Impact of the COVID-19 Recession by Race

The second half of 2020 showed the economy slowly recovering from one of the worst economic recessions since the Great Depression, with financial markets showing particular strength. However, the labor market showed rising racial inequality, which underlies how different the experiences of recovery have been.

As the economy tries to rebound, many companies are rehiring workers to their business, but many Black workers are still left unemployed. This is not the first time either. During the 2008 Great Recession, the black unemployment rate increased to double digits and remained that high for another six years. In comparison, the unemployment rate among white workers never reached double digits during or after the 2008 Great Recession. It took more than ten years for Black workers' income to return to their pre-recession levels.

During the COVID-19 recession, workers have been classified into three main groups. The first group are those who have lost their jobs and face economic insecurity, the second are those who are able to classifiy as essential workers, and the third are those who are able to continue working from their homes. Black workers are less likely to be found in the third group. From March 2020 to May 2020, African Americans suffered a record number of job losses. They are also disproportionally found among the essential workers.

Economic Effects by Race/Ethnicity

The Economic Policy Institute (EPI) analyzes state unemployment rates by race and ethnicity on a quarterly bases using data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Current Population Survey (CPS). Their analysis for the third and fourth quarter of 2020 finds slow and differing recovery paths across racial and ethnic groups. The Hispanic-white ratio remained relatively stable at around 1.6 across both periods, but the Black-white ratio continued to rise back toward its historical 2-to-1 trend. In other words, while unemployment rate fell for all groups over the third and fourth quarters, Hispanic unemployment remained 60 percent higher than white unemployment, while Black unemployment rose from 60 percent higher to 90 percent higher. Unemployment rates remained above 10 percent for all racial and ethnic groups except for white Americans. However, there were improvements in unemployment rates compared with the second quarter of 2020, now recognized as the unemployment peak of the COVID-19 recession.

In the third quarter of 2020, the white unemployment rate was 7.3 percent, still up 4.2 percentage points from March 2020. Unemployment remained at or above 10 percent in six states for white workers. Hawai'i had the highest white unemployment rate at 13.9 percent, up 10.8 percentage points from March 2020. The other five states with white unemployment at or above 10 percent were California, Massachusetts, Nevada, New York, and Rhode Island.

Black workers face unemployment rates of over 10 percent in 16 of the 22 states (including the District of Columbia) for which unemployment data for Black workers is available. Unemployment rates for Black workers were highest for Black workers in Pennsylvania (19.5%), Michigan (17.9%), Illinois (15.7%), and the District of Columbia (15.6%).

The unemployment rate for Hispanic workers was 11.3 percent in the third quarter of 2020, 6.5 percentage points above the pre-pandemic rate from March 2020. Massachusetts had the highest unemployment amongst Hispanic workers at 21.4 percent. Asian American and Pacific Islander workers had unemployment rates at or above 10 percent in four of the eight states for which data is available, with New York having the highest rate at 15.8 percent.





Nonfarm Employment & Labor Workforce Narrative

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 111,600 jobs from February 2020 to February 2021. There were decreases in leisure & hospitality (down 53,200 jobs), which includes decreases of 35,600 jobs in food services & drinking places; educational & health services (down 16,700 jobs), which includes decreases of 12,400 jobs in health care & social assistance; government (down 15,400 jobs), which includes decreases of 11,500 jobs in local government; manufacturing (down 9,100 jobs), which includes decreases of 6,400 jobs in durable goods manufacturing.

These decreases were partially offset by increases in transportation & warehousing (up 10,300 jobs); professional/scientific/ technical services (up 6,300 jobs); food & beverage stores (up 2,600 jobs); building material/garden equipment/supplies (1,100 jobs).

During the past month, nonfarm employment increased by 21,900 jobs. There were increases in government (up 10,600 jobs), which include increases of 8,900 jobs in state government educational services; education/health services (up 6,800 jobs), which includes increases of 6,100 jobs in educational services; professional/business services (up 5,200 jobs), which includes increases of 2,800 jobs in administrative/ support/waste management.

These increases were partially offset by decreases in trade/transportation/utilities (down 4,600 jobs), which includes decreases of 3,800 jobs in retail trade; financial activities (down 2,000 jobs); specialty trade contractors (down 1,700 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for February 2021 was 4.9 percent, down from the revised January 2021 rate of 5.1 percent. The United States unemployment rate for January 2021 was 6.2 percent, down from the revised February 2021 rate of 6.3 percent. In February 2020, the U.S. seasonally adjusted rate was 3.5 percent while the state rate was 3.9 percent.

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 90 counties, increased in 4 counties, and remained the same in 1 county. Williamson County had the lowest rate at 3.1 percent, down from the revised January rate of 3.2 percent. The highest rate was Lake County at 8.6 percent, up from the revised unemployment rate of 8.3 percent in January.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, selfemployed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2020 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment in the Chattanooga MSA increased by 300 jobs from January 2021 to February 2021. There was an increase in leisure/hospitality and state government (both up 400 jobs); professional/business services and other services (both up 100 jobs). These increases were partially offset by a decrease of 200 jobs in both financial activities and educational/health services.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 12,300 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs decreased by 900 jobs while serviceproviding jobs decreased by 11,400 jobs.



KNOXVILLE MSA UNEMPLOYMENT RATES (NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)






