## County Per Capita Personal Income

# November 2012 




According to the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis the 2011 Tennessee the per capita personal income was $\$ 36,567$, up 4.2 percent from the previous year and up 344.5 percent from 1980.

Per capita personal income is defined as the annual total personal income of residents divided by the residential population as of July 1. Personal income is derived by summing the net earnings, rental income, personal dividend/interest income, and transfer payments by place of residence. Personal income excludes federal income tax deductions and other personal taxes and is reported in current dollars. In simpler terms, it is the total income on the front page of your 1040 tax form. This data can be influenced by large growth (or decline) in population, natural disasters (i.e., flooding or hurricanes), commuting populations (those that primarily work in other counties), and state and local taxes.

Of the nation's 3,113 counties, 609 (19.6 percent) had 2011 per capita personal income levels that exceeded the nation's average of $\$ 41,560$. In Tennessee, only four counties were above this average. In the U.S., the per capita personal income ranged from $\$ 121,301$ in New York County (Manhattan), New York, to $\$ 16,752$ in Crowley County (just east of Pueblo), Colorado.

## Changes by Dollars \& Rank

In 2011, the Tennessee counties with the highest per capita personal income were Williamson ( $\$ 59,399$ ), Davidson ( $\$ 47,318$ ), Fayette (\$43,579), Montgomery ( $\$ 43,485$ ), Shelby ( $\$ 40,763$ ), Hamilton $(\$ 40,007)$, Knox $(\$ 38,894)$, Wilson $(\$ 38,461)$, Loudon $(\$ 37,698)$, and Trousdale $(\$ 37,583)$. In 1980 the ranking was Williamson, Davidson, Shelby, Hamilton, Anderson, Knox, Wilson, and Sumner. In 1980 Fayette was $70^{\text {th }}$, Montgomery was $17^{\text {th }}$, Loudon was $20^{\text {th }}$, and Trousdale was $23^{\text {rd }}$.

The counties with the lowest per capita income in 2011 were Hancock $(\$ 20,079)$, Lake ( $\$ 20,253$ ), Wayne ( $\$ 22,178$ ), Lauder-
dale ( $\$ 23,033$ ), Scott $(\$ 23,516)$, Hickman $(\$ 24,065)$, Bledsoe $(\$ 24,087)$, Lewis ( $\$ 24,344$ ), and Morgan ( $\$ 24,803$ ). In 1980 the ranking (from the bottom) was Hancock, Pickett, Fentress, Overton, Lewis, Jackson, Clay, and Grainger. The greatest improvements in county rank over the last 30 years are Pickett from $94^{\text {th }}$ to $78^{\text {th }}$, Fentress from $93^{\text {rd }}$ to $63^{\text {rd }}$, Jackson from $90^{\text {th }}$ to $47^{\text {th }}$, Grainger from $88^{\text {th }}$ to $60^{\text {th }}$ and, Fayette from $70^{\text {th }}$ to $3^{\text {rd, }}$. During that time, the counties with the greatest declines in rank include Lake from $77^{\text {th }}$ to $94^{\text {th }}$, Wayne from $63^{\text {rd }}$ to $93^{\text {rd }}$, Lauderdale from $78^{\text {th }}$ to $92^{\text {nd }}$, and Hickman from $57^{\text {th }}$ to $90^{\text {th }}$. Roane also dropped from $9^{\text {th }}$ to $33^{\text {rd }}$, Humphreys from $12^{\text {th }}$ to $38^{\text {th }}$, Rhea from $12^{\text {th }}$ to $74^{\text {th }}$, and Marshall from $28^{\text {th }}$ to $83^{\text {rd }}$.

## Percentage Changes

The counties with the largest percentage growth during the past year are Montgomery (up 10.0 percent), Fayette (up 8.7 percent), Stewart (up 7.6 percent), Lake (up 7.2 percent), Crockett (up 7.1 percent), and Smith (up 7.1 percent). Counties with the lowest percentage per capita income growth include White (up 2.1 percent), DeKalb (up 2.4 percent), Perry and Scott (both up 2.5 percent), and Pickett (up 2.6 percent).

