What are the 2009 Labor Surplus Areas?

Labor surplus areas (LSAs) are mandated for large (over \$2 million) federal construction contracts. LSAs are classified by civil jurisdictions rather than metro or labor market areas. Civil jurisdictions are defined as cities with a population of at least 25,000 and all counties. A civil jurisdiction becomes a LSA when its average unemployment rate is at least 20 percent above the average unemployment rate for all states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico during the previous two calendar years.

During periods of high national unemployment, the 1.20 percent ratio is disregarded and an area is classified as a LSA if its unemployment rate during the previous two calendar years was 10 percent or more. This 10 percent ceiling comes into effect whenever the two-year average unemployment rate for all states was 8.3 percent or above. Similarly, a floor of 6 percent is used during periods of low national unemployment in order for an area to qualify as a LSA. The 6 percent floor comes into effect whenever the average unemployment rate for all states during the two-year reference period was 5 percent or less.

The Department of Labor issues the LSA list on a fiscal year basis. The reference period used in preparing the list was January 2006 through December 2007. The national average unemployment rate (including Puerto Rico) during this period was 4.7 percent. The qualifying rate for a FY 2009 labor surplus area classification is 6 percent.

There is also a provision to allow for the designation of labor surplus areas under exceptional circumstances. The regular criteria is waived when an area experiences a significant increase in unemployment which is not temporary or seasonal and which was not reflected in the data for the two-year reference period. To be considered as a LSA under the exceptional circumstance criteria, the state workforce agency must submit a petition requesting such classification to Labor's **Employment and Training** Administration. The conditions for exceptional circumstance classification are: an area unemployment rate of at least 6 percent for each of the three most recent months: projected unemployment rate of at least 6 percent for each of the next 12 months: and documentation that the exceptional circumstance event has already occurred.

The following labor surplus classifications will be in effect from October 1, 2008, through September 30, 2009.







NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Total nonfarm employment decreased by 92,900 jobs from January 2008 to January 2009. During this period, there were large seasonal decreases in mining/construction (down 18,500 jobs); retail trade (down 15,500 jobs), which includes declines of 3,100 in general merchandise stores, 2,900 jobs in motor vehicle/parts dealers, and 2,500 jobs in clothing/ clothing accessories stores; administrative/support/ waste management (down 11,400 jobs); transportation equipment manufacturing (down 9.900 jobs); transportation/warehousing (down 6,200 jobs), which includes a drop of 4,700 jobs in truck transportation; financial activities (down 6,100 jobs), which includes a decrease of 4,100 jobs in finance/insurance; wholesale trade (down 4,800 jobs), which includes a decline of 3,500 jobs in durable goods wholesalers; fabricated metal product manufacturing, information, and accommodation (each down 3,300 jobs); and other services (down 3,000 jobs). This was partially offset by smaller increases in health care/social assistance (up 8.800 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,500 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 3,200 jobs in hospitals; local government (up 3,700 jobs); food services/drinking places (up 1,800 jobs); and educational services (up 1,500 jobs).

During this month, nonfarm employment decreased by 77,500 jobs. The largest seasonal declines were in administrative/support/waste management (down 14,700 jobs); retail trade (down 14,300 jobs), which includes declines of 4,300 in general merchandise stores, 4,100 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores, and 1,300 jobs in sporting goods/hobby/book/ music stores; mining/construction (down 8,900 jobs); accommodation/food services (down 7,000 jobs), which includes a decline of 4,600 jobs in food services/ drinking places; financial activities (down 5,300 jobs) which includes a decrease of 3,500 jobs in finance/ insurance; transportation equipment manufacturing (down 4,100 jobs); and transportation/warehousing (down 4,100 jobs), which includes a drop of 2,200 jobs in truck transportation; local government (down 3,600 jobs); and wholesale trade (down 3,400 jobs), which includes a drop of 1,700 jobs in durable goods wholesalers. This was partially offset by an increase in professional/scientific/technical services (up 2,900 iobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for January 2009 was 8.6 percent, up 1 percent from the December rate. This is the 18th consecutive month that the current rate is greater than or equal to the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 7.6 percent in January 2009. In January 2008, the national unemployment rate was 4.9 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.3 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate increased in all 95 counties for the second consecutive month. There were 66 counties with an unemployment rate greater than 10 percent and 11 counties were higher than 15 percent. The lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6.6 percent, up 1.4 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Perry County's 27.3 percent, up from 20.1 percent in December 2008.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data is based on the 2008 benchmark.

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

There were seasonal decreases in retail trade (down 1,200 jobs), which includes a decline of 300 jobs in general merchandise stores; leisure/hospitality (down 900 jobs), which includes a drop of 400 jobs in accommodation/ food services; state government (down 800 jobs); mining/construction (down 700 jobs); transportation/warehousing/utilities (down 500 jobs); and durable goods manufacturing, nondurable goods manufacturing, wholesale trade, financial activities, and federal government (each down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm jobs decreased by 4,000 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 4,100, while service-providing jobs increased by 100.



There were seasonal decreases in retail trade (down 2,000 jobs), which includes a decline of 500 jobs in general merchandise stores; state government (down 1,600 jobs); leisure/hospitality (down 1,500 jobs), which includes a drop of 1,100 jobs in accommodation/food services; professional/business services (down 900 jobs), which includes a drop of 700 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; mining/ construction (down 900 jobs); wholesale trade, transportation/warehousing/utilities, and financial activities (each down 300 jobs); and nondurable goods manufacturing (down 200 jobs).

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During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 9,600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 4,300, while service-providing jobs declined by 5,300.



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
