations where 32.5 percent of employed foreign-born women worked in service occupations compared to 19.4 percent of employed native-born women.

Native-born workers were more likely than foreign-born workers to be employed in management, professional, and related occupations (40.7 percent versus 32.2 percent) and in sales and office occupations (23.4 percent versus 15.9 percent).

Earnings and Education

Foreign-born workers, in 2016, earned less than their native-born counterparts. They earned 83.1 percent of the earnings of their native-born counterparts (\$715 versus \$860). The median weekly earnings for foreign-born men (\$751) were 79.0 percent of the earnings of native-born men (\$951). The median weekly earnings for foreign-born women (\$655) were 86.0 percent of the earnings of native-born women (\$762).

Differences in earnings reflect a variety of factors, including variations in the distributions of (*Continued on Page 2*)

Pay of Foreign-born Workers

foreign-born and native-born workers by educational attainment, occupation, industry, and geographic region.

In 2016, 22.4 percent of the foreign-born labor force age 25 and over had not completed high school, compared to 4.5 percent of the native-born labor force.

The earnings of both foreign-born and native -born workers increased with education. In 2016, foreign-born workers age 25 and over with less than a high school education earned \$489 per week, while those with a bachelor's degree and higher earned about 2.7 times as much (\$1,311 per week). This was not significantly different from the earnings of native-born workers (\$1,253). The gap between the earnings of foreign-born and native-born workers closes at higher levels of education.



NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 56,100 jobs from April 2016 to April 2017. There were large increases in professional/business services (up 9,700 jobs), which includes increases of 7,100 jobs in administrative/ support/waste management and 1,600 jobs in professional/ scientific/technical services; health care/social assistance (up 7,000 jobs), which includes increases of 4,000 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 2,900 jobs in hospitals; retail trade (up 6,700 jobs), which includes increases of 4,300 jobs in general merchandise stores and 1,500 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores; and construction (up 6,500 jobs), which includes increases of 4,400 jobs in specialty trade contractors and 1,300 jobs in heavy/civil engineering construction.

There were smaller increases in accommodation/ food services (up 3,900 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,800 jobs in food services/drinking places; financial activities (up 3,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,700 jobs in finance/insurance; state government (up 3,000 jobs); transportation/warehousing (up 2,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in truck transportation; transportation equipment manufacturing (up 2,500 jobs); local government (up 1,900 jobs); and arts/entertainment/ recreation (up 1,600 jobs). In the last 12 months there were no large decreases.

During April 2017, nonfarm employment increased by 18,000 jobs. There were increases in accommodation/food services (up 6,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,400 jobs in food services/drinking places; retail trade (up 3,100 jobs); transportation/warehousing (up 3.000 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 2,700 jobs); arts/entertainment/recreation (up 2,300 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 2,100 jobs) in which includes an increase of 1,700 jobs in ambulatory health care services; and heavy/civil engineering construction (up 1,100 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 2,500 jobs in local government and 1,200 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services.

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for April 2017 was 4.7 percent, down 0.4 percentage point from the revised March 2017 rate. The United States unemployment rate in April 2017 was 4.4 percent, down 0.1 percentage point from the revised March 2017 rate. In April 2016, the U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 5.0 percent while the state rate was 4.6 percent.

The state unemployment rates decreased in all 95 counties. Seven of the lowest eight county rates were from the Nashville MSA. Meigs County had the largest decrease (down 3.2 percent). In April, the lowest rate was in Williamson County at 2.6 percent, down 0.7 percentage point, from the previous month, while the highest rate was in Rhea County, at 6.6 percent, down from 8.2 percent in March.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2016 benchmark.



There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 600 jobs); professional/business services (up 500 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities and educational/health services (both up 400 jobs); retail trade and durable goods manufacturing (both up 300 jobs); and local government and nondurable goods manufacturing (both up 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 7,400 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,700 while service-providing jobs increased by 5,700.

(NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)





Total nonfarm employment in Knoxville increased by 1,700 jobs from March 2017 to April 2017. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 1,000 jobs); state government (up 700 jobs); retail trade (up 500 jobs); educational/health services (up 300 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities and durable goods manufacturing (both up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in professional/business services (down 600 jobs); financial activities (down 300 jobs); and local government and wholesale trade (both down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 1,000 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs decreased by 400 while service-providing jobs increased by 1,400.

(NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)





Total nonfarm employment increased by 4,200 jobs from March 2017 to April 2017. There were increases in retail trade (up 1,800 jobs); transportation/ warehousing/utilities (up 1,500 jobs); leisure/ hospitality (up 900 jobs); mining/logging/ construction (up 800 jobs); and administrative/support/waste management and educational/health services (both up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by declines of 1,200 jobs in local government and 200 jobs in both nondurable goods manufacturing and management of companies/enterprises.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 9,200 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 3,100, while service-providing jobs increased by 6,100.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 5,900 jobs from March 2017 to April 2017. There were increases in educational/health services (up 2,500 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,900 jobs in health care/social assistance; leisure/hospitality (up 1,600 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 1,300 jobs); state government (up 1,000 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 800 jobs); retail trade (up 600 jobs); mining/logging/construction and financial activities (both up 500 jobs); and durable goods manufacturing and management of companies/ enterprises (both up 200 jobs). These increases were partially offset by declines in local government (down 8,000 jobs), professional/scientific/technical services (down 1,300 jobs), and wholesale trade (down 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 33,400 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 7,800, while service-providing jobs increased by 25,600.