Since 2000, the counties with the largest growth in per capita income are Trousdale (up 79.3 percent), Montgomery (up 77.0 percent), Stewart (up 72.4 percent), Fayette (up 67.5 percent), Moore ( 65.4 percent), Decatur (up 63.8 percent), and Jackson ( 63.7 percent). The counties with the least growth are Marshall ( 5.1 percent) Maury (up 18.9 percent), Rutherford (up 19.7 percent), McNairy (up 24.5 percent), Wilson (24.6 percent), and Perry (up 25.9 percent).

## NONFARM EMPLOYMENT \& LABOR FORCE NARRATIVE

Total nonfarm employment increased by 25,500 jobs from November 2011 to November 2012. Goods-producing industries experienced the largest increase. They included increases in transportation equipment manufacturing (up 7,300 jobs), mining/logging/construction (up 3,900 jobs), and food manufacturing (up 1,200 jobs). Some of the service-providing industries with the largest increases were retail trade (up 6,600 jobs), where a majority of the increases were in clothing/clothing accessories stores and food/ beverage stores; health care/social assistance (up 5,800 jobs), where one-half of this increase was in ambulatory health care services; local government educational services (up 4,500 jobs); and professional/scientific/technical services (up 3,900 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by declines in financial activities (down 3,600 jobs), where a majority of the decline was in finance/insurance; wholesale trade (down 2,900 jobs), where almost two-thirds of the decrease was in merchant wholesalers durable goods; administrative/ support/waste management (down 2,200 jobs); and state government (down 1,700 jobs).

During November nonfarm employment increased by 12,200 jobs. The major seasonal increase was in retail trade (up 14,000 jobs). That increase included gains of 5,000 jobs in general merchandise stores and 4,700 jobs in clothing/clothing accessories stores. Smaller increases in service-providing industries were in professional/business services (up 1,400 jobs) and transportation/warehousing (up 1,200 jobs).

This was partially offset by decreases in accommodation/food services (down 2,600 jobs), where most of this decline was in food services/ drinking places; arts/entertainment/recreation (down 1,600 jobs); health care/social assistance (down 1,500 jobs); and mining/logging/ construction (down 1,200 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for November 2012 was 7.6 percent, down 0.6 percentage point from the revised October 2012 rate.

The United States unemployment rate was 7.7 percent in November 2012. In November 2011, both the national and state unemployment rates were 8.7 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 91 counties, increased in Warren County, and remained the same in three counties. Fourteen counties had an unemployment rate greater than 10 percent. In November 2012, the lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 4.4 percent, down 0.8 percentage point from the previous month. The highest rate was Scott County's 15.3 percent, down from 16.4 percent in October 2012.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 900 jobs from October 2012 to November 2012. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 900 jobs), professional/business services (up 600 jobs), and transportation/warehousing/ utilities (up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by decreases in educational/health services and mining/logging/construction (both down 300 jobs), and nondurable goods manufacturing (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,900 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 3,800 , while service-providing jobs increased by 100.

Total nonfarm employment increased by 900 jobs from October 2012 to November 2012. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 1,600 jobs), local government (up 700 jobs), and durable goods manufacturing (up 200 jobs). These increases were partially offset by declines in mining/logging/construction (down 600 jobs), educational/health services (down 500 jobs), and professional/business services (down 400 jobs).

Over the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,200 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,300 , and service-providing jobs increased by 2,900 .

Total nonfarm employment increased by 5,300 jobs from October 2012 to November 2012. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 4,200 jobs); mining/logging/ construction and administrative/support/ waste management (both up 500 jobs); and transportation/warehousing/utilities and wholesale trade (both up 300 jobs). This was partially offset by a decrease in other services (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment decreased by 400 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs increased by 700 , while service-providing jobs declined by 1,100 .

Total nonfarm employment increased by 6,100 jobs from October 2012 to November 2012. There were seasonal increases in retail trade (up 5,200 jobs); durable goods manufacturing and local government (both up 900 jobs); professional/ scientific/technical services and transportation/ warehousing/utilities (both up 800 jobs); other services (up 600 jobs); and mining/logging/ construction (up 300 jobs).
