income in 2011 was \$36,533, up 4.6 percent from the previous year. Tennessee's per capita income amount ranked 38th in the United States. The U.S per capita income was \$41,663, up from \$39,937 (4.3 percent) in 2011. In 2010 this increase was 2.8 percent.

Per capita personal income is the annual total personal income of residents in each state divided by the population of the state. The Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) uses the Census Bureau's annual midvear population estimates. Personal income is derived by summing the net earnings by place of residence, any rental income, dividend and interest income, and transfer payments. Personal income is measured prior to deduction of state and federal income taxes as well as other personal taxes. All income is reported in current dollars. In simpler terms, it is the total income on the front page of your 1040 tax form. This data can be influenced by large growth (or decline) in population, natural disasters (i.e., flooding or hurricanes), commuting populations (those that primarily work in other counties), and state and local taxes.

### Per Capita Income

In 2011, the states with the highest per capita income were the District of Columbia (\$73,105), Connecticut (\$56,889), Massachusetts (\$53,621), New Jersey (\$53,181), Maryland (\$51,038), New York (\$50,545), and Wyoming (\$47,301). The poorest states (measured by per capita income) were Mississippi (\$32,176), Idaho (\$33,326), West Virginia (\$33,513), Kentucky (\$33,667), South Carolina (\$33,673), Utah (\$33,790), Arkansas (\$34,014),

and New Mexico (\$34,575). Four of the lowest seven states are in the Southeast region, There were no states in the top or the bottom from the Midwest region.

From 2000 until estimated 2011, the per capita income in the U.S. increased by 37.4 percent. The states with the largest percentage gains were the District of Columbia (up 80.7 percent), North Dakota (up 78.8 percent), Louisiana (up 63.8 percent), Wyoming (up 61.7 percent), South Dakota (up 57.4 percent), and Montana (up 55.9 percent). States with the smallest increases, by percentage, were Nevada (up 23.2 percent), Michigan (up 24.3 percent), Georgia (up 26.5 percent), Indiana (up 29.5 percent), North Carolina (up 29.6 percent), and Colorado (up 29.7 percent).

### **State Ranking**

These large percentage gains, over time, have greatly changed state rankings. Some of the largest gainers in rank from 2000 to 2011 are North Dakota (up 29 places), Louisiana (up 17 places), South Dakota (up 15 places), Montana (up 11 places), and Vermont (up 10 places). The biggest drop in rankings are Michigan (down 18 places); Nevada (down 16 places); Georgia (down 13 places); and Indiana, Ohio, and Oregon (each down 9 places).







# NONFARM EMPLOYMENT & LABOR FORCE NARRITIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 42,800 jobs from February 2011 to February 2012. This includes seasonal increases in professional/ business services (up 12,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 11,700 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; local government educational services (up 11.500 jobs); health care/social assistance (up 10,200 jobs), which includes increases of 3,400 jobs in ambulatory health care services, 2,700 jobs in social assistance, and 2,400 jobs in nursing/ residential care facilities; mining/logging/ construction (up 9,100 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (up 4,800 jobs); accommodation/food services (up 4,100), which includes an increase of 3,400 jobs in food services/drinking places; state government (up 2,300 jobs); fabricated metal products (up 2,100 jobs) and motor vehicle/parts dealers (up 2,000 iobs).

This was partially offset by decreases in wholesale trade (down 3,200 jobs), which includes a drop of 2,000 jobs in wholesale trade nondurable goods; arts/entertainment/recreation (down 2,200 jobs); food/beverage stores (down 1,600 jobs); plastics/rubber products (down 1,400 jobs); and printing/related activities (down 1,100 jobs).

During February nonfarm employment increased by 10,800 jobs. This included seasonal increases in state government (up 6,800 jobs), which included an increase of 3,200 jobs in state government educational services; educational/health services (up 5,300 jobs), which included an increase of 4,300 jobs in educational services; accommodation/food services (up 2,000 jobs), which included an increase of 1,800 jobs in food services/drinking places; and professional/scientific/technical services (up 1,000 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in retail trade (down 3,300 jobs), which included a decrease of 2,100 jobs in general merchandise stores.

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for February 2012 was 8.0 percent, down 0.2 percentage point from the revised January 2012 rate.

The United States unemployment rate was 8.3 percent in February 2012. In February 2011, the national unemployment rate was 9.0 percent and the state rate was 9.5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 75 counties, increased in 10 counties, and remained the same in 10 counties. There were 48 counties with an unemployment rate greater than or equal to 10 percent of which three counties had an unemployment rate greater than 15 percent. There were five counties which had a rate below 7 percent. In February 2012, the lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 5.6 percent, unchanged from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 17.6 percent, down from 18.5 percent in January 2012.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2011 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,000 jobs from January 2012 to February 2012. There were seasonal declines in state government (up 500 jobs); durable and nondurable goods manufacturing (both up 400 jobs); and leisure/hospitality, local government, professional/business services, and educational/health services (each up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by a seasonal decline in retail trade (down 400 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,200 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,300, while service-providing jobs increased by 1,900.







Total nonfarm employment increased by 4,000 jobs from January 2012 to February 2012. There were seasonal increases in administrative/ support/waste management (up 2,100 jobs); educational/health services and state government (both up 1,600 jobs); financial activities and local government (both up 500 jobs); and wholesale trade and professional/scientific/technical services (both up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by seasonal declines in retail trade (down 1,300 jobs); leisure/hospitality, nondurable goods manufacturing, and mining/logging/construction (each down 300 jobs); and transportation/warehousing/ utilities and durable goods manufacturing (both down 200 jobs).



Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,800 jobs from January 2012 to February 2012. There were seasonal increases in educational/health services (up 1,300 jobs), which includes increases of 800 jobs in educational services and 500 jobs in health care/social assistance; state government (up 1,000 jobs); durable goods manufacturing (up 900 jobs); administrative/support/waste management (up 700 jobs); leisure/hospitality (up 500 jobs); and financial activities (up 400 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in retail trade (down 700 jobs), local government (down 600 jobs), mining/logging/construction (down 500 jobs), and other services (down 300 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 15,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 4,100, while service-providing jobs increased by 11,400.
