Facts about U.S. Veterans

World War I officially ended with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles on June 28, 1919. However, seven months earlier, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, fighting between Allied nations and Germany ceased with an armistice, a temporary cessation of hostilities. That is why November 11,1918 was considered the end of "the war to end all wars." In November of 1919, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed that November 11 would be the commemoration of Armistice Day. The day would be observed with parades, public gatherings and a brief suspension of business at 11: 00 am. Congress would eventually recognize the annual observance of Armistice Day on June 4, 1926, but it wouldn't be until May 13, 1938 that Congress would make it an official legal holiday. By 1954, after World War II and the Korean War, legislation was approved to have November 11 become a day to honor all American veterans. On October 8, 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued the first "Veterans Day Proclamation." The following information is about these men and women who fought and served to protect our country.

Veteran Demographics

As of 2018, there were 19.2 million veterans in the United States, which accounted for about 8 percent of the civilian noninstitutional population age 18 and over. About 10 percent of all veterans were female. Of all veterans, 2.4 million (12.7 percent) were black or African American, 15.8 million (82.4 percent) were non-Hispanic white, 1.3 million were Hispanic (7 percent), and 0.4 million (1.9 percent) were Asian. Data for all races are not presented in this tabulation.

In 2018, 9 million veterans were 65 years and older while 1.9 million were under 35. The states with the greatest number of veterans were California (1,713,000 veterans), Texas (1,582,000 veterans), Florida (1,405,000 veterans), Pennsylvania (787,000 veterans), and Ohio (764,000 veterans). The states with the least number of veterans were Vermont (37,000 veterans), Wyoming (48,000 veterans), North Dakota (49,000 veterans), Rhode Island

(60,000 veterans), and Alaska (67,000 veterans).

In 2018, the number of veterans with a service-connected disability was 4.7 million (24.8 percent), 4.2 million veterans with a service-connected disability were male. Among veterans with a service-connected disability, 29 percent had a disability rating of less than 30 percent, while another 41 percent had a rating of 60 percent or higher.

When Veterans Served

Veterans have served and protected Americans in both war and peacetime. Veterans who served during World War II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam era (all of whom are over 60 years old) made up about 40 percent of all veterans (7.6 million) in 2018. Veterans who served during the Gulf War era I (August 1990 to August 2001) or during the Gulf War era II (September 2001 to the present) made up about 38 percent (7.2 million) of all veterans. About a quarter (4.3 million) served outside of the designated wartime periods.

Unemployment of Veterans

The unemployment rate for veterans in 2018 was 3.5 percent, this was slightly lower than the total U.S. unemployment rate of 3.8 percent. The unemployment rate for veterans with a service-connected disability was higher at 5.2 percent. The unemployment for male veterans was 3.8 percent, slightly higher than female veterans at 3.7 percent.

World War II, Korean War, and Vietnam era veterans had a combined unemployment rate of 3.6 percent, Gulf War era I veterans had an unemployment rate of 2.8 percent (the lowest of any category), Gulf War era II veterans had an unemployment rate of 3.8 percent (the highest of any category), and veterans during other service periods had an unemployment rate of 3.5 percent.

The states with the lowest veteran unemployment were lowa (1.4 percent), and Connecticut, Maine, and New Jersey (all at 2.0 percent). The state with the highest unemployment rate for veterans was Colorado (5.8 percent).

The state of Tennessee had a veteran unemployment rate of 2.4 percent (much lower than the U.S. rate of 3.5 percent). Tennessee had the 13th highest number of veterans employed at 249,000 persons (the employment rate ranked the 15th highest at 49.9 percent of the population). In contrast, the U.S. employment rate among veterans was 47.5 percent of the population. Tennessee also ranks 12th in terms of the total number of veterans in the civilian non-institutional population (estimated at 500,000 veterans).



Nonfarm Employment & Labor Workforce Narrative

Total nonfarm employment increased by 46,500 jobs from September 2018 to September 2019. There were increases in professional/business services (up 9,100 jobs), which includes increases of 4,500 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services; accommodation & food services (up 8,800 jobs), which includes increases of 8,100 jobs in food services/drinking places; manufacturing (up 6,300 jobs), which includes 4,400 jobs in durable goods manufacturing; arts/entertainment/ recreation (up 4,900 jobs); government (up 4,900 jobs), which includes increases of 2,800 jobs in local government; financial activities (up 4,800 jobs) which includes an increase of 2,600 jobs in finance/insurance; health care/social assistance (up 4,000 jobs), which includes increases of 2,400 jobs in ambulatory health care services; and transportation/ warehousing (up 3,800 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by a decline of 2,900 jobs in construction, which includes a decrease of 2,200 jobs in specialty trade contractors.

During the past month, nonfarm employment increased by 22,900 jobs. There were increases in government (up 23,700 jobs), which includes increases of 14,800 jobs in local government educational services; educational services (up 7,800 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by decreases in leisure and hospitality (down 8,700 jobs); and health care & social assistance (down 1,500 jobs).

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for September 2019 was 3.4 percent, down 0.1 percentage point from the revised August 2019 rate. The United States unemployment rate for September 2019 was 3.5 percent, down 0.2 percentage points from the revised August 2019 rate. In September 2018, the U.S. seasonally adjusted rate was 3.7 percent while the state rate was 3.4 percent.

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 90 counties, increased in four counties, and remained the same in Grundy county. Williamson and Sevier had the lowest rate at 2.3 percent. Both counties decreased by 0.2 percent from the August rate. The highest rate was Clay County at 5.6 percent, down from 6.0 percent.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2018 benchmark.



Total nonfarm employment in the Chattanooga MSA increased by 2,500 jobs from August 2019 to September 2019. There was an increase in government (up 2,600 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,500 jobs in state government, and an increase in education & health services (up 500 jobs). This increase was offset by declines of 1,000 jobs in leisure/ hospitality and 200 jobs in manufacturing.

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 3,900 jobs. During the year, goods-producing jobs increased by 1,400 while service-providing jobs increased by 2,500.

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





There were increases in educational services (up 3,100 jobs), government (up 2,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,600 jobs in local government, and transportation/warehousing/utilities (up 1,000 jobs).

These increases were partially offset by decreases in leisure/hospitality (down 2,000 jobs), healthcare/social assistance (down 800 jobs), and professional/scientific/technical services (down 300 jobs).
