## 2002-2003 Annual Averages

The statewide unemployment rate in 2003 was 5.8 percent, up 0.7 percentage points from the previous year. The United States unemployment rate went from 5.8 percent in 2002 to 6.0 percent in 2003. This is the third straight year that the U.S. unemployment rate has increased. During these three years the Tennessee rate has remained below the national average.

Total nonfarm employment in Tennessee increased by 3,100 jobs during 2003. There was an increase of 17,200 jobs in the service-providing sector. Most of this increase occurred in educational/health services (up 13,000 jobs) and leisure/hospitality (up 7,500 jobs), which includes 6,600 jobs in food services/drinking places. Some of this increase was offset by a large decline in administrative/support/waste

management (down 11,400 jobs). There was a decrease of 14,100 jobs in the goodsproducing sector. The entire goods-producing decline occurred in the manufacturing industries.

Of the 68 non-metropolitan counties, 55 counties had unemployment rates that increased, 11 had unemployment rates that decreased, and two remained the same as 2002.

## **Metropolitan Areas**

The Chattanooga MSA's 3.9 percent unemployment rate remained the same during the past year. The labor force (place of residence) decreased by 1,100 while the nonfarm employment (place of work) increased by 1,000 jobs. This is exactly opposite of what happened from 2001 to 2002. The largest increase was in educational/health services (up 1,200 jobs).

The Johnson City–Kingsport-Bristol MSA unemployment rate increased from 5.4 percent in 2002 to 5.9 percent in 2003. The labor force decreased by 1,300 while the nonfarm employment increased by 1,100 jobs. The largest increase was in food services/drinking places and trade/transportation/utilities (both up 800 jobs). Non-

durable manufacturing goods declined by 1,100 jobs.

The Knoxville MSA annual average unemployment rate increased from 3.5 percent to 3.8 percent in 2003. The labor force declined by 600 while the nonfarm employment increased by 7,300 jobs. There was an increase of 2,000 jobs in leisure/ hospitality, 1,800 jobs in educational/health services, 1,300 jobs in financial activities, and 1,100 jobs in trade/ transportation/utilities.

The Memphis MSA 2003 annual average unemployment rate increased a full percentage point to 6.2 percent. The labor force decreased by 700 while the nonfarm employment increased by 5,000 jobs. There were increases in educational/health services (up

2,300 jobs) and food services/ drinking places and trade/ transportation/utilities (both up 1,800 jobs). There was a large decline in general merchandise stores (down 1,900 jobs).

The Nashville MSA unemployment rate increased from 4.0 to 4.4 percent during the last year. The labor force dropped by 6,200 while the nonfarm employment increased by 8,500 jobs. There were increases in educational/health services (up 4,400 jobs), transportation/ trade/utilities (up 4,100 jobs), food services/drinking places (up 1,900 jobs), and natural resources/mining/ construction (up 1,700 jobs). This was offset by a decline of 5,900 jobs in administrative/support/waste management.







#### NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR-FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for March 2004 was 5.0 percent, unchanged from the February rate. This is the third month in a row that the Tennessee seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was equal to or lower than the national rate.

The United States estimated unemployment rate was 5.7 percent in March 2004. In March 2003, the national unemployment rate was 5.8 percent, and the state unemployment rate was 5.5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 63 counties, increased in 21 counties, and remained the same in 11 counties. The lowest rate occurred in Knox County at 2.6 percent, unchanged from the previous month. The highest rate was Lauderdale County's 12.7 percent, down from 13.2 percent in February 2004. 

(Continued from Page 5) Total nonfarm employment increased by 21,600 jobs from March 2003 to March 2004. During this period there were increases in health care/social assistance (up 5,200 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,800 jobs in ambulatory health care services; accommodation/food services (up 4,300 jobs) which includes an increase of 3,700 jobs in food services/drinking places; administrative/support/waste management (up 4,100 jobs); retail trade (up 2,500 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in general

merchandise stores; transportation/ warehousing (up 2,100 jobs); educational services (up 1,600 jobs); construction (up 1,400 jobs); local government educational services (up 1,300 jobs); and financial activities and transportation equipment manufacturing (both up 1,200 jobs).

Over the year, the largest job decreases occurred in electrical equipment/appliance manufacturing (down 1,100 jobs) and state government (down 1,000 jobs).

During March, nonfarm employment increased by 800 jobs. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 5,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 4,000 jobs in accommodation/food services; construction (up 2,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in specialty trade contractors; and retail trade (up 2,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,100 jobs in general merchandise stores. This was partially offset by a decline in local government (down 14,100 jobs).




The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during, or received pay for, any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2002 benchmark.

## **Chattanooga MSA**

Total nonfarm employment increased by 700 jobs from February 2004 to March 2004. There were increases in leisure/hospitality (up 400 jobs), which included an increase of 300 jobs in accommodation/food services; professional/business services (up 300 jobs); and 200 jobs in retail trade, transportation/warehousing/utilities, and natural resources/mining/construction. This is partially offset by a decline of 900 jobs in local government.

During the past 12 months nonfarm employment increased by 900 jobs. During that time goods-producing jobs decreased by 1,100 while service-providing jobs increased by 2,000.




