Commonly Used Web Sites

Important Web Sites

The primary purpose of the Labor Market Information (LMI) Unit of the Research and Statistics Section is to disseminate economic and labor market information to interested users. The advent of the Internet has changed the way we do business. Web sites have become a primary resource for all businesses, and we are no different. The data are up-to-date and available 24 hours a day. More and more of our customers depend on economic data posted on the Internet.

There are some problems with the Internet. For example, not all data are timely (check those dates), not all Web sites look the same, and many are NOT user friendly. Many Web sites have been redesigned and relocated from previous places. These Web sites are the most up-todate. If the site you used last year is different, you may want to use the newer Web site now. Also, these URLs (Web addresses) change, and some could become obsolete in the next few months. Keeping up with these changes is a full-time job.

On the following page is a list of the most current Web sites that help our users "surf the Web" to collect economic and labor market data. One site is **E-Government Online Services.** On this State of Tennessee site, you

can file for unemployment, get a drivers, hunting, and/or fishing license, find out about your taxes and payments (not including federal taxes), check on real estate assessments, get on the "Do Not Call" lists, and file a job application. Check out all the services available online.

The Case Management and Activity Training System (CMATS) will allow you to seek specific jobs that are available through our Career Centers. You can search databases by geography, education, wages, and/or work experience. America's Job Bank and Tennessee's Job Bank are resources for jobs in Tennessee and nation.

American FactFinder is an invaluable tool on the census Web site that helps you obtain census data for affirmative action plans and general data like population and other demographic data.

The Center for Business and Economic Research (CBER) is located at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. The site has a variety of Tennessee economic information, including the Tennessee Statistical Abstract. Also, you can find population, personal income, business outlooks, and maps of the metro and micropolitan statistical areas.

The Source is a huge interactive database of Tennessee occupational and employment information.

The Affirmative Action Data Supplement and the Affirmative Action Census Data are two Web sites used to complete an affirmative action plan. The former has the most recent demographic data (2005) by county and metropolitan statistical area (MSA). The later has Census 2000 occupational data for counties and MSAs. This data is provided by race and sex.

The **Consumer Price Index (CPI)** will show the monthly increase in a marketbasket of goods and services in the United States. This data is commonly used by businesses to base the inflation rate and thus generate wage increases.

The **Career Centers Directory** gives the names and addresses of all the local Career Center offices of the Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

The Labor Force Estimates give the monthly labor force and unemploy-

ment rates by state, labor force and unemployment rates by state, county and MSAs. There are also press releases that give short descriptions of the data included.

Annual Average Data offers five years of labor force and nonfarm employment by industry. This information is done for MSAs and non-MSA counties.

The **County/Community Data Sheets** present an overview of local information. There is much information even for small towns. Also, check the Economic and Community Development Web site.

The Occupational Wage Data provides wage data of the two previous annual wage surveys. This data is compiled by county groups so users can compare wages for the same occupations in different geographic locations in Tennessee. Also included this year are the **Job Outlook In Brief**, which show the projected growth of occupations from 2004 to 2014. The **Occupational Outlook** **Handbook** is a national reference of occupational data.

The Labor Market Report accesses copies of this monthly publication for previous years. The **publications home page** lists other publications developed by this department.





Unemployment Rates 1976-2005





NONFARM EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR FORCE IN TENNESSEE

Tennessee's seasonally adjusted estimated unemployment rate for September was 4.6 percent, down 1.1 percent from the August rate. This is the first time in over two years that the rate is equal to or lower than the national average.

The United States' unemployment rate was 4.6 percent in September 2006. In September 2005, the national unemployment rate was 5.1 percent, and the state's unemployment rate was 5.5 percent.

Across Tennessee, the unemployment rate decreased in 93 counties and increased in two counties. The lowest rate occurred in Williamson County at 2.6 percent, down 0.9 percent from the previous month. The highest rate was Haywood County's 8.9 percent, down from 10.8 percent in August 2006.

(Continued from Page 5) Total nonfarm employment increased by 33,000 jobs from September 2005 to September 2006. During this period, there were increases in accommodation/food services (up 7,000 jobs), which includes an increase of 5,900 jobs in food services/drinking places and 1,100 jobs in accommodation; retail trade (up 6,800 jobs), which includes an increase of 3,200 jobs in general merchandise stores, 1,400 jobs in building material/garden equipment/supplies, and 1,300 jobs in both health/personal care stores and motor vehicle parts dealers; health care/social assistance (up 6,100 jobs), which includes an increase of 2,800 jobs in ambulatory health care services and 2,200 jobs in hospitals; construction (up 3,300 jobs); professional/scientific/technical services and local government (both up 3,000 jobs); wholesale trade (up 1,700 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,300 jobs in durable goods merchant wholesalers; arts/ entertainment/recreation (up 1,600 jobs); and transportation/warehousing (up 1,300 jobs), which includes an increase of 1,100 jobs in truck transportation. This was partially offset by declines of 1,500 jobs in food/beverage stores, 1,300 jobs in transportation equipment manufacturing, and 1,200 jobs in administrative/support/waste management.

During September, nonfarm employment increased by 14,200 jobs. There were seasonal increases in local government educational services (up 9,100 jobs), state government educational services (up 5,400 jobs), educational services (up 2,300 jobs), and machinery manufacturing (up 1,900 jobs). This was partially offset by a decline of 3,200 jobs in leisure/hospitality, of which 1,800 jobs dropped in arts/entertainment/recreation and 1,400 jobs declined in accommodation/food services.


