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Latest Census Shows Regional Gains

Article I. Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution calls for a census of the nation's population every 10 years to apportion the House seats among the states. The 2010 Census is the 23rd census in our nation's history. The apportionment totals were calculated by a congressionally defined formula, in accordance with Title 2 of the U.S. Code, to divide among the states the 435 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and, in turn. affect the Electoral College. The apportionment population consists of the resident population of the 50 states, plus the overseas military and federal civilian employees and their dependents living with them who could be allocated to a state.

Each member of the House represents, on average, about 710,767 people. This decennial count is the basis for our representative form of government. The results of the first census, in 1790, had each member of the House representing about 34.000 residents. Since then, the House has more than guadrupled in size. The populations of the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico are excluded from the apportionment population, as they do not have voting seats in Congress.

By the Numbers

The 2010 Census, the 23rd in our history, showed the resident population of the United States on April 1, 2010, was 308,745,538. This represented an increase of 9.7 percent over the 2000 U.S. resident population of 281,421,906 (up 13.2 percent from 1990). The current rate of growth is the slowest since the 1930s due to the lower birth rates

and the slowdown in immigration because of the recession. The U.S. resident population represents the total number of people in the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

The most populous state was California (37.253.956): the least populous, Wyoming (563,626). The state that gained the most numerically since the 2000 Census was Texas (up 4,293,741 to 25,145,561) and the state that gained the most as a percentage of its 2000 Census count was Nevada (up 35.1 percent to 2,700,551). The 2010 Census population in Tennessee was 6,346,105, up 11.5 percent from a decade earlier. The House representation will be unchanged in Tennessee for the next 10 vears.

(Continued from Page 1) up the bulk of the population increase, 14,318,924 and 8,747,621, respectively. But the Northeast and the Midwest also grew: 1,722,862 and 2,534,225.

Additionally, Puerto Rico's resident population was 3,725,789, a 2.2 percent de-

crease over the number counted a decade earlier.

President Obama will transmit the apportionment counts to the 112th Congress during the first week of its first regular session in January. The reapportioned Congress will be the 113th, which convenes in January 2013. Beginning in February and wrapping up by March 31, 2011, the Census Bureau will release demographic data to the states on a rolling basis so state governments can start the redistricting process.



Unemployment Rates 1980-2009





Total nonfarm employment increased by 25,100 iobs from November 2009 to November 2010. This includes increases in professional/business services (up 13,900 jobs), which includes gains of 11,900 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; health care/social assistance (up 7,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,600 jobs in social assistance and 2,200 jobs in ambulatory health care services; retail trade (up 6,500 jobs); fabricated metal products (up 2,700 jobs); machinery manufacturing (up 1,500 jobs); and accommodation/food services and educational services (both up 1,400 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in information (down 2,900 jobs), finance/insurance (down 2,800 jobs), state government and local government educational services (both down 1.600 jobs), and nondurable goods wholesalers (down 1,100 jobs).

During November, nonfarm employment increased by 10,000 jobs. The largest seasonal increases were in retail trade (up 5,700 jobs), which includes increases of 3,000 jobs in general merchandise stores and 2,400 jobs in clothing/ clothing accessories stores; professional/business services (up 3,200 jobs), which includes gains of 1,700 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services and 1,400 jobs in administrative/support/ waste management; and health care/social assistance (up 2,300 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in wholesale trade (down 1,400 jobs) and arts/entertainment/recreation (down 1,000 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for November 2010 was 9.4 percent, unchanged from the October 2010 rate. This is the fourth month in a row that the current rate is less than or equal to the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 9.8 percent in November 2010. In November 2009, the national unemployment rate was 10 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 10.7 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 43 counties, increased in 38 counties, and remained the same in 14 counties. There were 42 counties with an unemployment rate less than 10 percent and two counties had a rate above 15 percent. The lowest rate occurred in Lincoln County at 6.1 percent, up 0.1 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 19 percent, down from 19.8 percent in September 2010.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. 





Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,900 jobs from October 2010 to November 2010. There were seasonal increases in professional/business services (up 700 jobs), which includes increases of 400 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services and 300 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; retail trade (up 500 jobs); federal government (up 400 jobs); educational/health services and other services (both up 300 jobs): and wholesale trade and leisure/hospitality (both up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in local government (down 300 jobs) and nondurable goods manufacturing (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 8,000 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 3,000, while service-providing jobs declined by 5,000.



Total nonfarm employment increased by 2,100 jobs from October 2010 to November 2010. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 2,300 jobs); educational/health services (up 400 jobs), which includes a gain of 300 jobs in health care/social assistance; professional/scientific/technical services (up 400 jobs); leisure/hospitality (up 300 jobs); and nondurable goods manufacturing (up 200 jobs). This increase was partially offset by declines in mining/logging/ construction (down 500 jobs), other services (down 400 jobs), administrative/support/waste management and durable goods manufacturing (both down 300 jobs), and local government (down 200 jobs).

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During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 2,600 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 2,400, while service-providing jobs declined by 200.
