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2002 to 2004 Annual Average Labor Force Information for Metro and Micro Areas

The Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) annual averages have been updated and revised to account for data changes and new county groupings (for Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) and Micropolitan Areas) based on Census 2000 information. Thus, the revision goes back to 2000. This issue of the LMR will provide some of the data for the state, the MSAs, and the micropolitan areas. (See the table on Page 2.) The statewide unemployment rate in 2004 was 5.4 percent, down 0.1 percent from the previous year. From 2002 until 2003, the Tennessee rate increased from 5.2 percent to 5.5 percent. The United States' unemployment rate went from 6 percent in 2003 to 5.5 percent in 2004. This is the seventh consecutive year that the annual average unemployment rate in Tennessee is equal to or lower than the national rate.

Metro Areas

During the past year, total employment decreased in both the Kingsport and Memphis MSAs. The other MSAs all increased. The unemployment rate decreased from 2003 to 2004 in the Clarksville, Jackson, Johnson City, Kingsport, Morristown, and Nashville MSAs. The unemployment rate increased from 2003 to 2004 in Chattanooga and Memphis. The rate remained the same in Cleveland and Knoxville.

From 2002 to 2003, the unemployment rate increased in the Clarksville, Cleveland, Kingsport, Knoxville, Memphis, and Nashville MSAs. It decreased during the same period in Jackson and Johnson City. It remained the same in Chattanooga and in Morristown.

During the past three years, the unemployment rate has steadily declined in the Jackson and Johnson City MSAs. The unemployment rate declined then remained steady in Cleveland and Knoxville. During the past three years, this rate has steadily increased in the Memphis MSA, rising from 5.3 percent to 5.9 percent.

Last year, the metropolitan area with the lowest unemployment rate was the Knoxville MSA, at 4.1 percent. The Knoxville MSA had the lowest unemployment rate for three consecutive years. The Memphis MSA had the highest rate in 2004 at 5.9 percent.

Micro Areas

The micropolitan areas are new designations based on the 2000 Census that have at least one urban cluster of greater than 10,000 but less than 50,000 population, plus adjacent counties with a high degree of social and economic integration.

Of the 20 new micropolitan areas, only three include multiple counties. They are Cookeville (Jackson, Overton, and Putnam counties), Tullahoma (Coffee, Franklin, and Moore counties), and Union City, TN-KY (Obion County and Fulton County, KY).

During the past year, the total employment decreased in Brownsville, Columbia, Crossville, Harriman, Lawrenceburg, Martin, McMinnville, Newport, Paris, Tullahoma, and Union City. Total employ-(Continued on the next page)

(Continued from the previous page) ment increased in Athens, Cookeville, Dyersburg, Greeneville, LaFollette, Sevierville, and Shelbyville.

The increase in employment, however, does not necessarily equate to an increase in the unemployment rate from year to year. Last year, the unemployment rate decreased in all micropolitan areas except Greeneville, Harriman, Sevierville, and Tullahoma.

From 2002 to 2003, the unemployment

rate decreased in Athens, Cookeville, Dyersburg, and McMinnville. The unemployment rate remained the same from 2002 to 2003 in Harriman. The unemployment rate increased in the other 15 micropolitan areas in 2002.

During the past three years, the unemployment rate has steadily declined in Athens, Cookeville, Dyersburg, and McMinnville. In each of these communities, the total number of unemployed persons declined each year. In Athens and Cookeville, the total number of

employed persons increased each year. In Cookeville and Dyersburg, the total number of persons in the labor force increased in each successive year.

Last year, the micropolitan areas with the lowest unemployment rate were Cookeville and Tullahoma, both at 4.9 percent. Tullahoma had the lowest unemployment rate for three consecutive years. Lawrenceburg had the highest unemployment rate at 8.7 percent.







NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for September 2005 was 5.1 percent, down 0.2 percent from the August 2005 rate. This is the first month this year that Tennessee had a seasonally adjusted unemployment rate lower than or equal to the national rate.

The United States' unemployment rate was also 5.1 percent in September 2005. In September 2004, the national unemployment rate was 5.4 percent and the state's unemployment rate was 5.3 percent.

Across Tennessee, the not-seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased in 86 counties, increased in eight counties, and remained the same in one county. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 3.2 percent, down 0.2 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Clay County's 12.4 percent, up from 10.7 percent in August. Total nonfarm employment increased by 25,100 jobs from September 2004 to September 2005. During this period, there were increases in retail trade (up 7,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,800 jobs in general merchandise stores; health care/social assistance (up 6,400 jobs), which includes increases of 3,500 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 1,600 jobs in hospitals; leisure/hospitality (up 3,100 jobs) in hospitals; leisure/hospitality (up 3,700 jobs in food services/drinking places and a 1,700 job decline in accommodation;

local government (up 2,600 jobs); construction (up 2,200 jobs); wholesale trade (up 2,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,100 jobs in wholesale electronic markets and 1,000 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; financial activities (up 2,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,200 jobs in finance/insurance; and professional/business services (up 1,500 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,000 jobs in professional/scientific/technical services. This was partially offset by declines in information (down 1,500 jobs), state government educational services

(down 1,100 jobs), and the previously mentioned decline in accommodation.


During September, nonfarm employment increased by 17,500 jobs. There were seasonal school increases in local government (up 8,000 jobs), state government educational services (up 5,600 jobs), retail trade (up 4,400 jobs), and educational services (up 3,200 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline in leisure/hospitality (down 4,000 jobs), which included a drop of 2,200 jobs in accommodation/food services.

The data from all the nonfarm employment estimates tables include all full- and part-time nonfarm wage and salary employees who worked during or received pay for any part of the pay period that includes the 12th of the month. This is a count of jobs by place of work. Agricultural workers, proprietors, self-employed persons, workers in private households, and unpaid family workers are excluded. These numbers may not add due to rounding. Data are based on the 2004 benchmark.

Chattanooga MSA

Total nonfarm employment increased by 1,000 jobs from August to September. There were seasonal increases in state government (up 800 jobs), local government (up 400 jobs), educational/health services (up 300 jobs), and retail trade and nondurable goods manufacturing (both up 200 jobs). This was partially offset by declines in leisure/hospitality (down 500 jobs), which includes a drop of 200 jobs in accommodation/food services; administrative/support/waste management and durable goods manufacturing (both down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 2,500 jobs. During that time, goods-producing jobs remained constant while service-providing jobs increased by 2,500.



There were seasonal increases in educational/health services (up 600 jobs); professional/business services (up 300 jobs), which includes an increase of 200 jobs in administrative/support/waste management; and state government (up 300 jobs). This is partially offset by a decrease in leisure/hospitality (down 200 jobs).

During the past 12 months, nonfarm employment increased by 4,700 jobs. During this time, goods-producing jobs decreased by 200, while service-providing jobs increased by 4,900.




